MS. JULIA BARNES: I think, actually, I'll back up just a little bit for Commissioner Chavez.

The short version of yesterday is we had hoped to have an agreement with the PED on the rule language, and that did not happen. So we're just looking at what options you want to take today, given that.

So I've put two documents in the folder for today. One is language that I think the Executive Committee would have -- it does find acceptable and would have recommended it to you all as a Commission.

The second document is slightly changed with what the -- I don't know. But think that PED might find acceptable.

So on the first document, I think you have a series of options, and maybe more that you can think of. But these are what I've drafted.

First is that you conditionally adopt the

of those, so I'm just trying to give you things that came to my mind.

The next one moves to the second document, adopting the 6.b. version. And my suggestion is, because I don't agree that they could just move forward to finalize it, that PED staff and PED counsel finalize that and defend any challenge, if there is one.

The next one would be just, you know, the -- the -- the timing issue for the rule is we wanted to get through all of the forms in year one. And we're losing that time the longer we wait.

And the Executive Committee and the Chair have asked not to move forward with any of the document approvals till the rule was, but -- and so there's a time -- I appreciate that sentiment, and it's starting to put a timing issue on us.

So one suggestion would be just -- start the approval process. I'm sorry. (Inaudible) Thank you for that suggestion.

The next one -- so this one would be just -- I suggest don't adopt a process -- or just adopt a process for this year, getting documents finalized as quickly as we can. I've put two possible dates: July 1 for as many as can be done;

rule and ask the Chair to send a formal request to have the Secretary sign jointly and finalize the rule that the PEC finds acceptable.

If the Secretary agrees, we would move -you would move forward with the rule. If the Secretary didn't, the Chair would be directed under the MOU to request mediation.

I've had to do it conditionally adopted, because once you adopt a rule you only have 14 days to move it towards finalizing it. So there's a dealing with the State Rules Act a little bit.

A second option, I think, would just be to ask for mediation under the MOU, take no action on any rule but to say, "We're going to trigger the MOU in a more formal way."

I will note that the MOU identifies many of the things that we have identified as giving you authority. It's just consistent with what we've been talking about.

A third option would be to adopt the rule, ask the Secretary to do it jointly, and, if not, ask the Chair to just move forward. Jointly would be the first preference; singly would be the option if the Secretary didn't decide to do that.

Again, I think that you could combine some

December for the final date for all documents for the school -- the schools. That would be consistent with our conversations yesterday to do a contract and a Performance Framework and a possible process on decision -- high-stakes decision-making.

So we would -- you would just move to move ahead with that process. And then you can request a letter to the Attorney General, because we have so many opinions on so many sides about what we're supposed -- you're supposed to do or not do, and do you have to do it, and you don't have to do it.

And so the Attorney General has already been asked once, and you could submit that directly to the Attorney General and request a resolution of it, because I think you're in a position where it's hard to know where you're supposed to go.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Just a quick question regarding the AG, Ms. Barnes. What's a -- I mean, what's the timeline on them? They could just --

MS. JULIA BARNES: They could do nothing. They've already done nothing for three years.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Yeah.

MS. JULIA BARNES: Right. No one has ever responded to the Senator's request previously.

However, the thinking is -- my thinking on this motion would be you're going to move forward on the thing we wanted to try to do for this first year.

We're just going to start doing it. And then -- and then a letter to the Attorney General with a second request.

And it's even not outside of the realm of possibility to also see if secretary -- Senator Ivey-Soto would also make a request. Chairs can make a request. Senators, Representatives can make a request.

Does the Attorney General have to act? No.

Is it an election year with a lot of things going on? Yes.

So I don't know what the Attorney General would do.

You are, however, in a position that you've just got a bunch of different lawyers you could pick from. And that was -- I mean, I think it's been clear for months that that's true.

So that's one of your options, I think.

There may be a way to give them an opportunity to respond in January. But, if not, we've got to move everything back as one of the possible options.

So I think you can talk about it next month. But what I don't want is for you-all to be at a meeting in December with no ability to do anything other than approve a charter. And you sometimes do want to add a condition that day.

So we've got to tie the court decision and those requirements into your process. And I think discussing it in April would work.

The Commission has a precedent of asking schools to extend a deadline on things. I -- I can't cite exactly how far of a deadline. But there have been times when we've asked schools if a decision that is written in statute could be extended, and the schools have agreed to that, understanding the process and the reason behind it.

I think that if this is something that is new because of the judge's decision and something that we have to do, I would ask us to think about all the different options, and potentially pushing it forward might make sense.

Keeping in mind that the current timeline for the renewals that occurred -- you know, we're

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So I have not

proposed any changed language. This is exactly what is current.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. And has Ms. Barnes proposed any changes? Or is she --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: There has been no discussion about changing the language.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Terrific. So--line -- "The agreement shall terminate on June 30th, 2022, unless..." -- should it say "extended"? I mean unless terminated pursuant to paragraph 4 or paragraph 5, appropriations which we don't have that.

