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1	VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: I call back into
2	session this meeting of the Public Education
3	Commission.
4	Commissioner Gant, will you do a roll
5	call, please?
6	COMMISSIONER GANT: Commissioner Bergman.
7	COMMISSIONER BERGMAN: Here.
8	COMMISSIONER GANT: Commissioner Lopez.

11	VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Here.
12	COMMISSIONER GANT: Commissioner Gant. We
13	have the quorum we need.
14	VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Again, we do
15	apologize for being late. I just knew this building
16	was right on the river. It wasn't. And so we
17	toured Carlsbad, somewhat; it was very nice. Let me
18	give you some general information on how the meeting
19	is going to be conducted this morning, and then
20	we'll get started.
21	This meeting is being conducted pursuant
22	to New Mexico Statutes Annotated, Title 22,
23	Section 8B-6J, 2009. The purpose of these community
24	input hearings that will be held from August 20th
25	through August 24th, 2012, is to obtain information



from the applicant and to receive community input to assist the Public Education Commission -- oh, I'm not close enough; okay, thank you -- to assist the Public Education Commission in its decision whether to grant the proposed charter application.

According to this section of the law, the Commission may appoint a subcommittee of no fewer than three members to hold a public hearing.

According to the law, these hearings are being transcribed by a professional court reporter.

The total time allocated to each applicant is 90 minutes, which will be timed to insure an equitable opportunity to present applications.

During the hearing, the Commission will allow for community input about the charter application. The time for public comments will be limited to 20 minutes. If you wish to speak on behalf of the applicant, please sign in at least 20 minutes before the applicant's presentation.

And I have the sign-up sheet here. Please be sure that you indicate on the sign-up sheet whether you are here in opposition or support of the charter school.

The Commission Chair, based on the number of requests to comment, will allocate time to those





wishing to speak. If there are a large number of supporters or opponents, they are asked to select a speaker to represent common opinions. We will try to allocate an equitable amount of time to represent the community accurately.

The Commission will follow this process for each community input hearing: The Commission will ask each applicant or group to present at the table in front. They will be given 20 minutes to present their application in the manner they deem appropriate. The Commission will not accept any written documentation from the applicant, but the applicant may use demonstrative exhibits to describe their school, if necessary. However, the setup time for exhibits, et cetera, will be included in the 20 minutes.

Following the applicant's presentation, the local school district representative or representatives will be given five minutes to comment. Subsequently, the Commission will allow 20 minutes for public comment as described above. Finally, the Commission will be given 45 minutes to ask questions of the applicants.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Mr. Casavantes,

please come forward. You already are; thank you.

For the record, please state the name of your

school, the names of the founders of the school, and

any other person who is here today on behalf of the

school. You will have 20 minutes to present

information about your application.

And let me just ask all speakers today.

And let me just ask all speakers today.

If you have a unique spelling of your name, please spell it for the reporter so that it will be accurate in the record. Thank you. Please go ahead.

MR. CASAVANTES: Good morning. Would you also want to make clear that this is the same meeting of same kind, and you answer the same questions, or --

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Yes. Thank you for that reminder. This is the fifth application of this applicant. This is our fifth meeting with that applicant. It may be very likely that the Commission will not ask all of the questions that we have asked in previous meetings. We already have gotten the responses and know the answers.

If there is a question in your mind that we have not asked in this meeting, please be



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directed to the PEC Web site where the transcripts of all these meetings will be available starting in about a week's time.

The first meeting with this applicant was in Deming, and if you would like to see an absolute complete record with all of the questions that were asked at that meeting, please direct yourself to that Web site.

Thank you. Thank you for the reminder.

MR. CASAVANTES: Yes, ma'am. Thank you.

My name is Mark Casavantes, C-A-S-A-V-A-N-T-E-S. I

am a founder of Academic Opportunities Academy. My

other founder is Wes Clarkson. And we have a new

addition as of yesterday evening, Carlos Hernandez.

He spoke on our behalf in Anthony and in Alamogordo.

