And if we're looking at Page 3, paragraph 2, it gives the impression that the letter of intent has to be received -- well, it does say that. It doesn't give the impression; it just flat-out says in the second -- third sentence, "All letters of intent must be received prior to the deadline to be entered into a given lottery."

And the guidance that went out on lottery is that when you are collecting that information, that it is the bare minimum in terms of the required fields that you mentioned, which are right on, and only that, because, otherwise, people can't often distinguish in a survey -- if it's, like, a Google form or whatever the application is that you're using, people can't always distinguish the difference.

MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: Right. Got it. Okay. May I ask a clarifying question? DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: So, for example, in

So the only items that people are -- that people have to enter on the LOI is the first and last name, the date of birth, and the grade that the

student will be in.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: I would ask the question, if someone is just entering the lottery, why do you have a form to enter the lottery when the lottery should have its own form? Or is that your lottery form?

MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: It is the form to enter the lottery. The only difference is that when we're in open enrollment -- so, like, for right now, if they came and they wanted to attend school now, like, if they wanted to start school at EVCA tomorrow, they wouldn't have to go through a lottery process because we're in open enrollment for this school year.

So they would fill out a letter of intent, and they would have -- you know, they would get a seat if there's a seat. And then they would do the registration process. So the letter of intent is separate from the registration. The letter of intent is just to enter the lottery process.

MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: I was just going to say, and if parents would prefer, they can actually come into the school and sit down with the registrar and fill out their letter of intent.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. They can certainly come in -- we should probably use the phrase "lottery form" as opposed to "letter of intent." Because I know that for me a letter of intent means a completely different -- a letter of intent means a completely different thing.

So one of the things that we are very concerned about is that before they're even able to access any school-related information from the website, that they had to be approved.

MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: No, not at all. No, no, no, no, no.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: I'm talking about enrollment-type information, like what might be expected of them once they're going through the

1 enrollment process.

The reason we had that discussion as a Commission is there are a couple of schools that -- where it was -- the enrollment process was very daunting and could have been seen as an obstacle, even before a child was accepted in the lottery process. So we wanted to separate completely the two.

Yeah. Anybody can access your website. That's fine. But to access a portal that has to do with the enrollment process, they first need to be accepted. That was the intent of why we did what we did.

MS. JENNIFER RIVERA: Okay. That makes sense.

COMMISSIONER BURT: If I can ask a question about that? I think -- I'm going to come from the parent perspective. I thought we said do not put your enrollment forms online, the actual forms in there.

But it -- I want to know the enrollment process, 100 percent, even if I am not accepted. Like, I need to know what the next step is. Like after I submit this lottery form, then what? Like, I need to know as a family what that looks like.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: That's not the way I'm remembering our intent. And the reason was the school that was the most egregious offender, once you went to that page, it was, like, you had to write an essay, you had to do this. You had to talk about --

COMMISSIONER BURT: That was part of their lottery.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: They were saying that it was separate because the word "Lottery" was there, and then underneath, the word "Admissions" was there, or something similar to that. So it was hard for a parent potentially to distinguish between the two.

I also want to say, Commissioner Burt, that I think the school's policy does a good job of saying that it's a different process. And so maybe a link to the overall policy would make sense.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Not for parents. Yeah, I don't think for parents, it's --

So we can discuss that. But I have a motion prepared. Do you want me to read the motion, and then we can discuss it?

THE CHAIR: Sure.

COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: Okay.

When we first engaged in the MOU discussion, it was -- it was clear from the Commission that the writ needed to be gone. I mean -- so the -- any possibility of clarity about this from the Supreme Court, we removed that, because we were -- and without a doubt, the MOU is a more collaborative effort. It is. And it began to set a better tone.

But we also acknowledged the fact that it was the beginnings of this working relationship, and that we would very likely have to reopen that MOU so that we -- we'd have this little bit of time that we could reflect on it and say, "Wait a minute. We want to take a look at this, and let's have a deeper discussion about this."

And let's be honest. As I said before, we have a new cabinet secretary. So I think it merits that conversation with the new cabinet secretary. through the MOU, and for the long term fix it statutorily, to me that's a more collaborative and positive route to go, that I do have a concern that -- twofold, that by asking for the review -- or whatever, that it could potentially set a tone with the cabinet secretary or those at PED that here we go again. COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: Well, I've stated back in May and I've stated it last week -- or last month -- and I've stated it again. I believe most of that MOU is -- violates statute and violates the Constitution.

