SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: House Bill 336 (HB336) would create a "Data Integration Advisory Committee" in the Department of Information Technology (DoIT) to study, report, and provide recommendations on the maintenance and utilization of data in New Mexico state government.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

HB336 would appropriate \$2 million from the general fund to the Board of Regents of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology for expenditure in FY24 and FY25 to convene, organize and manage the Data Integration Advisory Committee to conduct a statewide data inventory study and to oversee the development of the associated report to the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). The bill would require any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY25 to revert to the general fund.

If the operating budget for the Institute for Complex Additive Systems Analysis (ICASA) is funded through New Mexico Tech's operating budget, the staff and administrative support required by HB336 for the Data Integration Advisory Committee may be duplicated in the General Appropriation Act.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The bill would require the Data Integration Advisory Committee to complete its work by January 1, 2025, and present its findings to the LFC. Between January 1, 2025 and January 1, 2026, the committee is to coordinate with ICASA to incorporate feedback from the LFC in the committee's report and submit final recommendations and procedures for statewide data management to the Legislature, the Executive, and other impacted entities by January 1, 2026.

HB336 would require one member who is an expert in education and educational systems to be appointed by the Governor.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

Increasingly, government agencies utilize significant amounts of data to make strategic decisions. Governments usually collect a large amount of administrative data, mostly for routine reporting and compliance purposes. Therefore, the maintenance and utilization of data is of vital importance, especially within state government. Digital transformation depends on data that is both timely and trusted. Too often data governance policies protect data but slows or even prevents access to it. That equates to slower response time and missed opportunities. Therefore, a state-wide data governance strategy that allows trusted data to be provided in real-time speed is essential for a functioning and collaborative state government.

The Data Integration Advisory Committee would consist of:

- The Chair, who would be the director of the institute for ICASA at the New Mexico Tech or the director's designee;

- The secretary of the DoIT;
- One member of the House and one member of the Senate with expertise in the application of technological solutions to public sector data;
- One member of the Attorney General’s Office to be appointed by the Attorney General;
- One attorney or expert in data sharing and compliance to be appointed by the Governor;
- One member who is an expert in education and educational systems to be appointed by the Governor;
- One member who is an expert in health care and public health to be appointed by the Governor;
- One member who represents State Courts to be appointed by the Chief Justice;
- One member who represents counties with experience in the application of technological solutions to public sector data, appointed by the New Mexico Association of Counties;
- One member who represents the application of technological solutions to the public sector to be appointed by the municipal league.