Is that the introduction?

MS. CHAVEZ: Go ahead.

MR. CASAVANTES: Oh, you want to continue?
Okay, yes, ma'am.

Good morning, Commissioners. We -- we are going to be asking that you consider our application with -- with conditions for the Deming and Anthony applications, and to not approve the other locations in New Mexico. We believe that the faults that our plan has can be corrected, and that the need in



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those two communities is very great, and that we can be a very contributing factor to improving the education in those areas, and that it would be in the best interests of New Mexico and those communities and the children in those communities for our charter to be at those two locations. VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: May I ask you to name those locations again?

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MR. CASAVANTES: Deming and Anthony.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Deming and Anthony. Thank you.

MR. CASAVANTES: Yes, ma'am. Yes, ma'am.

I was asked prior to this meeting Okay. that the gentleman had a concern about how we were going to move students from test -- from the main academic space to testing.

And since we're going to be using tablet computers, messages can be sent sort of in the form of an instant message when a class is going to meet and where, so that the student can be pulled out to go to a particular class, and that, in these classes, the students that are pulled out in this class would -- would be needing instruction in a particular area.

One of the things that happens in the





that do not need instruction. They already learned it. Sometimes the instruction is over the heads of some of the other students because they are further behind. And I think, in this classroom setting, you're addressing the needs of the students more appropriately by having a pullout program for -- for the students.

Another question was asked about kind of how we're going to have the curriculum and activities. And we're going to have a spectrum of activities, like projects and reports and -- and writing assignments and math problems and problem-solving, the spectrum of problem -- of projects that you find anywhere. And they were going to be developed by our staff. They are currently being developed by Mr. Clarkson.

Mr. Clarkson has worked in the field of curriculum writing and has published a few textbooks in math and one in -- bilingual medical vocabulary book. And with his relationships with these companies that -- that he generates questions for, we're going to be able to purchase questions from them at a reasonable price. And that's one of the -- that they were going to be loaded into our



database.

Our database is going to be like a -similar to the kind of reports you would see on
TD Ameritrade or other programs of that kind, where
we're going to provide a lot more detail on the
performance of each of our students on all the
curriculum areas in the State of New Mexico and see
how they're progressing in each one. And we're
going to -- the reports are going to be customized
for parents, maybe in a simpler form, with icons.
And they also would be available to get the data
that the teachers see on their particular child or
children.

We believe that this information would be very helpful in -- in guiding instruction, seeing how effective the instruction is, and improving -- and also the feedback to students. They will see how they are progressing.

One of the metrics that you were alluding to -- one of those was progress. And under AYP, they measure how much a student is progressing in a given school year. And, basically, that you could break down the time elements to -- we hope to get it as small as possible, but maybe at least to the day, "How much progress did you make today in your



curriculum towards completing a particular grade level," so that we can see that each day, the student is progressing towards -- towards meeting their -- the yearly progress requirements.

We plan to have a main academics space, where most of the students' work is done and guided through instructional aides. And that teachers will be pulling students out from that main academic space to have classes.

The classes are going to be without a bell schedule. The teacher is going to have the ability to take the time necessary to teach the lesson to its completion without the constraints of bell schedules, so that -- so that the students would get the full lesson necessary to be successful. Some of the issues, like lunch period, they may have a break and then reconvene the class after -- after lunch, if that is -- if that is to occur.

We're going to have an extended day,
where -- and our goal is to have all the work
completed in school so that it is not a requirement
to take any work home. A lot of parents either do
not -- or lack the ability to provide -- I know a
lot of parents do have that ability, but many do
not. And so we are planning to have an extended day



so that all the work is done in the school, and that when the -- when the parents pick these children up, they have completed their work for the day.

We plan to have a requirement that students earn either a 90 or repeat their work again. Okay? We believe that this will raise the academic standards of all our students and make a significant change in their education.

If a student was retained in the regular school year, they were retained all the way to the beginning of the school year. Our plan is to find out where they are in the continuum of the school year and progress them and catch them up to the current grade levels.

