

The School of Dreams Academy was the inspiration of Avilo (Lefty) Otero and his wife, Edna Otero, many years ago. Their dream was to start a school that could take a different approach to education that included students planning for careers that spanned opportunities from automotive technology to zoology and beyond. That dream was delivered when their son-in-law and daughter, Michael and Teresa Ogas, decided to make it a reality.

SODA became a charter school in Los Lunas, N.M. on the belief that students could stay in school if provided opportunities for successful futures. Lefty was a well-known electrician in Valencia County and valued the trades, said Michael Ogas, one of SODA's founders.

"My father-in-law wanted a school that would meet the needs of all children while providing them an opportunity to realize their dreams," he said. "Lefty challenged Teresa and I to get it done. We enlisted the help of Kathy Chavez, who was with Youth Development Incorporated in Valencia County, and we put in the hard work."

Humble Beginnings

SODA was chartered in 2009 and opened with about 55 students. Today the school's

enrollment is about 500 students in grades PreK through 12th grade. With Career Technical Education at the forefront, SODA offers programs of study in computer science/robotics, construction trades and other career pathways that are added based on student interest, labor market needs and hiring qualified teachers in those areas. It became clear to Ogas that the primary needs of students came from STEM and STEAM-related subjects, as well as the trades.

"As of 2021, a computer science course is now offered at the middle school level, along with the computer science courses being offered at the high school," Ogas said. "That has allowed us to have a true three -course sequence, that includes the intro course at 8th grade."

CS as a Cornerstone

Ogas said computer science was the place to start because s a part of everything we do as a

"computing is a part of everything we do as a society, and students benefit from computer science education that is integral to so many careers."

The Construction and Trade Program at SODA was implemented through the Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources Pathway. The program's project-based learning component has helped complete small projects at the school as well as many throughout the

community and state.

"We pride ourselves as the first charter school in New Mexico to have a FFA Chapter and for assisting in job placement after graduation through community involvement while students are in concentrator classes," Ogas said.



The newest and one of the most exciting programs at SODA is Computer Robotics, he said. The school has implemented the CS-STEM Network, which provides tools and curricula created by the Carnegie Mellon Robotics Academy. Teachers and students create accounts and the students' successes can be monitored as they work through the curriculum.

"The curriculum calls for VEX products and components which our school has been using in our robotics program for years," Ogas said. "VEX components are approachable and flexible. Their mechanical systems include versatile elements that make engineering approachable for novice users, while still providing experienced users with multiple outlets of exploration. Students will find themselves using the VEX robotics platform to explore topics such as: riverbed reinforcement cranes, fans, transportation delivery routes, traffic lights, toll booths, and robotic arms. Every project involves programming. With the knowledge of programming, sensors, and automation, students will hone important computational thinking skills that are needed to succeed in the 21st-century workforce."

Course Alignment is Key

Ogas said SODA's efforts to improve course alignments gives students the chance to earn credentials, college credits and have job-ready skills if they want to enter the workforce after graduation. His advice to other schools struggling with aligning courses is clear: It starts with student interests and builds from there.

"It was important to us that we inventoried the goals and aspirations of the students and we worked to fill the need that they and the community recognized," he said. "In doing so, we have made several changes to our schedule and worked to best accommodate all

grade levels to have the ability to work within their identified pathways. In fact, with added classes within the school day we have noticed that many students are dual enrolled within pathway programs, thus allowing a student to build upon their interest in more than one established pathway and creating a well-rounded CTE student."

The goal at SODA is that by eighth grade, students better recognize their intended pathway and can start with the prerequisites. By doing this, students start a concentrator course their first year of high school and can work with certified individuals, as well as with our dual credit liaison to map out and gain experience to finish their high school experience with a capstone course and possibly an internship.

Unique Advantage

"Our unique advantage comes from the fact that we are one school and the same teachers that have the end goal of graduation with certifications and internships are the same teachers that are actively building a foundation for these students as middle school students," Ogas said. "This allows us to be accountable for meeting our own goals and students are able to prosper from the fluidity of each program."

Ogas credits SODA's successes to the staff and students, who are "closely knit." Staff are invested in the industry and pride themselves on attending and bringing information that will engage and motivate students. Ogas says he believes Lefty's dream is coming to fruition because of the commitment from the school community and Valencia County as a whole.

"The students are driven and many times we find ourselves pushing to keep up with the needs and the interests of the students," he said. "Our programs involve community support from professionals and parents, as we reach out regularly to



assist the students in their growth. I think Lefty and Edna are proud of what we have done to carry on their dream."



- 1. **AP Exam Fee Wavier:** NMPED will again cover a large portion of the exam fee for eligible students under the College Board's AP Exam Fee Reduction guidelines, resulting in a total cost to students of \$3 per exam. Students must individually qualify for the AP exam fee reduction regardless of the district/school Community Eligibility Provision or Title I status. Please read the AP Exam Fee Waiver Memo for revised guidance on eligibility determination.
- 2. Advanced Placement Canvas Course: The NMPED College and Career Readiness Bureau is now offering an Advanced Placement Canvas course to provide resources and support. Click here to enroll in the New Mexico Advanced Placement Canvas course to get the most recent AP updates.

All class of 2023 students are now eligible to win \$500 and \$40,000 scholarships they can use at two - or four-year institutions, *just by planning for college*!