The Commission was set up to collaborate, yes, with the PED. That has not happened in the 20 years that this Commission has existed, since the constitutional amendment was changed.

The intent, I believe of the Legislature in changing the statutes was very clear in that the use of the 2 percent for activities within PED that do not directly support this Commission or CSD, they support schools, is in violation of statute, because it says for administrative support of the Commission and the division, not for administrative support of the schools or other activities that PED does.

I believe there is a statutory constitutional question whether or not the MOU has any legally enforceable part to it, other than we want to work together.

Like I've said, we've talked about this earlier today. When we were looking at the statute that states our budget is supposed to go to the PED supported. By line item, we weren't given that.

So even now, I believe -- I don't believe it is the Secretary's responsibility to babysit the systemic issues that I think we were trying to address in trying to go to -- with the writ. That writ -- I don't think -- because it preceded multiple secretaries. You know, Commissioner Gipson said, you know, she's been under six different cabinet secretaries. I've been on this Commission under five cabinet secretaries in a little over four years.

This preceded us. And so there's a systemic issue within PED to hold on to this money.

The Legislature -- and I've talked with legislators. They say it is the -- we just had a ruling from the Supreme Court that only the legislature can appropriate funds. These funds have never been appropriated to the PED for use other than administrative support to us, administrative support to CSD, which means you have some budget support to us, you have some budget support and IT support to them, you have human resources that supports them.

Other than that, they can't hire IT technicians that handle the computers in the

43

unchanged and get submitted to the Legislature, that has not happened. It did not happen this year; it did not happen last year or any years I've been on the Commission.

It still is not happening. I have not seen a budget for the 2022-2023 fiscal year. I have not seen a budget.

And that budget should have been approved by this Commission back in July so it could be given -- or at least by the early -- middle part of August -- so it could be given to the PED so they could include it.

But that hasn't been followed. That's statute. Saying, "Well, we want to work with them and everything," that's fine. But it's not happening. Even after we put the MOU in place, we didn't submit a budget. They didn't submit a budget on our behalf. And so even with an MOU in place, I feel that it's not happening.

And we got a report two months ago that they spent over \$1 million, and we still -- I have not seen anything. I don't see anything on the agenda today that's going to explain how that over \$1 million was spent by category, by, you know, what personnel was supported, what functions were

offices. They can't hire budget folks that help the school.

That's my interpretation of administrative support. And that's why I wanted the Attorney General to say, "Yeah. You know what? What you're putting in there" -- and you're giving them -- we're basically appropriating funds to PED from Charter Schools that only the Legislature can appropriate.

So we've taken a position of appropriation that is extra-constitutional, which is the Supreme Court just ruled even the Governor doesn't have that authority. So I'll leave it at that.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: That's cool. I'll admit that I didn't read all of the annual reports.

THE CHAIR: Shame on you.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: I know. But what I did do is ask Director Chavez if there's anything that's red-flagged that we should be super duper aware of at this point and was told, really, no, that there was no data from the last two years.

I mean, so many things have been kind of wackadoodle that, really, it's just a matter of at this point resetting and then really being vigilant going from this day forward.

THE CHAIR: You're correct. And, actually, this is like the final thing, because we've had the reports for a while. So, yeah. The onus is on us as we get more data, when they're first posted to take a look at them, and certainly reliance to some extent on the Director and the Division to highlight. But for us to look at them and -- so that we can set it apart before we take

And I guess the final thing I'd like to say is that we postponed this item on the October agenda, as you recall, because we wanted to make sure that the leaders had a chance to review them. So I had a staff person on the team that actually called each school leader on the phone to say, "Just want to make sure you know where these are, that you've had a chance to read them, and that we corrected the items that were in need of correction, if they needed correcting."

So just wanted to make sure that was on the record.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Because that kind of leads us into Item No. 7, Discussion and Possible Action to Approve the Amended Annual Records for McCurdy and Walatowa, because last -- last year -last month -- we approved the renewing schools' annual reports. But that is reflective of the conversation and some changes that needed to be made. So we removed them from that agenda item.

So we've got those two items.