Also when a student completes the requirements for a particular grade level in a particular subject, the next day, they would be in the new grade level. So they would be able to progress at their own pace through their -- and that, in this system, it doesn't cause disruption by having a student -- you don't have to change their schedules; you don't have to -- you don't have to reassign them or anything like that. And it allows them to progress in each particular subject. So a student could be in two or three grade levels in



their subjects.

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One of the things I think I should address is the dual credit. And I know you had the concern about them starting in the sixth grade. Well, one of the things is we are not having the -- you know, it is our goal to have our students to complete high school -- high school and associate's degree upon graduation. But it's not a graduation requirement. And that if a student was not able to -- to be able to do the work at that level or determined not to do it at that level, I think it's appropriate that they wouldn't, and that we set up something along the lines where that -- like, the New Mexico State University was wanting to have a test, and if they passed the tests, they would be permitted to take the classes; if they do not pass these tests, then they are not permitted to take these classes.

They would have progress towards an associate's degree, but possibly not -- not complete the degree. But it's our goal, and it was our intention and desire, to -- to have them complete -- and we would strive for that. But it may not be appropriate for all students.

The two fields that we chose was nursing and computer programming, because it wasn't that we

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were trying to say that all students go to college; we were looking at all the possible fields that the students could pursue; and, that these two fields are subjects that they could be self-sustaining upon graduation.

And I think that's a concern that the -that many students that graduate from high school are not able to sustain themselves upon graduation. They get maybe some very low-paying jobs. unemployed. And there are some that I'm sure get some good-paying jobs. But -- but I think it's a concern that needs to be addressed; and that we are attempting to do that.

And then, as a charter school, we're dealing with a population of 300 and possibly expanding to 400, that out of a community of this size, I think that we could find that number of students. And that the charter is to fulfill a niche, not necessarily solve everyone's problems or desires in a community; and that that's part of the choices that the community -- that a charter school can provide is that we are one of the choices available to a community. That concludes my remarks.

> VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you.



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Commissioners, I'd like to take just a couple-of-minute recess so that I can confer with Director Callahan, please. So we're in recess for about five minutes.

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(Recess taken, 8:30 a.m. to 8:50 p.m.)

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: I call this back into session from recess. I thank you for your patience. We wanted to check with legal counsel to make sure we were proceeding in a legal way.

Legal counsel advises us that we may -don't have to -- but we may proceed with community input from the school district and the community. And I assume that those of you who have signed up to speak, as well as the Superintendent, do want to However, if anyone chooses to withdraw that has signed up to speak, that's fine, too.

So if -- if everyone is okay with this, we'll move ahead. Mr. Perkowski, if you'll come ahead representing the local school district. the record, please state your name and the role you play at the local school district. You will have five minutes to comment on this application.

MR. PERKOWSKI: Madame Chair, members of the Board, I'm Gary Perkowski, P-E-R-K-O-W-S-K-I.

And I am the Superintendent of Schools in Carlsbad.





We are very appreciative of you being in Carlsbad.

It's always good to get people to come down and visit with us in Southeast New Mexico. Even though a couple of you are from Southeast New Mexico, we're still glad to have you.

We are here in opposition to the issuance of this charter school. We do not feel it's something that's needed here in this area at all. We have a very -- very effective school district. We have a lot of people here that are working very hard. You can see behind me, we have support of not only the rest of the administrators in the school district, but we have a State Representative here. We have the two City Council people here. The Mayor expressed his regrets; he had another -- a commitment that had he had go to. We have the Chamber of Commerce, who have a resolution they would like to present to you.

It is something in Carlsbad that we just feel is not needed. We've been moving very closely with A-to-F grading. We've been moving up. We've got an "A" school in Carlsbad. Most of our schools have moved up here in Carlsbad. Most of the schools have improved over the last year.

We have worked very closely with Santa Fe



and the PED on Common Core and the new evaluation system, and we're doing our best to keep the school district as one of the leaders in the state of New Mexico.