And then -- so there's that question of, I mean, by what means do we extend it?

And the other question would be is -- what is a normal -- is four -- four years seems excessive in terms of a contract. Is that normal with State contracts or -- you know? Just curious. 'Cause then you have to buy out a contract if you're not happy; right?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So if I may? Commissioner Carrillo, that is why each year, we have to approve it for the next year. So all this is saying is that you can continue to extend the Commissioners. And if we do it for four years,

basically any new Commissioners that come on are locked into what was done previously.

And, again, I don't see a reason for extending it for four years when a two-year or perhaps even a one-year, and then let the Commissioners next year, any new Commissioners that can -- along with any current Commissioners, can go ahead and extend it for two years at that time.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Robbins, Director Chavez is going to clarify, because that's not the correct information.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So if I may, Commissioner Robbins, we're making a decision to extend for a year. I wanted you to know that.

COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: Okay.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: The existing contract allows for annual extensions up to four years before we go through the RFP process, which we did prior to Ms. Barnes becoming the PEC attorney. And that's an extensive process.

So I'm not anticipating that we are going through that process again. But should you decide that that's what you wanted to do, we would need to start immediately. Otherwise, we would need to

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extend the contract for one year. And every fiscal year, we have to go through the extension process once again.

COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: And I appreciate that clarification. I think the one-year extension is fine.

I do have a concern, as I expressed a year ago, that this contract is between PED and our attorney. Again, we're basically subjugating ourselves under PED authority. They are administrative support. They are not the governing authority over PEC.

And I just have a concern, when a contract -- because we -- we have the ability to enter into contracts. I mean, every charter school we have, we have a contract. So we have the ability to directly contract with the attorney.

It's fine if PED Purchasing wanted to look at it to make sure everything is in order. But I have a great concern of everything being done under the authority of PED, because that subjugates us.

Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Commissioner Voigt. Then Commissioner Davis.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Thank you,

I also agree with Commissioner Voigt. I think Ms. Barnes has done an exceptional job of building relationships, I think, with PED. But also I think one of the things that I've noticed is the -- is a very big change is building the bridge with the attorneys for the charter schools.

I think they came in -- she came into them feeling very unheard, unwelcome, not listened to, and has been able to -- and has been working diligently to change that demeanor to where it feels more collaborative to them.

But I do still believe she does an exceptional job of upholding PEC standards and representing the PEC and the accountability authority that we have to exude as well.

So I know this goes both ways. Not only do we have to, you know, extend it; but she also has to accept our extension.

So I think that's also -- I do just want to -- I -- I -- I'm -- I -- I really am looking forward to, you know, her accepting it and working out the rest of this year as Chair with her, because we really are working on trying to figure out collaborative approaches and time frames and timelines, and we do have more work to do on that.

Madam Chair.

I just want to say that, you know, our -our current attorney has been the most -- since I've
been on the Commission -- the most transparent and
collaborative of -- that I've seen thus far. And I
think that in her first year, she has really forged
through to try to build relationships and
congeniality between the Commission and the PED. I
think it can only get better going another year.

And there's not a line around the corner of attorneys willing to apply for this position. So I think, you know, we have an experienced attorney; we have someone who has a history with charter schools. And I think that Ms. Barnes has done a stellar job, a lot in this past year.

So I -- I am feeling the pain of, you know, people like Debbie are very difficult to replace. Very glad for you for your new opportunity, but -- you deserve all the things -- all the good things in the world. But I do understand the -- the heartbreak that it does cause for CSD.

So congratulations in your new role. Wish you all the best. They're going to be -- they're going to be very lucky to have you there.

Commissioner Voigt.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Oh, I just want to

1 THE CHAIR: Can you come -- and now you 2 have to start over.

MS. DEBBIE DOLBOW: Thank you. I really appreciate the kind words. It's been a pleasure. It's been an interesting journey. I don't come from the world of education. I come from the corporate world. And it's -- so it's been a little different. And -- but it's been exciting for the last four and a half years, and never a dull moment. And I'm hoping that some of the things that I've done will have some lasting -- some -- will have some lasting, positive changes for the PED and for education in New Mexico and for the children of New Mexico.

So thank you, and it's been quite the experience.

(Applause.)

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: One final thing about Ms. Mortpadilla. She and I were talking earlier about the fact that we hadn't typically served coffee at the PEC meetings. And Ms. Mortpadilla has formerly worked with the Santa Fe Chamber of Commerce.

And she said, "Oh, Ms. Chavez, you need to give the Commissioners coffee."

So thank you so much, Trish. I think

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you're steering us in the right direction already, and we're so glad you're here.

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So that's the staffing update. We have a couple of -- so we are still in the process of trying to fill the Charter Schools Division -- the Charter Schools Program Grant Manager position, the position that Dr. Russell held previously. So that's open.

