According to NMSA § 22-8B-6(B) a Notice of Intent to Submit a Charter Application ("NOI") must be filed by the organizers of a proposed charter school to the Public Education Commission <u>AND</u> to the superintendent of the school district in which the charter school is proposed to be located no later than the second Tuesday in January of the year in which the application will be filed.

The NOI must be submitted electronically to charter.schools@ped.nm.gov with a cc to the district superintendent by 5:00 PM Mountain Time January 10, 2023.

Notices of Intent that are not received by the Public Education Commission <u>and</u> the district by the deadline may result in the application being rejected.

3. Model or focus of the proposed school (e.g., performing arts, dual language, college prep, STEM, Montessori, IB)

As a New Mexico charter school our focus will be to will utilize the exemptions to the public school code to meet the need of the whole student implementing best practices. This begins with meaningful family engagement, small classroom sizes, individualized learning, and STEAM education.

We will focus on providing instructional flexibility that meets the needs of the whole student. We will produce academic outcomes greater than the state averages through instructional best practices, project based learning, and by implementing proven curriculum focused on developing critical thinking, problem solving and self-help skills students need to thrive. Our educators will work with families and students, setting goals that provide meaningful project based learning opportunities in core academics, leadership, service learning, career and technology pathways. This will be accomplished through partnerships with programs such as but not limited to 4H, community based organizations, and local businesses. We will work with families to help students develop an awareness of connected roles within our small community enabling them to become productive members of society.

Vision- We envision an educational environment where educators partner with students and families, assuring each student reaches their full individual potential, grows as a leader, progresses at least one grade level per academic year, and graduates on time, with the ability to succeed life post high school.

Mission- Meeting the needs of the whole student – emotionally, socially, creatively, intellectually, and physically."

Sierra County, NM is an underserved rural community located in southern New Mexico. It is one hour to a major community (Las Cruces to the south and Socorro to the north.) Sierra County is ranked as the second poorest county in the state, is among the highest in unfavorable risk factors connected to health outcomes. Over 75% of the land is state or federal, making future growth and development difficult. The average age of residents is 57. Less than 34% of adults have a high school diploma or higher.

Today, students in Sierra County attend Truth or Consequences Municipal School District, are home schooled, or are not attending school.

From 1999-2021 There was one nationally accredited K-12 Private School in Sierra County. The school remained fully enrolled based on capacity and had a waiting list. The greatest issue in growth and sustainability was parent income and their inability to pay tuition. In addition, the private school provided support services to home school families and offered credit recovery for students who did not complete high school. Our projected enrollment is based on the historical enrollment of the private school, their waiting list, the number of students who received support services and completed scholarship applications. We believe this estimate is conservative based county birth rates vs. public school enrollment rates (23% difference), public school 1st grade enrollment vs. public school 12th grade enrollment (20% decline), based on national and state data indicating increased family interest in individualized educational learning for their students, and is based on the number of inquiries to our team for alternatives to TCMSD. Our team represents local educators and experts in child growth and development who have worked at and/or enrolled our children in Sierra County's private, homeschool, dual enrollment, and public schools. We know and understand the community and are in contact with educators, families, and students seeking a charter school option for their current educational needs.

The applicant team has assessed community need from the following sources-

Sierra County Private school enrollment from 1999-2021- There was one nationally accredited K-12 Private School in Sierra County. The school remained fully enrolled based on capacity and had a waiting list. The greatest issue in growth and sustainability was parent income and their inability to pay private school tuition. In addition, the private school provided supported services to home school families and offered credit recovery for students who did not complete high school. Our projected enrollment is based on the historical enrollment of the private school, their waiting list, the number of students who received support services and completed scholarship applications.

New Mexico Charter schools follow the same laws for finances and operations as traditional public schools. The difference is in the educational model, where a small number of exemptions to the public school code allow for dynamic education models to be offered. Our team of educators and developmental experts will be allowed to offer innovative education opportunities to our students that traditional public schools are currently not allowed to provide.

We will improve student achievement and exceed the academic performance through individualized learning STEM education, and meaningful family engagement. We understand and represent the cultural of our community and will offer programs that are relevant to the families and students served.