We won't take a lot of your time today, because I -- I know that this has been withdrawn for Carlsbad. But we still have some people that would like to get some things on the record, and we will get them up here, if you don't mind, and take a few minutes of your time. But we will also have some of those people, I think, that will pull their names and not participate today.

So at this time, I would like to call the -- the president of the School Board, if he would like to come forward and address you. That's Mr. Steve West.

MS. CHAVEZ: Three minutes.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: We have three minutes remaining?

MS. CHAVEZ: Yes.

MR. WEST: We have a resolution that was passed by the School Board on Tuesday, a unanimous vote. I don't know if it's better for me to read it, or should I just give you a copy of it? What would be better to enter it into the record?





VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: We cannot accept 1 2 written input during the meeting. However, there is a means for you to send that to us, and we'll give 3 4 that to you at the end of the meeting. 5 MR. WEST: "Whereas, the Carlsbad 6 Municipal Schools is requesting assistance and 7 support in addressing concerns we are facing with the new virtual charter schools, and; 8 9 "Whereas, there are at least two charter 10 schools advertising and attempting to enroll students from the Carlsbad Municipal School 11 12 District, and; 13 "Whereas, these new virtual charter 14 schools/academies claim they are not taking any funding from CMS; however, our school district is 15 16 funded on a per-student formula, and the loss of any 17 student means loss of funding, and; "Whereas, we are not aware of the 18 19 standards on which these virtual schools are basing 20 their curriculum and instruction, and; 21 "Whereas, Carlsbad students leaving our 22 accredited schools to attend these virtual schools 23 may not receive the level of rigorous instruction 24 for college and career readiness, and;



"Whereas, there is no need for a virtual

charter school, as CMS currently offers virtual 1 2 opportunities to high school students in need of such alternative-type learning environments, and; 3 4 "Whereas, our virtual program assigns a 5 teacher who meets with students face to face and provides support and gives instruction at their 6 7 level of need based on New Mexico Standards and the 8 National Common Core State standards, and; 9 "Whereas, students are also given the 10 opportunity to enroll and attend elective courses 11 such as physical education, band, art, et cetera. 12 Students participating in our virtual program 13 graduate with a Carlsbad High School diploma and not 14 a, quote, 'generic, cyber diploma.' "Now, therefore, be it resolved that the 15 Board of Education of the Carlsbad Municipal Schools 16 17 supports retaining students and opposes the institution of external virtual charter schools from 18 19 being established in Carlsbad." 20 And this was passed by unanimous vote Tuesday of this week, on the 22nd. 21 22 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you very much. 23 MR. WEST: Are there any questions? Thank 24 you. 25 All right. THE REPORTER: I'll take a



1 copy of that. Thank you very much. 2 MS. CHAVEZ: You have one minute. 3 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Any other 4 representatives of the District? We have one minute 5 left. MR. PERKOWSKI: At this time, I'll 6 7 introduce Ms. Kelli Barta, who is our Director of 8 Secondary Education. I'm not sure she's ever done 9 anything in one minute. We will see. 10 MS. BARTA: I bet I can. I bet I can. 11 MS. CHAVEZ: You've got 40 seconds. 12 Okay. Carlsbad Schools offers MS. BARTA: 13 multiple opportunities for students, based on 14 tailored learning, everything from virtual to extended day, alternative school for emotional 15 16 support, a strong dual-credit program with 17 15 different offerings of course study. We have a 18 strong RTI program to support those in need of 19 learning and extended learning for high-level 20 learners. Is that it? 21 22 MS. CHAVEZ: You have 12 seconds. 23 MS. BARTA: We have a very strong AP and 24 pre-AP program that we are continuing to develop, 25 and it is evolving and improving constantly.



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MS. CHAVEZ: That's it. Good job.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you. We're to the section on public comments. I have nine people signed up. We have 20 minutes. So let's go two minutes each. First on the list is Robert Defer. I hope I pronounced that correctly.