Pretty soon we will have a Bus Ops position posted. There are three other positions that are in the works and will be posted. So send people our way, once again. As these positions are posted, I'll circulate them to Commissioners and to folks so that -- publish to -- publish it with the listservs that we have so that people can spread the word and bring us good people.

The team is fabulous. We do really important work, and we look forward to additional folks joining our team.

I think I gave an update on the annual site monitoring already. So I'm going to skip that and go on to the 2022 Charter Schools Conference.

We set the dates for June 9th and 10th. So please, Commissioners, mark your calendars. That conference is -- planning is in the works. So we

let's all root for Ms. Porter. I know she does a great job at the school, and I think that's wonderful that she's been nominated.

The other school that I want to highlight is SODA, Schools of Dreams Academy, where a staff member submitted a \$4.3 million proposal to add a pre-K program to the school. And it was approved by -- by the entity that approves it this past Monday. So the school is awaiting an award letter. They're expanding their services to serve younger kids, and we're thrilled about the fact that our schools continue to meet the needs in the community.

And so that's my presentation. Thank you. THE CHAIR: Thank you. All right. That moves us to Item No. 10, Report from PEC Liaisons.

For LESC and LFC, they have not met yet, so I have no new news.

Commissioner Armijo.

COMMISSIONER ARMIJO: Yes. So I missed our first meeting of the Indian Education Advisory Council, and I felt really bad about it. But I was able to find out -- they do a very good job of updating all of the members.

So they are looking for people to fill some positions. And they're looking for consultants

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are also welcome to ideas. We hope that you will be at the conference. We anticipate that it will be some sort of a hybrid with at least one opportunity for people to be physically in the same space. So stay tuned on more -- on that conference. But please also mark your calendar.

So that's a Thursday-Friday, June 9th and 10th.

All right. And so, finally, I want to just give a couple of highlights on some charter schools and to thank Ms. Mari for helping me get information in place.

So one of the schools that I'd like to mention is a school that you recently renewed. New America School-Las Cruces has just a tremendous -her title is "superintendent," but head administrator in Ms. Margarita Porter. She has been nominated by the National Alliance for Public Charter Schools as a change-maker for making positive impact on public charter education in their communities.

So the National Alliance will announce their final awards on May 8th. But it's a huge honor to know that one of our charter leaders was nominated for this really prestigious award. And so who will create and develop digital online Diné language and cultural resources for students and teachers. And the resources will be housed at the Navajo Nation website.

And the requirements are schoolteacher or DL teacher knowledgeable of Navajo culture and capable of reading and writing Diné.

Let's see. The other one is -- they're looking for consultants who can strategize and plan and develop and create a Diné language instructional guide utilizing the curriculum framework, develop a Diné cultural resource kit for classrooms and students, and prepare a study guide for New Mexico 520 license certification program by September 7th, 2022.

So they are seeking some people there. And I will have more information when I attend a meeting.

20 THE CHAIR: Thank you. Commissioner 21 Voigt. 22

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: I have e-mailed Mr. Stan Rounds to try to meet and/or attend a New Mexico Coalition of Educational Leaders meeting and have heard nothing back yet. And there's really

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nothing posted on their website about upcoming events. So at this moment, I am -- I'm holding.

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THE CHAIR: Commissioner Robbins. COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: I'll be brief. PSCOC is looking at ways to help charter schools. Now, the Legislature did pass authority for the New Mexico Finance Authority to offer loans up to \$10 million in total; not per school, but in total. That's kind of a drop in the bucket, but it is a help.

They also -- the Legislature passed and, the Governor signed, the elimination of the wording in terms of classroom space. So now a charter school will receive the whole lease assistance per MEM, per student, up to their lease amount. So if you calculate right now about \$762 per student, so a school that has 100 students would get about \$76,000 a year.

But if you have a school that the lease costs \$90,000, you still only get the \$762,000 -- so -- not 700-, but the \$76,000. But there's still a big gap when the average district in the state is spending close to \$3,000 per student per year on capital. And some of the better-off districts -and that's their own money. That's their own money.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Commissioner Manis.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: I do not have an update at this time, as I was unable to attend the last NMPSIA board meeting. The next meeting will be on April 7th.

THE CHAIR: All right. Thank you. Commissioner Carrillo.

One of the things that was occurring to me relative to this -- and I'm seeing this as my kind of former position on the Santa Fe Public Schools board -- I mean, I really think if they were open to it, boards around the state could learn a lot from the work that we do, especially the accountability measures, performance frameworks innovation, if they were open to the idea that someone may have answers other than themselves. I just think they could really learn a lot and elevate the level of innovation, thinking, and performance. But they're such -- my experience, at

Better-off districts are spending \$5,000 or \$6,000 per year per student. So still working on trying to get a little movement there.

