Rio Grande High School Sowing the Seeds for Students in Successful Agriculture Program

When one of the only high schools in the Albuquerque Public Schools District is planted amid the rural landscape in the city's South Valley, it didn't take teacher John Wright very long to figure out what he needed to do. He re-started Rio Grande High School's agriculture program of study in 2019 and has steadily watched it blossom and bloom like the sunflowers that grow wild in neighborhoods across the valley.

Rio Grande High School first benefited from the state's NextGen state funding for Career Technical Education – seed money to build a new greenhouse. Now, the program has plenty of support from the local agriculture community, Bernalillo County and the city of Albuquerque, to name a few.

Several community grants and sponsors have helped create an after-school and summer sustainable agriculture program at "Rio."

This spring eight freshmen students learned about water conservation and agricultural practices two days a week after school. The students are putting in raised beds and planted flowers and vegetables in several areas around campus. Students receive elective credit and a stipend through the program which will continue into the summer.

More students participated in the Gutierrez Hubbell House sustainable agriculture program and community farm. Wright has been able to secure paid internships for students to work the farmland and learn about the richness of the river valley.

Wright said he thanks the New Mexico 2050 for coordinating the sustainable agriculture internship program. Other partners include Ciudad Soil and Water Conservation District, Bernalillo County, Food Corps., Chispas Farm, City of Albuquerque Job Mentorship Program. Other grants have been received from the Whole Kids Foundation, Lowes Toolbox for Education and the NM Youth Alliance Adolescent Health Action Council. The school program is supported by FFA with training and teacher resources.

CTE Funding Application Workshop January 11-12, 2023

The College and Career Readiness Bureau will present the 2023-2024 Application Workshop for Career Technical Education Funding on January 11-12, 2023.

The hands-on workshop, hosted by CCRB and Central New Mexico Community College, will be held at the Workforce Training Center, 5600 Eagle Rock Ave NE, in Albuquerque. It also will be available virtually via Zoom for online participants.

The Application Workshop is designed to assist school districts, charter schools and, and higher education institutions in

completing the application to receive federal and state funding for CTE programs. The funding period for this application is July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024.

This year's workshop also will introduce participants to new CCRB leadership and coaches. The event provides opportunities to network and exchange best practices with peers who value CTE programs in New Mexico.

The two-day workshop includes a three-hour grant management training with the law firm, Brustein & Manasevit, PLLC, covering the Education Department General Administrative Regulations federal requirements, the General Education Provisions Act and applicable Office of Management and Budget Circulars. The trainers will explain the rules and regulations and provide context for these rules with real-life examples of compliant and noncompliant practices.

All secondary and postsecondary Local Education Agencies, including charter schools and Regional Education Cooperatives are invited to participate. Districts/charters, RECs, and community colleges new to CTE funding are encouraged to attend the workshop and learn how they can qualify for

Perkins V and NextGen state funding. State funding is available only to secondary districts, RECs, and charter schools.

"Our goal for the workshop is to provide direct support to any secondary or postsecondary entity that wants funding to innovate and strengthen their CTE programs," said CCRB Program Manager Marc Duske. "We want every participant to leave the workshop with a solid starting point in the application process."

Following the workshop, CCRB regional coaches will schedule on-site follow-up meetings with LEAs who want more direct support prior to submitting the application in the early spring.



 the AP exam fee reduction regardless of the district/school
 Community Eligibility Provision or Title I status. Read the AP

Unclaimed Federal Financial Aid in NM

A new Canvas course, produced by PED and New Mexico Educational Assistance Foundation, is designed to educate students about the financial aid process at federal and state levels. School counselors, advisors and teachers are encouraged to **enroll** their high school senior students through Canvas or their own learning management system. The process of financial aid can be overwhelming for students and parents, so these learning modules were created for you to provide general knowledge about financial aid and information about how to apply.

- A <u>public link</u> is also provided for equity and access throughout the state, so schools can share that link with families/post