Commissioner Burt?

COMMISSIONER BURT: Thank you. That's what I was going to -- I was actually going to say. This is reflective of an enormous lift by CSD. I

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Got it. Thanks. THE CHAIR: Yeah. Thanks. Director? DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. I'd just like to say that although they do reflect a modified site visit approach, and the indicators in the

Performance Framework reflect that there are some indicators that we relied on the school to give us assurances that they were in compliance with, and that's how the -- how the indicator chart reads, that we did spend time listening to schools.

We -- as you recall, the PEC approved the modified site visit approach because of the COVID protocol. And so we did, I think, a very good job of listening to the schools and documenting their COVID stories.

And for me, when I -- as I'm still learning about all of the schools, we have so many in our portfolio, and sometimes I forget what grade levels they serve or what their mission statement is or maybe who the leaders are, I reference these reports. And so I just wanted to underscore that there is some valuable information within the reports, and so I hope that you find them useful as well.

mean, we went to double-S on the list; right? Like, that's a lot of schools for CSD to go out and do this modified site visit with.

And I know -- this is the one thing that -- especially during COVID -- right? -- and especially, like, everyone -- like, I think you even had a shortened time frame to be able to do it compared to normal years. So to do all of these schools with a small staff, understaffed, it is a big lift.

So I'm really grateful for CSD and all this work, because it is useful. It is useful.

I noticed when -- so when -- I have heard really good feedback about the site visits from last year. Like, when I've talked to charter leaders, when I've seen -- like, there's been opportunities for them to give feedback. And I consistently see, "We really enjoyed this modified site visit. We liked the sited visits this year," you know.

And so I'm hoping that it isn't just because it was modified. I think -- I'm hoping it's because of the demeanor that came with it as well, because I know next year, it's not going to be modified.

And so I hope that they're still grateful

the way they were this year, you know, in being able to do the extra -- you know, do the more work.

And so I was just wondering if -- I'm sure you heard feedback as well, Director Chavez, about the modified site visits. I don't think I'm wrong in that a lot of the charters, "Yeah, we really liked it. They were great."

What do you think, as a -- as you're looking into now you're coming into 2022, you're going to start looking at next year's site visits already. You just barely got these approved. You've got to start thinking about it again already.

How are going to marry those two? How can you lead the team to get those similar results but still holding, like, these high standards for what you're looking for?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. Thank you, Commissioner Burt.

So earlier today during the Work Session, we talked about plans for revising the Performance Framework and for creating a rubric attached to the Performance Framework.

That didn't exist when I walked in the door. I think that we did lose a couple of staff who were largely responsible for this work, and it

"Well, we learned that home visits was a really important part of our work, and we're going to continue doing that."

So that was very encouraging, and that's captured in these reports.

We also told the schools that, you know, they're modified this year, but in '21-'22, we're going to look at each indicator and give a rating.

So I think, you know, when we look at the Performance Framework as we've talked about before, it's very compliance-heavy. So we can't get around that, because that's the approved contract and performance framework that the schools are under. But we will try to do the review as kindly as possible.

Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Thanks, Director Chavez. Yeah. Because I know I hope they don't think that it's -- you know, that there -- they loved them because they felt like it was less, you know. Like, I think it was -- you know, my -- like I said, I think the demeanor in which you do them makes a difference, too.

So I think the other thing I -- I hope that we consider thinking about the way we look at

remained largely in their head.

So that's -- that's one piece that we definitely need to do is put in writing, how the rating of each of these indicators might be attached to what they would be attached to. So that's transparent both between -- across my staff and with the schools.

That said, you know, I absolutely -- I absolutely think right now is the time for everybody to be kind and gracious with one another, recognizing that we're all suffering through this pandemic and things are tough.

I think that we heard this week Commissioner Chavez talk about it from a superintendent's perspective. And, certainly, we have friends who are in schools, and everybody can attest to the challenges that people face.

When we did the modified site visits, we told the schools, "This year they're modified. We want to do them as quickly as possible, and we want to recognize that COVID has had a huge impact on your school, and we want to hear how you've responded. We want to know what innovations you may have come up with, if any."

And some schools did. They talked about,

these annual reports. And, I mean, this year, we're not getting all the data, you know. I do -- I like data. I like seeing it. I like, you know, having some numbers to look at.