Albuquerque Sign Language is proposing a \$23 million building on land that the county owns. It would be a great facility. They'd be able to increase their enrollment to about 200 students; right now, they're capped at about 100, because of their space. But with the match that APS has right now, they'd have to come up with 77 percent of that cost. Next year, the match goes to 85 percent local match.

Waivers are not allowed if -- or limited to help out schools, especially as they've been included in the capital bonding of the local school district. So if -- let's just say if APS decided to do a bond and include \$10,000 for Albuquerque Sign Language, by our current rules, they would not be eligible for a waiver. So you couldn't waive that 77 percent.

So there's some sticking points here. And I think there's more to be done to make things equitable on a capital basis. But we'll continue to push forward on it.

Thank you.

least the last time at the conference, is there was such close-mindedness. But we'll see.

THE CHAIR: All right. Thank you.

Commissioner Taylor.

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. I -- I have no report as I have not met with the Library Commission as yet. So...

So the first is Report on Newer Updated PEC School Issues.

The only thing that's really come up in the past month, which has come up in the past month and already been resolved, is there was a delay in the CSP Grant funding. And so schools were reaching out -- grasping at anything they possibly could to try to get that money.

The Director and Dr. Russell both really stepped up and stepped in to advocate for them. And the PED just has some delays in processing in reimbursements to schools. I am sure Commissioner Chavez experiences that sometimes, too. It's not, you know, an isolated incident.

So both -- all of those schools have

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1 received -- they started receiving all that funding.

- 2 That includes -- the ones that felt like they were

MR. MATT PAHL: Hi, Madam Chair. Sorry. I think my computer had some delays, so I wasn't seeing anybody.

Because I'm not presenting to you at 4:00 after a really long day, and I'm not standing

be cut on their lease assistance over time. By eliminating that square footage requirement, we have made it so funding is more predictable, and we should receive those increases to help us afford new leases or lease purchases in the future.

On the revolving loan fund.

At the Legislature, the hardest thing to do is to get that fund set up. Commissioner Robbins is right. That \$10 million is not a whole lot of money. But each year we can go back and put in a little bit more and advocate for a little bit more.

The \$20 million facility for ASLA is really great and amazing. It's also a very expensive charter school facility. Most of our charter facilities are between \$7 million and \$15 million. And what this does is it just provides a refinancing mechanism. NMSA will not be making construction loans.

And I have a slide that I'd like to show you, just in case this isn't your -- your world necessarily. I'd just like to share a scenario, that, if you've touched charter school facilities, you'd know that no facility scenario is the same from one another.

But in this example, you know, we have

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immediately between you and lunch, I'll give you a more thorough update than I normally do. That includes, as Commissioner Robbins mentioned -- and I

So Commissioner Robbins mentioned House Bill 43. That's a bill we've been working on for three years and really came -- everything came together really in a nice way.

won't pontificate. But I do have some updates.

As Commissioner Robbins mentioned, don't be mistaken. Facility funding is not equal between traditional public schools and charter schools. What this does is it maximizes the current scenario for charter schools, you know.

We had a -- as Commissioner Robbins mentioned, there was this policy regarding square footage that had been damaging to charter schools and was set up to do more damage with each passing year. That per-student allocation that Commissioner Robbins mentioned should be increasing with the consumer price index every year. It hasn't.

But this year, we are going to be pushing hard for that. And each year that that distribution mechanism increased, it would put more schools into a square footage scenario. And so we'd find with each passing year that more and more schools would

1 Charter School A in a lease purchase agreement,

2 meaning they're currently making payments to own

3 their facility eventually. An \$8 million facility. 4

They put a million dollars down in this scenario. They have a 20-year financing package at 5 percent

interest. And the school serves 440 students.

So that's kind of our scenario.

In the current scenario, they have a \$46,000 lease purchase payment each -- each year. Their lease assistance covers 59 percent of their annual costs. And they're -- and as a result, they have to dip into their operational funds.

And this is very common, and this is really what makes our current funding scenario unequal. In this scenario, which is made up, they spend \$225,000 from their operational funds just to pay for their building.

If they were to tap into the revolving loan fund from NMFA, their percent interest is going to be somewhere -- interest rates are increasing. But if, in prior years, a 5 percent rate, that would be pretty hard to get on the private market. NMFA loans are around 2 and a half percent.

So under this scenario, their monthly payment goes down by almost \$10,000. By \$9,000. So

\$37,000.

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They are paying far more towards principal, so paying down this building much faster. They're only using \$116,000 in operational.

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And this really underlines the opportunity here by allowing that revolving loan fund, because at the end of the day, this school has 109,000 extra dollars in operational that they can put towards something in their school.

We had a training yesterday that was just recapping the Legislative Session. It's a simple extrapolation to hope finances, really, a lower interest rate really helps you.

NMFA, because this is a specific loan fund for charter schools, they're going to be able to create terms that are beneficial to the charter school. If you've been following this for a while, at one point, we were proposing that this would be part of the Public Project Revolving Loan Fund. The reason why it's not is because those bondholders in the PPRF have certain expectations that may create terms that were not advantageous to our school.

