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Biographies

David Robbins-District 2

David has over 14 years' experience in state government, and more than 30 years in the private sector. He holds a bachelor's degree in Economics and an MBA in Finance, both from UNM. His experience has included management, wholesale and retail sales, insurance, banking, utilities, education, consulting, public service, and construction.

David has been an adjunct professor of finance at the Anderson Schools of Management at the University of New Mexico. He was elected to the Albuquerque Public Schools Board of Education in 2009 and served from 2009-2013, including Chairman of the Finance and Audit Committees and the Capital and Technology Outlay Committee.

David served as Director of Administrative Services and CFO for the NM Department of Workforce Solutions, 2014-2018. He previously held the same positions at the NM Taxation and Revenue Department (2011-2014), where he oversaw the annual distribution of approximately \$7 billion in state revenues and taxes to New Mexico cities, counties, and various state funds.

In 2017, Governor Suzanna Martinez appointed David to a vacancy on the Public Education Commission, District 2. He ran for election in 2018 and is serving a four-year term, running through 2022.

David and his wife of over 44 years, Jan, are the proud parents of three grown children, including one with disabilities. They have five grandchildren (two granddaughters and three grandsons); all live in the Albuquerque area. David and his wife are active members of their church, where he serves as a Deacon and teaches a senior men's bible study class.

Glenna Voigt-District 3

Glenna Voigt was born in South Korea and raised in Albuquerque, NM. She obtained her B.S. in Education from the University of New Mexico and her M.A. in Educational Leadership from New Mexico Highlands University. Her Master's Thesis researched why traditional public school teachers leave large schools to teach at charter schools. Prior to studying Education, Glenna served in the US Air National Guard as a Photographer, studied Mechanical Engineering at the University of New Mexico, and taught English in Tokyo, Japan.

With over 20 years in Education, Glenna was a Physical Education Teacher, Athletic Coach, and Principal with Albuquerque Public Schools and the Founding Principal of the first NM PEC authorized charter school, Media Arts Collaborative Charter School (MACCS). As a Teacher, Glenna also served as her APS middle school's Bilingual Coordinator, Literacy Coach, ESL Instructor, Volleyball and Basketball Coach, and Legislative Liaison. While Principal at MACCS, the school received Albuquerque's prestigious Creative Bravos Award in 2012, "honoring the City's most creative minds and work that support a creative economy while making a significant impact on the lives of students, neighborhoods, and communities". Glenna has a thorough understanding of the extensive and varied work involved in running a successful charter school.

During her educational profession in Albuquerque, Glenna published numerous articles addressing technology and access in education, and the creative arts and civic engagement. "When youth overcome the vulnerability to present their creativity and defend their knowledge, they find their voice, become masters of their learning, and are empowered to speak up." Glenna has presented at over eight State and National conferences about the importance of rigorous course options, presentations of learning, challenges educators face with technology growth, career education, community outreach, and the importance of art and PE in schools.

In 2014 Glenna received an inaugural three-year WK Kellogg Foundation Fellowship which broadened her lens and her work to promote healthy development, academic success and economic security for children and their families. Her WKKF Fellowship sparked collective national action and culminated with a collaborative New Mexico/Mississippi youth project, "My World Our World", in which students creatively expressed ideas about social justice and racial equity.