And in the -- so I'm definitely looking forward to next year in getting some more baseline. I know it's going to be a baseline for many schools next year. I'm still looking forward to that.

But I -- I do hope that -- you know, I feel like I'm high on accountability, but high on support on both. And I actually see, like, when you -- you know, if you -- you can hold folks accountable. And I think that's our right, right? That's our job.

But if you -- I think if it's just accountability, yeah, then people feel a little (indicates) you know about it. But I think when you talk to folks about where their weaknesses are, where their areas to grow can be, I think generally educators are particularly welcome for that.

I think we are actually in an industry where people kind of -- they really want to grow. They want to do better. And so, you know, I hope that that's the way we can look at annual reports moving forward is, "Hey, where are these

deficiencies so that we can do that now instead of at renewal"; right?

I feel like renewal time feels so after the fact. So if we can utilize these for that accountability, the compliant, but support as well.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Thank you, Commissioner Burt. And I think that what that comment brings up for me is that when a school gets Working to Meet, it's not horrible. I don't think that Working to Meet is so bad.

And so I do think that it means that it communicates that, yes, we recognize that there's a lack of perfection, and we have reflected that this week, that there is a lack of perfection at times.

And other times when there is perfection, yes, let's celebrate it. But I don't think a Working to Meet is necessarily failure.

THE CHAIR: Thanks. And you're absolutely right. The purpose of the annual reports, and even in the contract, is to hopefully be a little reflective, have a school see what they may need to work a little bit on so that when it gets to renewal time, they're not sitting there and saying, "Oh, my gosh. I didn't know that." That it -- you know, we've tried to make it so that, yeah, you've got

year late or the statewide assessment results don't come out till a year later.

But one of the goals that we have set is to get the reports to schools as soon as we can. And so it is going to require that there is more back-and-forth with the schools as we say, "Okay, this is what we believe is accurate, but if you have evidence otherwise, then, you know, we're willing to change our understanding of that indicator rating."

So -- but to do that as soon as the school ends or as soon as we possibly can once the end of the year happens. And we have to wait till July, because there's things like governing board training that they have until July to complete.

So, yes, thank you.

THE CHAIR: I really appreciate that, because when I first came on the Commission, I was at a conference, and charter leaders were all there. And their biggest complaint was, "It's been two years, and I still don't have my report."

And it's like holy cow, you know. It's like -- because at that time, I didn't even -- because I was brand new, I didn't even know there were annual reports. So it wasn't even something that I knew that I should be looking for.

your annual report.

You know, really, by looking at that, you should know where you sit now in terms of your renewal four years from now, three years from now, two years from now, and, you know, clearly make any adjustments that you need to.

And if we need to say, "Oh, how could we help that out?" Because we see that this is a common throughout a lot of the annual reports. So is there something we can help out with and say, "Let's offer this support, because clearly there's something that, you know, must be, you know, needed."

So, hopefully, we look at it that way, too, as reflective of us and what we can do.

And then it's like, well, you know, there -- it's two years' backlog. And they were equally as backlogged on -- and now it's because site visit reports hadn't gone out.

So you can't do an annual report without the site visit reports. That's when Commissioner Voigt was in the trenches with a school. So she was probably one of those angry voices.

All right. We are on to Item No. 11, which is the Charter School Survey Regarding Working Group to Look at the Academic Performance Indicators.

I don't know if, Commissioner Voigt, you want to take that?

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Let me refocus. So the Charter School Division had sent out a survey to all charter leaders in the state, district, and PEC-authorized. The results that they got back have been reflected on a PowerPoint.

And -- but the section that we will be working with the Commission will be specifically the Academic Performance Framework.

And within the survey, a question was asked as to how many charter leaders would be

that -- I don't know that we intended to send it to all charter leaders, but we did, and maybe someone forwarded it. So we ended up separating out the State charter school responses in the PowerPoint. And there were 38 State-authorized charter leaders who responded to the survey.

And we asked them about networking and peer learning, because I know that that is one of the important practices that I've heard PEC say and that we understand we want to bring forward.

And so leaders talked about roundtable sessions that would focus on engaging with equity councils. Equity continues to be an area of interest by school leaders.

The majority are in favor of the Charter Schools Division providing some network opportunities. And we asked about the frequency. And so at least once a month and up to three times a month was what they suggested.