Because it's purpose-built for our schools, we'll take advantage of those low interest rates and have terms that work for our schools based

vou read the editorial from Kate Noble in the Santa Fe New Mexican, or the article in the Albuquerque Journal about future issues around staffing at APS and Santa Fe Public Schools, I'll just -- I'll just note that this has been a problem with every salary increase that we've had over the last eight years.

Charter schools have felt it most harshly because we don't have the scale to be able to float money, or there's just less flexibility in the way that we are -- we are operating. So we've felt the pain of past salary increases and not having enough money in there.

This salary increase is so big -- and worthwhile; we should be paying our educators this much -- it's so big that even large districts are going to feel it this time.

And I'm sure, Commissioner Chavez -- I see you nodding your head -- it's going to be a tough thing to turn here.

And I'll just say from the charter -- from a charter school advocacy perspective, it's going to be helpful that school districts are feeling the pinch a little more, too. We've shown that we can work together in a lot of ways. And I think in the

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on realities of lease assistance.

The lease assistance bill itself will increase distributions in lease assistance by 4 percent next year. Hopefully, we get another 7 percent on top of that because of CPI.

And I know Commissioner -- well, whatever it is in July when they make the decision. But 7 percent might be low, based on what's happening right now.

So that's -- that's really encouraging. And every time we get an increase in lease assistance, many of our schools are locked into their lease. So that means an increase in lease assistance will provide for more operational funds to help them out with -- with achieving their mission.

So with that, while -- during your meeting, the unit value just came out. There is an increase of 12.09 percent. I will say that is a positive surprise. We were prognosticating anywhere between 10 and 11 percent, based on what we were seeing.

I still think the salary increases are going to be difficult for a number of our schools to make. We'll have more information on that soon. If past, some of our school districts are -- you know, it's just kind of a blip on the radar.

But this seems like we're all going to be hurting for it. Teachers deserve to be paid more. That's not what's at issue here. Funding it appropriately is what's at issue here. So I think this opens up a larger conversation in the future.

We -- let's see -- yeah. I mean, I think, like, if you're talking to schools right now, that is the thing on their mind. We've experienced a real sea change in what our reality was once the mask mandate was lifted. We're seeing a reduction in burden on testing, all of those things.

It's starting to feel like school again in a way that it hasn't in a long time. And I'm really hoping that that trends towards really feeling like school in August of next year, and I think our school leaders are, too. They are worried about their budgets. That is just something that -that -- the prevailing concern right now is really focused on this.

All of it was worrying, kind of without the right information. With a unit value, we can now start thinking about what our budget looks like. By the time we meet again with you all, we will have

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gone through the Spring Budget Workshop. Folks will have a much better idea. And I plan on giving an update to you all on just what schools are saying regarding that in the future.

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Those -- the CSP Grants are not the only thing that we're seeing reduction -- or delays in getting funding for. There are RFRs that are outstanding for months. Again, the larger a school district you are, the easier it is to kind of float money and just make sure you'll be okay when you don't get that money.

I think even they're feeling the pain. And we're real small. Small school districts are in the exact same boat as we are. And it's -- it's challenging. And, you know, if we go another month or two on seeing these big delays, I think there's a big question of just how we're going to get all this money by June 30th.

So there's a real -- there's just a real question out there about, you know, turning around the funds through the process that moves through PED. And I know there's an analysis happening right now that -- underlying what the problem is as we see it on the ground.

So a couple of other items.

joining us for this meeting.

I know my attendance at PEC meetings has been spottier than I want it to be. And I think that will be a shared duty. So it'll be someone you'll get familiar with.

Two other items.

Yasine Armstrong, who's on the governing council of Sidney Gutierrez Charter School in Roswell -- they're locally authorized, but they are in the charter community. She's on our board and recently received the 2022 -- one of the Women of Influence awards, along with Jackie Baldwin, who is a charter school leader in Albuquerque.

Just to highlight there that our charter community is getting accolades throughout the state, really cool stuff.

And then, lastly, we are set to film a new campaign. We've been doing monthly videos on charter schools and just highlighting what's going on there.

Our new campaign is going to focus on parents. And the campaign is called, "The Best From Me" campaign and just exploring why parents send their kids to charter schools, what made it make sense for them, because for every family and every

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Public Charter Schools of New Mexico is hiring. We are hiring a Director of School Quality and Support. As you all know, and as I probably repeat enough so everybody knows, I've never run a school. I -- I bring certain background and qualities to this work that I think are good for the org to have. But we really want somebody who's been experienced as a charter school administrator to really be that hotline, someone that a charter school can call and say, "Hey, I got this going on with my governing council," or, "I have a staffing issue."

And so we're -- we are looking for someone that has administrative experience in a charter school to be our -- our Director of School Quality and Support. They will be our fourth team member and really represent us as a full team at Public Charter Schools of New Mexico.