MR. DEFER: Yes, ma'am, you did. I am

Robert Defer, D-E-F-E-R. I'm the Executive Director

of the Chamber of Commerce here in Carlsbad. I also

have a resolution that is very similar to the one

that was read. I'd like to present, if that's

little --

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Would you use the microphone, please, so everyone can hear you? I think you may have to take it off and just make it a hand mic.

MR. DEFER: Do we start all over in the introduction and everything? Again, my name is Robert Defer with the Chamber of Commerce. I do appreciate the time to be able to come and share with you some information that we have. I have a resolution that has been signed by the president of our board. Her name is Judi Waters, and she signed this last week on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce.



I would like to present that -- I know you said we

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could mail those in, but do you want me to mail this in, or --

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: I think the court reporter took the first copy to help her with her records. It's up to her if she wants it or needs it.

THE REPORTER: I'll take it.

MR. DEFER: Thank you very much, ma'am. I just want you to understand that the Chamber of Commerce is very much behind the Carlsbad school system. We are supporting them in all that they do, because we have seen a growth in our community because we have also seen a growth in our students. Their learning ability has increased, and we're excited about that.

Because of our environment here, we need students to not only learn, but we need them to come back to Carlsbad. And that's one of the goals of our school system, that they not only learn, but they come back here. And we're excited about that.

We know that they're serving the correct curriculum and information so that they can continue their education on into college. And that also excites us.

So I just want you to understand that the





Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce does support the 1 2 municipal school system in retaining the students that we have here, and that we are in opposition to 3 4 having a virtual charter school come into our 5 community. 6 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you. 7 MR. DEFER: Yes, ma'am. 8 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: The next name on the 9 list is Steve West. 10 MR. WEST: I already spoke. 11 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Oh, okay. Thank 12 Ron Singleton. you. 13 Madame Chairman, thank you MR. SINGLETON: 14 for the opportunity to address this Commission. I'm on the School Board here at Carlsbad. 15 And I only have one or two things I would like to address. 16 Мy 17 main question is why? Why do we need another charter school to be in Carlsbad when we have one 18 19 that works adequately fine for us? 20 The other question is, is since I've been 21 on the Board, the State budget has continually 22 dwindled in education to now that we're 10 percent 23 below what we used to be when I started. It'll just 24 be another drain on our finances, which hurts our

students bad.

program. We will have to lose money out of our 1 2 special ed budget to help this program along. have to support things out of our budget. 3 4 So it's tough to try and balance a budget 5 now in this time. But 10 percent of our budget has been taken from us. And all I hear on the School 6 7 Board is, "More, more, more," but with no more 8 So unfunded mandates are not very much fun to try and work with. 10 So I would -- I would speak against this. 11 Thank you, ma'am. 12 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you. 13 Mr. Perkowski, you're next on the list, but you've 14 already spoken. Kelli -- is that Bartlett? -- oh, 15 that's you? Okay, thank you. 16 Ron Christophernson [ph]? Did I butcher 17 it? 18 MR. CHRISTOPHERSON: Yes, that's all 19 You're not the first; you won't be the last. 20 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: All right. 21 MR. CHRISTOPHERSON: My name is Ron 22 Christopherson, C-H-R-I-S-T-O-P-H-E-R-S-O-N. morning, Madame Chair, Commission members. Welcome 23 24 to Carlsbad. Thank you for your due diligence in



what has been a weeklong effort to seek input that

will impact the education of all of New Mexico's children.

I have been a -- a veteran teacher of the Carlsbad Municipal School system for the past 26 years, and --

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Oh. Use the microphone, please. I'm sorry.

MR. CHRISTOPHERSON: -- have recently finished all but my doctoral dissertation to earn an Ed.D. in educational leadership, and have moved into a leadership role with Carlsbad's current district charter school. And there are a couple of -- of points of concern.

You'll note on the sign-up sheet, I scratched out the word "Opposition" and wrote the words, "Concerns and questions." I'm not opposed to charter schools. I just have some questions and concerns in regard to the document that you're going to be making decisions based on, either now or in the future.

