Executive Summary

SAHQ Academy will be a free charter school serving students in grades 7-12 primarily in the Albuquerque Metro Area. It will be located in the Lead / Coal corridor just east of I-25, near UNM, CNM, Presbyterian Hospital and Downtown in a 27,000 square foot building. For nearly four years, the founders have operated a non-profit community center at this location, providing sports training and tutoring to youth and adults. Student Athlete Headquarters (SAHQ) has also served as a meeting space for neighborhood associations, sports teams, charter schools, a church and charitable organizations. All programs are run 100% by volunteers.

SAHQ Academy's long term vision is to not only create a unique and effective educational program but also to positively impact the community. Our school's uniqueness is rooted in its structure, taking what young people are passionate about and applying it directly to their academic approach. It draws from the strong relationships athletes share with coaches and teammates along with their daily effort to prepare and improve performance. Student - Athletes have special qualities and character traits that focus on outcomes as the result of consistent, daily effort. Cross accountability between teammates and doing your best for the benefit of the team is well understood and accepted.

SAHQ Academy's mission is EXCELLENCE TOGETHER! Our vision is summarized below:

A rigorous, team based academic schedule is the foundation of SAHQ Academy. We build relationships that maximize a student's emerging talent, energy and curiosity in a community centered facility. We prepare and expose students to careers in sports and health science and graduate productive members of a global economy who thrive under pressure, well prepared for higher education. SAHQ Academy draws on a student's love for sports to empower, motivate and inspire excellence in every aspect of their lives and expands their ability to solve complex problems.

SAHQ Academy will appeal to those students looking for a small school, strong relationships, technology enhanced curriculum, and an opportunity to explore their intelligence surrounded by like-minded, high energy people. Other schools in New Mexico that utilize the same base curriculum are Taos Academy and Rio Rancho Cyber Academy, both "A" rated schools.

At SAHQ Academy, relationships drive everything we do. All of the student's stakeholders will meet regularly and work together to set academic and college goals that are integrated into a student's daily routine. Teachers collaborate and problem solve together. Each student has a Success Coach that they meet with daily and who stays with them through graduation.

No one joins a sports team to be mediocre and it should be no different in the classroom.

In other Albuquerque schools, D's get diplomas. At SAHQ Academy, our curriculum is mastery based and we establish a student's minimum acceptable standard based on data, goals and stakeholders input. If it is determined that a student should be capable of getting at least a "B" in a particular course, they are expected to learn the material and perform no lower than that standard. All work must be completed at the minimum acceptable standard or be repeated. Through the abundance of data available through technology, teachers can assess a student's academic needs in real-time and address them as they occur through small group classes and high dosage tutoring.

A 2013 LFC report found that in New Mexico high schools, 77% of NM students who completed Algebra II still needed to take remedial math their first year in college and 42% of those who completed trigonometry in high school needed remedial work, revealing an extreme lack of rigor in our schools. Our academic success as a state has a profound economic impact. If NM high schools graduated all students ready for college, the state would save \$31.8 million a year in community college remediation costs and lost earnings. SAHQ Academy is not only committed to teaching; we are committed to the breadth, depth and extension of each individual student's learning. Raising the bar for education in our state will enrich our base of human capital and positively impact our economy.

The state's low graduation rate has a negative impact on jobs, tax revenue, workforce qualifications, attracting corporate investment, crime rates, teen pregnancy, and health in both rural and urban communities and the strength of our nation as a whole. Considering the urgent needs of our state and resources are finite, the statistics are staggering. 1 out of 2.5 New Mexicans are on Medicaid; More than 13,200 students did not graduate from NM's high schools in 2009; the lost lifetime earning in NM for that class of dropouts alone totals more than \$3.4 billion. SAHQ Academy recognizes the long term financial and societal impacts and we feel a strong sense of responsibility and urgency to reverse NM trends by graduating students on time with the necessary tools to be successful in college and the workforce as they ultimately become contributing members of our community.

SAHQ Academy will provide individualized instruction, strong relationships, high dosage tutoring and an active environment that inspires kids to show up.