So you'll see that posting floating around. We'll be sending it out through every channel that we have. My goal is to say no to a few people that would be really good in the position, that we've drawn that many quality applicants to this. And so, you know, we're real hopeful that we'll get someone who will be good, and they will be parent, there's a different reason why they end up at the schools they do.

I think that's also true for traditional public schools, you know. When you have choice, you're actively choosing your traditional public school in our current environment, different from the way I grew up where we just went to the school that was assigned.

And I think the goal of the campaign is just showing how that's empowering families to find the right fit for them. I know we have a number of parents lined up that send -- have multiple students. They send one or two of them to traditional; they send a couple to charter. And we really love that story, because it just shows that value adds to the environment. But there's good options -- the right option exists for your kids. So really excited to show you all videos of that in the future. But, yeah, we're kicking off filming later this month.

That's it for my report, Madam Chair. Thank you for having me on the agenda and giving me time.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Mr. Pahl. Is anyone here from the Public Charter

School Advisory Committee online? Once again, it's maybe just way too early. MS. MISSY BROWN: I don't see --THE CHAIR: Okay. All right. Commissioner Carrillo. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Matt, it's nice to see you. How's Van doing? MR. MATT PAHL: He's doing really well. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Good. MR. MATT PAHL: He's about to start moving, so we're recognizing that this is a special time, because things will change once he's mobile. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Neat. So I have a question in maybe -- what are

So I have a question in maybe -- what are we doing as the Commission, the Public Charter Schools of New Mexico, and the PED, around making sure that we're going to be able to pay these teachers?

I've had three letters in this last week, you know, saying, "This is why we voted for you. You need to be our advocate," and, "What are the plans to make sure that districts don't have to cut back -- or charters -- so severely in other areas to meet the pay requirements?"

MR. MATT PAHL: Madam Chair and

next session.

One thing that's going to help folks is they do have federal funds to kind of help bridge. But it's going to be a cliff at some point, whether it's next year or the year after, if you're not -- if you -- if this isn't familiar to you, "hold harmless" goes away next year. So folks that have experienced enrollment drops in the last two years, they'll actually kind of be held accountable for those on the funding side this next year.

There are a lot of issues. And I think they are equally hitting school districts and charter schools.

So if you ask me, which I think you just did, you know, it really is -- we need to really articulate the problem, because I've been at the Legislature enough hearing general complaints. And the folks who have the -- hold the real strings on the budget, they kind of see it as just complaining if we don't go to them with real data and show them what the sacrifices were.

So I think step one is able to happen now with that unit value.

COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ: Matt and Commissioner Carrillo, can I pipe in real quick?

Commissioner Carrillo, I think step one is let's -- like, figuring out what the problem is so we can articulate it. That unit value gives us the ability to see what we actually have to do with the budgets. But we really need to tell the story of what we sacrifice to pay this.

And I'll say, I mean, there's a lot of rumor about a Special Session. There's still a lot of money floating around. You know, if we can really show, across the board -- because I'll tell you. You know, in the past, we've advocated on behalf of, solely, charter schools on this issue.

It doesn't work very well, because in the past, people have just said, "Well, I'm not hearing that from my district. You must be mismanaging your money."

And that's why I highlight again that I think school districts are feeling this pain, and I think if we get together and just show, "Hey, this is the reality of how" -- how -- I mean, I'll just say. I think they're underfunded. So, you know, of how underfunded they are, and we can articulate what we want to close the gap. There's some real possibilities for advocacy, potentially at a Special Session, should it happen, but really coming back

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Of course.

COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ: I know that the Secretary has given an open invitation to all superintendents and charter school leaders to be in communication with him as we start developing the budget. If they're hitting -- you know, if they're falling short, he's extended an invitation to please notify him.

And, you know, we're heading into some uncharted territory here.

Matt, you said it really well. The issue is not the salary increases. The issue is did -- was there enough money there to fund all these increases. And that is where a lot of people are just -- they're just freaking out, because we don't know.

I mean, you're talking some really, really big increases and the impact to the budget. And, Matt, you said it so well also, in that, you know, the smaller you are, the harder the hit it is for you.

And so our charter schools, it'll be interesting to see where they fall with their budgets. But it is going to be a difficult time, I think, and there's a lot of uncertainty. So I think

in the next month, people will have a better idea of -- of where we stand, I know with the release of the unit value.

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And I think you said 12 percent. But that really equates to \$587, I believe, is what they said to the unit value. I don't know if that's enough. You know, there's a lot of uncertainty of whether that is enough.

I know you mentioned federal programs. And some of our schools do receive federal programs. But a lot of the -- a lot of schools use their federal programs money for staffing. And they may not be able to do that as we continue, because there may not be enough monies in those federal programs to continue funding staffing.

And so those might have to be shifted over to operational, which, then, again, it's your operational account, and really hits that unit value.