So a few questions. In the executive order -- the executive summary, Mr. Casavantes indicates the school communities that the five charter schools would be moving into. And he lists -- lists all five of them, but then indicates



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that they are moving into -- would like to move into schools that are currently attended -- are -- currently attend schools in three districts instead of five. And then he lists two charter schools in Las Cruces and one charter school in Anthony, and fails to mention that Carlsbad has a charter school.

So I don't know if -- the first question should be is -- is this organization even aware that we have a charter school, and that it's a district charter school? And, unlike what's written in the document that talks about an adversarial relationship between a district charter school and the districts around the state of New Mexico, we have something very unique and very special with this charter and this school district, that the AOA Academy [verbatim] talks about having the ability to reach out to kids that aren't currently being served. Our charter school is doing that in this town, with the support of the school district.

I'm impressed to see both the
Superintendent and the School Board President and
members of the School Board on the charter's campus.
We had those dignitaries actually not only show up
at last year's graduation, but were guest speakers
at the graduation. So that shows.



MS. CHAVEZ: Madame Chair, time is up. 1 2 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you for your 3 comments, sir. Your time is up. 4 Just lay the mic on COMMISSIONER GANT: 5 the table. VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Yeah, just lay it on 6 7 the table. Cindy Holguin? 8 MS. HOLGUIN: Hello. My name is Cindy 9 Holguin. I'm the CEO of Jefferson Montessori 10 Academy's charter school here in Carlsbad. 11 I would have to say that we -- we do set 12 the example in the State of New Mexico with the 13 charters and the district. We have a great 14 relationship. Our Superintendent, Gary Perkowski, really supports us. And what it is more is he 15 16 supports Carlsbad kids. And I would say that we --17 we don't need another charter school, because there's already the need -- there's another 18 19 alternative need. 20 As well as Carlsbad schools have the 21 opportunity to take online classes and as well as 22 college classes. So -- and I wouldn't see the purpose of having another charter school when you --23 24 we have those things right here.



I think it's great that they care about

1 education and wanting student success, but so do we.

2 And I think that Carlsbad is a wonderful community.

3 We support our schools here, and I just want to make

4 | sure that -- because we are a district charter

5 school and not a State, a lot of you don't know us

6 as a charter school. But I would have to say the

7 District has provided us a school and treats us

8 really good. There's no adversarial, like there

9 used to be when charter schools started.

And I just wanted to share that with you, to let you guys know that our charter school and the Carlsbad Municipal Schools are all excellent schools, and you don't need anything other than

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you very much.

MR. RODRIGUEZ: Good morning. My name is Edward Rodriguez, R-O-D-R-I-G-U-E-Z. And I am not associated with the Carlsbad Schools. I work for an oilfield company here in the area. And I'd like to thank Mr. Casavantes for his presentation. But having coached for years, I also know that every --every coach has a game plan, and the team always wins in that game plan. But when we hit the field and things start going wrong is when -- when we

really need to have a plan in place.

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And I just saw some areas where I would have some concern as a parent. As a taxpayer, I'm concerned with the money that will be drawn from the Carlsbad Municipal Schools into this virtual high school. We do have the JMA. We also have some church-based schools. Those church-based schools believe in themselves so much that they're willing to stand alone, stand on their own and not take any money from the schools.

Another concern I have regarding the virtual high school is the draw on the district for special needs. If they have, in that virtual high school, a student with special needs, if they have Title 1 needs, if they have other physical therapy needs, if they want to take a -- an elective course, will the District get money for that student, or will they just have to provide that service?

Without having all of that in place and having been spelled out, as a taxpayer, a person that puts a lot of money into this district, I've got some real concerns about bringing someone in that's not addressing those very important needs in my world. Thank you.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you very much.