We asked what other topic areas that they would be interested in discussing, and they talked about how to better utilize nondiscretionary waivers, financing a new school building, how to recruit and retain social workers and school counselors, and support in managing all of the

interested in participating in a working task force to develop metrics around the academic performance indicators.

There was approximately nine charter leaders that expressed interest in being on that task force.

Three Commissioners have expressed interest in being on the task force: Myself, Chair Gipson, and Commissioner Carrillo. We will be meeting with the probable facilitator of the task force next week, which would be Tony Monfiletto of Future Focused Education. You all met him through a presentation a couple of months ago.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: You know, I think what we were saying about support also, and within the framework itself, is how we can measure quality and spend more time looking at quality versus compliance; and so getting more schools to hone in on that aspect of -- of, you know, at least within self-reflection, but looking at quality within their schools, us looking for quality and spending more time on that instead of just looking at -- checking off the boxes, basically.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yeah. And maybe I'll just, like, finish the discussion on Slide 17, if you happen to be looking at it.

We asked leaders, "What do you excel at?"

And so I think it's important for us to know that leaders say that they excel at finding support and being decisive so things keep moving. And there are some leaders that say they excel at

shows where our areas that we need support in are." And so I loved that -- I heard Director Chavez say, "So maybe we need to look at where they're doing really well and excelling as well, like, to where they can show both."

I'm a little cautious of making it to where -- I don't want to take away from finding the areas they need support in as well. So if what is currently there is identifying where they need support, I'm hoping that, you know, we can see -what we can add to it or what -- what may be -- you know, maybe there's things that are a little extraneous. But what can we add to it in order to show those successes in other ways as well?

But I don't want to lose -- I mean, we really shouldn't see everyone doing well on the Academic Performance Framework. Like, you know what I mean? Like, we can't end up with, "Oh, well, we can't" -- every school does have good things. Even schools that have been revoked, schools that have been non-renewed have done things well at times. Or they had something that they did well.

But, overall, you know, they didn't do other things well. And so we have to also acknowledge those. Like, we can't get rid of the

parent and community interaction, or prioritizing their work, time management, leadership and staff development, strategic planning, performance frameworks, communication and working well with others. So just something to celebrate with our leaders.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Super. Thanks. And thanks so much for getting that out and bringing all that data back. I'm excited about this work.

THE CHAIR: So I guess the -- the only other item is looking at a timeline as to --

COMMISSIONER BURT: I'm really looking forward to this work as well. I'm thrilled that it's not us making the decision, that we're bringing in folks. That's the way we're moving on this. I think that's how we should move on a lot of big things that actually impact the charters is bring the charter leaders in and talk to them and work with them on it. So I'm excited about that.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: I agree. And I do remember. Thanks for jarring my memory, because I'm kind of brain dead right now. But I do remember that, that we talked about methodically and, you know, giving it a lot of thoughtful work instead of trying to bang it out and rush this through three months.

Does that sound familiar, Corina?

possibility there is as a separate indicator, or repeating something like how many times do we want to ding a school for getting an audit finding.

MS. JULIA BARNES: I want to say something, and it might -- you might say, "Please don't start this again."

There's a technical revision of the contract. That's going to go along one process as fast as they can.

We could leave -- we could get that finished as fast as we could so that that portion of the negotiation could take place. It doesn't take a long time. It's really confirming that everyone's on board with what's in there.

We could leave the academic section blank. And that could actually -- if their board is comfortable with that, you could have Part 2, say,

June 1st. And they could be the first contract negotiations under the work from your task force, and we could drop that in there.

So we could have a technical one so their contract is in place; their boards could have looked at it; they know what's going to happen; they just don't know what the academics are. And then have Part 2, drop it in, and they just vote on the whole thing.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: I think that would be great. I don't know if the schools would bring that much loose trust to the table. You know what I mean?

MS. JULIA BARNES: Okay.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: It seems like they could.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: A couple of things. So I think Chair Gipson is absolutely right. As soon as we possibly can, we should be talking about creative goal setting, because I think that we saw in the last contract negotiations maybe a need for expansive thinking around that that everybody could benefit from.