So a lot of uncertainty. I think the next month is going to be really telling of where -- you know, was there enough money that was allocated to make all these increases.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Yeah. If I could just chime in?

don't know the specificity of need.

And if you can address those specific needs to a specific legislator, that even brings it home more. So that's it. Thanks.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Matt had his hand up.

MR. MATT PAHL: Madam Chair, just something I'd offer, because I think Commissioner Chavez is right, is we'd be happy -- I think the next month is -- we'll know what the reality is. And if you like, I'd be happy to work with Corina or use this agenda item to bring a few schools forward that help articulate what the issue looks at the ground level.

So whether the Executive Committee and the Commission wants to make that a separate agenda item, I'm happy to bring a couple as part of this report to just, hey, because this will be here next month. I mean, we're going to be talking to schools every day about this very issue. So I'm happy to just find a few poignant examples.

COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ: Matt, that's a great idea. I think that would be really good information for the Commission, to hear from two, three, four, different schools and see how their budget is

Okay. Thanks.

You know, it always befalls to the school leader to juggle money and move money around. And, unfortunately, this was an unfunded legislation that came through for -- as a benefit.

But the bottom's going to fall out unless there is some creative financing going forward for the teacher raises, for example.

You know, anytime, with federal money, there's going to be conditions, typically, with federal funding. And it's -- I think the best way to answer your question -- to help answer your question, Commissioner Carrillo, is to know the stories of your schools, because every school is going to have a unique need.

What Turquoise Trail needs for funding for the following school year is going to be drastically different than, you know, a school in the South Valley of Albuquerque.

So it's really good to know what your school specifically needs and then to address that very specifically, other than just saying, "Where is the money coming from, and how can we..." -- you know. Because that's what legislators hear. They hear that broad complaint all the time, but they

falling.

MR. MATT PAHL: Okay.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: So on this -- I think it's important that we do a good job of messages. I think most people believe, "Oh, we gave a big fat raise to teachers. Everything is great now in public ed in New Mexico, and we're going to see these incredible turnarounds."

It's, like, they get big fat everything all the time, but they don't -- they're unfunded mandates, essentially.

And so I think that we really need to message it correctly, as, like, "Yes, that was a great starting point, and now we have to actually see how that money gets to schools without schools..." -- you know -- our charters -- because they're all our kids -- charters and districts, where they're not sacrificing program. Because the teachers don't want them to sacrifice program, either.

Okay. Thank you.

MR. MATT PAHL: Madam Chair, do you mind if I jump in with one more thing -- or two more things?

THE CHAIR: Please do.

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MR. MATT PAHL: One is I do think there is some -- I've been surprised at how much the headlines have been focusing on the 7 percent increase rather than -- I mean, the real -- I mean, it's 15 to 20 percent, which is awesome. We just need to pay for it.

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But there's something weird about the headlines that's been the 7 per- -- like focusing on the 7 percent. Or maybe it's just easier to say "at least the 7 percent."

So, I mean, even just in your conversations, ensuring that people recognize that we're talking about double-digit percentage increases is important.

And then it was something I forgot to write down in my notes.

We are -- and this goes to Commissioner Carrillo's comment about them being all of our kids.

There was an issue down in Las Cruces. The Spaceport dollars had -- and this is for Doña Ana County. And I think it's three counties. Commissioner Chavez will know.

But the money for the last two years had not been getting to the charter schools. And I think that was due to some turnover at the

and, you know, given our current scenario, everybody is scraping for every cent they can.

So really appreciated that mindset from the superintendent down there. And, of course, our schools were amazing in raising the issue of fighting for (inaudible) school district down there. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Thank you, Matt.

superintendent level in Las Cruces. Just, you know, new administration, some things change.

Margarita Porter, who -- her and the group of charter schools down there really spearheaded an effort to engage with the superintendent and the administrations of -- administration of Las Cruces Public Schools.

And I'll just say I was really impressed with the district, because they really had a mindset of, "These are our kids. The money should be going to benefit our kids."

And so not only did they, you know, get themselves figured out for future distributions of that Spaceport dollars, but they also offered the schools to retroactively reimburse them for the money that they had been missing.

And while, to me, that's just doing the right thing, that doesn't always work when we -when we engage with our school districts.

So hats off to Superintendent Ramos down there in Las Cruces and just really impressed with the work of our charter schools for (inaudible).

And the meetings were just really diplomatic and just really good, when, you know, we're talking about tens of thousands of dollars,

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Now we can't hear

him.

THE CHAIR: Hold on. We can't hear you yet.

COMMISSIONER ROBBINS: Okay. I inadvertently turned on my computer mic.

I meant to mention the State Education Network broadband. They are implementing the --PSFA, Public Schools Facility Authority, had an RFP to build out nodes and basically extend the education network, to start building it.

So for this next year, schools will not have to contribute anything if they participate in this towards their E-Rate, which, in total, it's only going to be about \$120,000, \$150,000, but that's a savings to the schools.