1 And the last speaker is Jason Shirley. 2 MR. SHIRLEY: Good morning. 3 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Good morning. 4 MR. SHIRLEY: I'm Jason Shirley, S-H --5 I'm sorry. I'm Jason Shirley, S-H-I-R-L-E-Y. I am City Councilor in Carlsbad. And thank you guys for 6 7 coming out today. We appreciate it so much. On 8 behalf of the City of Carlsbad and Mayor Dale Janway, we are in full support of the Carlsbad 10 Municipal Schools. We think that they are doing an 11 outstanding job in our community, and we -- as has 12 been said dozens of times today, we don't feel that 13 we have any need for additional charter schools. 14 thank you so much. VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you for those 15 16 That's the end of the list for public comments. 17 comment. 18 MS. CHAVEZ: Madame Chair? 19 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: I'm sorry? 20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: May I speak? May I speak, please? 21 22 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Do we have time 23 left? 24 MS. CHAVEZ: Yes, there's eight minutes 25 left.



VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Could I get you to 1 2 sign on the list so we're official here? 3 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm sorry. 4 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Representative 5 Brown, it's nice to have you here today. We'll be 6 glad to hear from you. 7 REP. BROWN: Do I need to hold the 8 microphone closer? 9 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Yes, you do. 10 REP. BROWN: The acoustics in this room 11 are not so good. Madame Chairman, members of the 12 Commission, I'm State Representative Cathryn Brown. 13 I represent the district here in this area. 14 district is also now a little bit into Artesia. But I'm -- I'm speaking today in 15 16 opposition to the proposal for this virtual charter 17 school. In -- I -- just a little history quickly. 18 I'm in the novel position of having been one of the 19 founders of the current charter school here in 20 Carlsbad, Jefferson Montessori Academy. And when 21 that school was in its initial effort, there was a 22 great deal of interest in the community to have a 23 charter school. And I was not State Representative 24 at the time. I was just a parent here in the 25 district, and, as an attorney, was asked to come in



and help volunteer some hours to help with the charter school launch. And so I did have a hand in drafting the charter.

But, at that time, there was really, truly a great deal of interest. And my sense of the community now is that there is not a clamor for another charter school or any other alternative at this time.

You've heard testimony this morning that there are a great many options in Carlsbad for students. And I just want to issue a vote of confidence regarding the Carlsbad Municipal Schools. I believe the district is doing an outstanding job of trying to meet the needs of students as diverse as the student body is in the district; and that with the -- the assistance of the charter school and as well as some expansion of services in the private school sector, I believe that the needs of the community are being met, and very well at that.

So with that, I would just say that I don't think that this is the time for an expansion of another public program. Thank you.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: Thank you very much.

If I could just make a point of clarification,

please. There is an application before this





Commission for a virtual school in New Mexico. 1 2 However, it is not this application. This is for a stand-alone, on-the-ground charter school. 3 4 since Mr. Casavantes has told us that he is 5 withdrawing the application for Carlsbad, I think 6 it's a moot point. But there -- I sense there is some 7 8 confusion, so I just wanted to make sure that you 9 know the application for the virtual school is 10 presented by other founders, and is still in the --11 in the running, I guess the word is. 12 That is the conclusion of the public 13 comments section. Mr. Casavantes, if you'd like to 14 come back up to the table, please. I would assume that Commissioners probably do not have any 15 questions for the applicant, since it's been 16 17 withdrawn? Mr. Casavantes, I am told that we need a 18 19 formal letter of withdrawal from you for those three 20 districts. 21 MR. CASAVANTES: Yes, ma'am. 22 VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: And if you would get 23 that to Ms. Callahan, to Director Callahan, and with 24 copies to all the PEC members, we would appreciate



it.

MR. CASAVANTES: I appreciate -- and also appreciate you clarifying that I was not a virtual school. I appreciate that.

VICE CHAIR SHEARMAN: And, as Commissioner Gant reminds me, the official minutes being taken by our reporter also do clarify that Mr. Casavantes has withdrawn his application from Carlsbad and the other two locations. But we still need it in writing, signed from you, please.
