## CTE CHAMPIONS Milo McMinn

### Aztec Municipal District: Creating Relevant CTE Pathways by the Book

As the 2022-2023 school year begins, it is a good time to acknowledge the strides being made by students and the CTE programs that support and encourage career development. This month the newsletter focuses on how the Aztec Municipal School District is revamping, expanding, and improving its CTE program. Milo McMinn, the director of Career & Technical Education at Aztec, says the first step he took was to make sure students had opportunities to choose relevant pathways, based on the needs of the Four Corners community. Then, he made sure that a second and third (capstone) course in those pathways was also available.

The alignment of courses to the state-approved programs of study ensured that Aztec students would have the chance to not only concentrate on a career pathway but to complete one before they graduated.

'When it comes to courses and programs of study, we looked at the work that the NMPED has done with Dr. Joseph Goins (CEO of NS4ed, a leader in technology-based career and college education services) to really align our courses to high growth and high wage occupations for our students So really, it's about aligning with those high growth high CTE pathways". He pointed to the website <a href="https://www.CareerPathways-NM.com">www.CareerPathways-NM.com</a> for learning about the local labor market.

McMinn said that one of the most important improvements in their CTE program is having courses aligned to national career clusters, and to state and regional economic priorities. McMinn said this alignment has made it possible for students at Aztec to understand they can have a career by continuing to postsecondary education or with an industry credential that helps them start a career right out of high school. And, they don't have to leave the state to get the career of their dreams! Years ago, while working as a Data Coordinator at Farmington High School, McMinn said he learned to value CTE. He saw firsthand how CTE changed the lives of students. Later, he built a program at Central Consolidated's Bond Wilson Technical Center, an early college high school CTE academy in partnership with Navajo Technical University. Now, he is eager to share some of the challenges and the ultimate rewards of driving a successful CTE program at the high school level.

"I basically looked at all the other high schools and their enrollment and asked, which school districts are **really good** at getting students to be concentrators?," he said.

He found that because of their proximity to the border, schools in southern New Mexico such as Deming, Hobbs, and Carlsbad were much more familiar with "best practices" that used labor market data in the region to shape their CTE pathways.

Once he wrapped his mind around using labor market data to inform the course sequences, he realized that Aztec could create pathways that led toward a high-value career choice. By taking this approach, Aztec is seeing more students concentrating on a career pathway, and eventually completing a program. These students finish high school with a certification, workbased learning opportunity, and even college credits.

"With our capstone courses, we hope every kid that leaves Aztec high school as a CTE completer in at least one pathway. It's exciting because I think it gives kids a lot more opportunity to maybe really dive deep in something they're engaged in and they're interested in."

McMinn relayed a story about his youthful experiences in deciding his career pathway.

"I became a teacher because I went through a one-day job shadow where I did a ride along with a police officer in Farmington," he said. "I thought I wanted to be a cop. In the end, I said no, I don't want to do this. This is not for me. So then I ended up in a kindergarten classroom, I ran PE, I did reading time and I just fell in love with kids. That single ride-along experience changed my whole life trajectory." Now, he is an advocate for creating relevant experiences that help students discover their passion.

"I'm such a proponent of teachers teaching their passion because when a teacher's really passionate about something, it's contagious! Kids get excited."

One of McMinn's students was part of an externship over the summer that was available through Aztec's Perkins and NextGen funding. The student learned how to build bikes and eventually became involved in a STEM program called <a href="Project bike Tech">Project bike Tech</a>." That has led to the program growing in Aztec, giving more students the chance to learn to repair bicycles, engineer parts and assemble a finished product for sale.

For McMinn, the hands-on approach brought an immediate sense of relevancy to why this job is important, not only to build bicycles but for all sorts of STEM careers.

"When teachers are passionate about what they're teaching, it's relevant to kids, and we're going to see successes in graduation rates," he said.

#### **COMPUTER SCIENCE MISSION STATEMENT**

By 2026, the New Mexico Public Education Department will prioritize K–12 computer science education, to improve computational thinking, skills, and literacy.

### **Computer Science Endorsement**

New Mexico teachers may qualify for the new 7-12 Computer Science (CS) endorsement. Multiple qualifying pathways are in place for teachers holding a secondary teaching license and who meet one of the criteria below:

- 1. Before January 1, 2025, completed 60 hours of professional development within the three years before applying for a computer science endorsement
- 2. Earn 15 postsecondary credit hours in computer science.
- 3. Pass the department-approved teacher licensure exam for computer science or an approved comparable license from another test.
- 4. Possess a minimum of 2 years of work experience in an industry related to computer science.
- 5. Possess an industry certification in a field related to computer science.