And then going forward, they would only be paying what their -- their E-Rate amount would be, so that the Public School Facility Authority, along with the PSCOC, basically is going to cover, this year, 100 percent of the cost of expanding that network, which they estimate this year is about \$3 million. So they're covering the full cost.

In subsequent years, they'll probably cover between 90 and 95 percent of the cost ongoing.

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And, eventually, the goal is to try to connect all the schools on a unified network so that their costs would be lower, their access and their speeds would be higher.

And that would benefit them, because, you know, obviously, you know, if you go into some areas, they have access, but their speeds are very, very slow. So one of the things that this did was actually to set minimum standards on speeds, which will actually improve the broadband connections that schools have.

And over the next three to four years, the goal is to probably have all of the public schools connected.

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THE CHAIR: Thank you. Commissioner Voigt. Then Davis. Then Chavez.

COMMISSIONER VOIGT: Thank you, Madam Chair.

Just wanted to let everyone know, charter school leaders, that the -- the draft of the Revised Performance Framework will be posted on the PEC website by this evening. And so we hope to get a lot of feedback, with suggestions in your feedback, about that revision going forward.

COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Hi. So I've been listening to reports from Ukraine all week. And teachers there are holding class every day, and students are showing up every day. And sometimes class has to be interrupted so they can run to the bomb shelter. Then they return to their class.

And it makes me think that we, here, are a little bit wimpy. So we can't go to school because we have to wear a mask? But students can go to school with bombs falling on their heads.

And so in addition to that, one of the teachers had incorporated media literacy into her classes at all age levels. And I think that's something that we could use here.

So, anyway, I thought those reports were inspiring, and we could probably learn something from war-torn Ukraine.

That's it.

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The PEC project team has a timeline that we want to incorporate as much feedback and input towards the revised document.

So keep a look out for that.

And then, also, in talking with Director Chavez yesterday, a great idea came up. And that was to have some type of collaboration with other statewide authorizers of charter schools. And so I'm going to initiate that, because I think it would be a great forum to share our practices with each other, and our challenges, and to see how we can inspire and grow together as we serve the kids around New Mexico that are choosing small schools.

And in that vein as well, I am going to reach out to some of the charter schools in Albuquerque, the charter school leaders, to see if they would be interested in hosting peer visits at their site of other charter leaders. There's so much that we can learn from each other. And it's always so inspiring and wonderful to leave a charter school and see what great things are going on there.

And so this came about with the visit that I had at the Albuquerque School of Excellence. And it was delightful. The principal there, we discussed doing that as soon as we could,

COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just want to just echo a lot of what's already been said.

But, Director Chavez, I know that you had mentioned the conference in June. Could you -could you make sure that that gets put on the e-mail blast that we get from Judy Robinson? That would be really helpful, because it really gets that word out. And I think it might be helpful as far as attendance for that.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Absolutely. COMMISSIONER CHAVEZ: And I also want to just thank you, Director Chavez, for mentioning Margarita Porter over in Las Cruces. And I've known know Margarita for many years. And the work that she does is -- she's such a committed leader. And so it's -- it's so great to hear that she's been nominated for that -- for that recognition.

Let's see here. I wanted to say that -it's been about three weeks back, the Secretary of Ed had these meetings across the state. And the one that was hosted for this region was over in T-or-C.

But I wanted to say that we had all -- or close to all -- of all of our charter leaders in the southwest area that attended that. And so it was

good to see all of them just come in together and -and just, almost kind of like a show of force, you know. It was great. It was great to see that they were engaging at that level.

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And so, again, I think I've heard several people say there's a lot that we can learn from each other. And that's kind of what I felt when we had that meeting with the Secretary.

And -- and along those lines, I just want to just say, Commissioner Voigt, that's such a great idea of pulling people together and doing visits. Again, there's a lot that we can learn from each other.

I think a lot of times we think we need to go out of state to get those kind of ideas or that kind of exposure. And we have great resources within our state, you know. And I think Commissioner Carrillo had said, you know, we need to just kind of break down those barriers and put our egos aside.

I know he didn't say it like that. But we do. We need to break down those barriers and learn from each other, because ultimately they are all of our kids, and that's why we need to do it. So thank you.

New Mexicans Against Gun Violence had contacted the school and they received a grant to work together with them to create this beautiful mural. And it was unveiled last Thursday.

There were many politicians there, and many of them talked about the gun violence in the area, in Albuquerque, across the state. But one of the things that wasn't mentioned was that -- and I wish I would have got up and said this there -- is that this school basically has been preventing gun violence for the past 20 years, because this school has -- was created to help those kids that were falling through cracks and going to gangs or what have you.

So I just wanted to say that the school, the staff, all of the teachers who are there have really played a part in preventing more gun violence. And I know it's an issue, and I know it's a really huge topic. And it's hard. And we need to come together around that. But I just wanted to say 1 Commissioner Burt.