The second point I want to make is, Julia, the last -- the last attorney that -- for the PEC

it was thought through. And it lasted more than one month. And there was -- there was some careful thinking in it.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Yeah. Got it. DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: But it was designed specifically so that the Performance Framework was an attachment.

And I think the other part that I wanted to say is that, you know, with COVID, I have networked a little bit with other authorizers and saying, "What are you doing? What are you doing?"

And they talk about amending their contract or Performance Framework in a way that we put forth. And you all approved the modified site visit reports for schools. In a sense, this notion of amending a contract because things change is commonplace with authorizers in the agreements they have with a school.

And the way that it was reworked is that the Performance Frameworks are actually an attachment to the contract; so you can sign the contract and amend the attachments, potentially; right?

THE CHAIR: Right. I just need to clarify that the Commission voted on the contract, so that it wasn't just a unilateral, an attorney came in and made the changes to the contract.

But it's the world we live in. Every time we make a change, this chunk of schools has, you know, these slight nuances in them. But I -- I think at this point in time, you know, if a school wants to say, "No, I like this. I'm going to stick with the old one, let's go forward," fine.

And then if a school wanted to say, "Okay, I'll give you that little bit of extra time and we'll do it this way," then let them do it.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Yeah. That sounds fine. It's flexibility on both sides.

That's the problem, you know, this whole shift that has to happen and trickle down to every classroom because of new administration. That's a problem, always has been, in education.

After they -- we just renewed them for five years; right? If this is not done in time for them to have that contract in place for their next five years, they can choose to opt in after a year into their current contract.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay.

THE CHAIR: I mean, to allow them that flexibility that -- you know, you can either wait and see what the end result is with us by the end of the spring and say, okay, we'll do contract -- contract negotiations.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: And so it gives them the choice to say, "You know what? I like it. I'm opting in."

Or, "You know what? That -- I'm happy where I'm at."

So -- so, anyway, yeah, it takes a lot of fleshing out.

I want to make just a couple of notes. And one goes back to the SEG conversation about administration.

That second bolded statement, "We support increases in the SEG that put more caring adults in New Mexico classrooms," this is speaking to that tension that's out there right now.

Commissioner Burt noted, you know, there isn't a lot of appetite to have more administrative layer in any of our schools right now. And the result is, without additional administrators and a lot of new mandates on schools, teachers are bearing the brunt more than ever. And what we really need to do is find -- find creative ways to bring additional caring adults into the classroom.

And we have a number of charter schools that do that. We have schools that have initiated operations fellowships for seniors at UNM. And those folks are taking care of a number of the facets of running a school that teachers kind of take on.

Roots & Wings, one of your schools, has created a position just to take off -- to take off all those layers that teachers have to take on that aren't teaching a classroom.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. You're okay to start.

MR. MATT PAHL: Okay. Thank you, sorry. I think my volume wasn't on. One, just thanks everyone for participating in the conference. The hybrid nature of it was -- had some pros and cons. You know, we were able to keep some of the crowds smaller, which was good. But I think people were eager for a little more personal interaction.

But having the sessions be virtual allowed for a number of school staff to join that don't normally get to come to our conference that can't leave the school for a whole day but might be able to see one session.

We had upwards of 70 people in many of our sessions, and we really just want to thank you all for joining.

I know I was at the Albuquerque reception, and I saw Commissioner Voigt and Commissioner Burt there. That was a lot of fun.

We had folks from PED. Just want to thank everybody for participating who was able to.

On the policy platform, I know -- I think you all have seen it, because I heard you refer to it during your conversation during the Work Session. So transitions, lunch duty, bus duty, all of that, one person can take care of all of that and take the whole thing off of teachers.

Granted, that's a very small school. But one person is able to do it there.

We have been fighting a losing battle on the budget for at least the last five years in public education, where it's always been about covering the expenses for insurance, making sure we have enough money in for teacher salary.

All of that is true, and we want that. The problem is we're not getting any extra that gives us some flexibility with how we run our schools.

So that's our strategy in trying to just, like, ease the burden on the people who are feeling this so hard right now.

The other thing I would just note would agree with a lot of the conversation on teacher salaries just making sure that this sticks is important.

The other one that I just know was I know there was some conversation on the -- the adults in education and getting funded for that. We agree. I mean, the age cap should have never happened. And

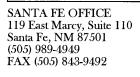
