3. Model or focus of the proposed school (e.g. performing arts, dual language, college prep, STEM):
Barack Obama Charter will be modeled after the program used by the highly successful Southwest Learning Centers in Albuquerque New Mexico with two important improvements. All curriculum materials will be filter through the Reinventing School Coalition which for the first time in the history of public education in New Mexico will assure that all students will master the Standards and Benchmarks required by the New Mexico Department of Education. In addition it is quite clear that accountability is missing from the schooling models in NM public education. The Barack Obama Charter will fully participate in the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Awards program to assure accountability in all phases of the school's operation.

This school will be a replication of the Southwest Leaning schools in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Data from the state of New Mexico has led to this school's charter being renewed for another five years.
7. Vision/Mission statement. (2-3 sentences)
The mission of the Barack Obama Charter is to prepare students in grades $7 - 12$, through an Integrative STEM educational model to become self-motivated, independent, competent, lifelong learners in a unique 21^{st} century global educational environment. Students will be equipped with the reading, writing, mathematical, scientific, and technological and problem solving skills necessary for success in post secondary education and science related careers.

8. Student body to be served, including key demographic data and targeted geographical area of the proposed school. Describe the targeted student population including key demographic data (academic performance, home languages, ELL and special education populations). Identify where these students are most likely being educated currently and why they are expected to choose the proposed charter school for their future educational needs.

Barack Obama Charter will serve students grades 7-12 in the same attendance area as Cibola High School.

Currently at James Madison Middle School (within 1 mile of Cibola High School) only 40% of the 414 Economically disadvantaged students have demonstrated grade level proficiency in mathematics. They were not prepared for high school and yet are moved into the high school program where predictably they do very poorly.

BOC is open to all students and will serve approximately 300 students including Hispanic, Economically

Disadvantaged, Special Education and English Language Learner students who are not receiving a successful education in Albuquerque Public Schools.

Only 38% of the remaining (those who have not dropped out) juniors attending Cibola High School demonstrate high school level mathematics school. The next year after this data was collected by the PED about 76% of the remaining seniors graduate. Therefore, diplomas are being issued to students who have never demonstrated high school level reading or mathematics skills. With a lack of accountability for this failure a powerful educational alternative has to be offered to these students and their parents.

9. Evidence and assessment of a community need for a school of this nature: Detail any objective surveys or other measures of local demand for the proposed educational program.

The alternatives to traditional education in Albuquerque Public Schools are all operating at capacity. The Albuquerque Academy, St. Pius X and Sandia Prep are operating at full capacity with a waiting list.

The evidence of low graduation rates, high drop-out rates and a lack of accountability for allowing parents to not meet state mandatory attendance laws makes the community need for Barack Obama Charter School acute.

Barack Obama Charter will be model after the Southwest Learning Centers in Albuquerque New Mexico. Southwest Learning Center is a Charter School that operates at full capacity with a waiting list of 3,000 clearly indicating it is meeting a need in the community.

10. Key innovative, unique and/or programmatic features the school will implement in order to accomplish its vision and mission (non-traditional school year, longer school day, partner organizations, etc.)

There are two crucial programmatic features Barack Obama Charter will use that are modeled by Southwest Learning Centers:

- The academic program will utilize Education 2020 considered to be an effective reflection of the NM Standards and Benchmarks. The E2020 program is available "anytime, anywhere" through the Internet. The school program is heavily centered around an integrative STEM model. In addition, the curriculum synopsis includes additional subject areas that provide a full educational program.
- 2. The school will use a flexible schedule allowing students to attend during the times of day that are best for them.
- 11. How the school will be more effective than the schools currently serving the targeted student population, and/or plans to improve student achievement and exceed the academic performance of existing public schools in the targeted service area and any data you have to support this assumption.

The contrast between the proposed Barack Obama Charter and the current public schools in Albuquerque is stark. Cibola High School is rated by the State of New Mexico as R-2, restructuring is required. This R-2 designation was achieved after the school district was given and spent millions of dollars in federal small learning communities funds with no measurable improvement. In contrast, Barack Obama Charter will be modeled after Southwest Learning Centers which recently had yet another Charter School approved.
