Or, sorry. Director Chavez. I'm on a Commissioner roll right now. DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Thank you, Chair Brauer, Commissioners. As you recall, we touched on this at last month's work session. And in your folder and posted to the website is the PED's

Learning Center, Tierra Encantada Charter School, and Turquoise Trail Charter School.

If these -- if this is a school that is within your district, you might just give them a call and say, "Hey, great job."

It's really difficult to have zero audit findings, and so we are celebrating these schools.

Moving along, I just want to orient you to this document. What we did was distill all the information on every other charter school, and we've listed them in alphabetical order.

21st Century Learning -- Public Academy is first. And then ACES Technical. We include the school and their foundation, where it exists. We are giving you the total number of findings and the number of repeat findings.

And we wanted to separate out which schools had material weaknesses or significant deficiencies.

So this chart is just giving you, in a bird's eye view, what is detailed in the agency's audit. And you can see that there's some schools with just one audit finding. There are some that have four or eleven and everything in between. So this is just a summary of what those schools' audit

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Statement and Supplementary Information. It is the Fiscal Year 2022 financial audit that has all State charter schools listed individually with their audit findings and management response.

It also has additional information about the overall PED audit. And we talked about it last month. That's -- that's document 6a, but it's a very lengthy document. So I will call your attention to document 6b. And I don't know if it's possible to screen share. I hate to ask you to do this, Missy or Lucy. If you could screen share, that would be great.

I want to start out by saying that we have something to celebrate. So the charter schools -- the State charter schools that have absolutely no findings in Fiscal Year '22 really need to be uplifted, congratulated, and recognized for having zero audit findings. And this was true with not just the school, but if they're -- if they had a foundation, the foundation also didn't have a finding.

So those are Amy Biehl, Horizon Academy
West, Hózhó Academy, New Mexico Academy for the
Media Arts, New Mexico School for the Arts,
Rio Grande Academy of Fine Arts, Southwest Secondary

findings are.

I think you want to pay attention to whether there is a material weakness or a significant deficiency, and be sure that you're clear about -- about those.

If we continue to scroll down on this document starting on Page 4, then we have the information arranged by -- by number, starting with the foundations. And so the schools that had the highest number of foundation findings are listed first, and then the schools that had the highest number of findings are listed where you see the school.

So those are, in a nutshell, what we found.

And then we want to scroll down to Page -- Page 6. And this chart basically just summarizes to you some of the charter schools that had significant issues with the Fiscal Year '22 audit.

I want to start out with the two that had disclaimed opinions: La Tierra Montessori and Las Montañas. Both were not able to provide the information to the auditors in time for the audit to be otherwise. So they are considered disclaimed. They delayed the publishing of the audit.

And then between the School of Dreams
Academy and School of Dreams Academy Foundation,
there were several there that we thought you might
want to attend to. The GREAT Academy and The GREAT
Academy Foundation is listed simply because I know
it's a school that is under condition of renewal and
that we may possibly talk about moving forward.

I do want to let you all know, in terms of

I do want to let you all know, in terms of The GREAT Academy, that we've had to postpone the site visit to the school due to loss of staff on our end. So we have the visit scheduled later. And for that reason, I don't think we're doing a full discussion about The GREAT Academy.

Later on, we're talking about -- I'm giving you an update on conditions of renewal. But because we haven't visited the school, there's a little bit less information. But this is their audit report and their audit findings.

And by the way, I am joined by Ms. Kimberly Gonzales, who you all met last month or the month before. She is the financial administrator in our office who's working really closely with the schools, their business managers, their boards.

She has been on -- well, she has to go to

completely ignorant, what I can do to help them and what I should do to encourage them.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Right. So I'll start out, and, Kimberly, if I forget something, please jump in.

So, first of all, I think recognizing with any of the schools that you talk to that you've looked at their audit and you know what's in it and that we talked about it at the PEC meeting is important. So they know that you're attending to it; right?

The next item on our agenda is where we're talking about potentially working with Corrective Action Plans. And so that's a whole other discussion.

But I always -- I believe that people perform better when they have more information and training; right? And last year we did a series on how to avoid audit findings. This year and every year we do governing board training on fiscal management. And so encouraging the schools to have their board members trained, trained early, and attend as many learning opportunities as possible.

And then in -- you know, you want to look at each school individually and why they got the

every single school's site visit to do the focus group with the business managers and to really be looking at not just the Fiscal '22 audit, because, remember, that's what we're using for next year's annual report, but she's been looking at the Fiscal Year '21 audit reports and having real targeted discussions with the school, their business manager, and their boards, around how they are responding to the audit findings.

And so if I can't answer the question, Ms. Gonzales, I'm sure, will be able to. And when you do, just press the button.

All right. Commissioner Ingham.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: (Inaudible due to audio issues.) Sorry. Turned the wrong way. Being a newbie, I'd like to know how I can help with this. I get the indication that it would be helpful to encourage the schools in our district to reduce their audit findings, obviously, and encourage them in a direction. And I just was wondering how we can do that.

I see the School of Dreams is one of my schools, and I would very much like to help them in any way I can. And so how is that appropriate for us? Because that's what I really don't know. I'm

audit finding. If the school got one audit finding because they didn't deposit money within 24 hours, that's quite a bit different than if they had a disclaimed opinion in their audit, because that means they were not working as closely with the auditors to provide the information in time.

And so how's their audit committee

functioning is a question that I would ask.

And, Kim, would you add to any of that?

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Sure. So.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Well, actually, we're going to talk about School of Dreams for Item

No. 7. Yeah, it's on the agenda.

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: So, Commissioner Ingham, just to answer your question, how you could be helpful to the schools that you represent in your district, I feel that by really engaging with their governing board, their audit committee, and their head administrator and their business manager would be a really good start so you can get to understand what actually occurred.

And there is a lot of findings for School of Dreams. But there has also been many people who are trying to go in and assist them, and, just, it would be a much longer conversation. So if you

would like, I can sit with you at a break or sometime, and we can go into the details.

But, really, just checking in with their governing council and their audit committee to make sure that they're aware and see what kind of support they need.

I offer my support and assistance to the business managers. And, you know, we start from there.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Well, I just know I was at that breakout at the business --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Spring Budget Workshop.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: At the Spring Budget Workshop.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Ingham, can you pull this down to your mouth?

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Oh, okay. Sorry.

That I was at that breakout session, and the State Auditor really threw charter schools under the bus and said, basically, that if we didn't have charter schools dragging us down, we would be fine.

And so I don't need -- I don't need to hear that. And I would like to do whatever I can, especially with the schools in my end. So if this

Commissioner, you don't do compliance. So, yes, having a discussion about, "Hey, you know, I saw your audit, just want to know..." and having a general conversation. But when it -- when it digs into a little bit more technical pieces -- because this potentially is something that would be voted on in a public meeting, perhaps for action, so that all the information should be the same information that all Commissioners have when they vote, so that a discussion with their business manager, in particular, probably wouldn't be the most appropriate conversation to have, because that's what the Charter School Division does for us.

Then they come back and report to us about those discussions. Because you're just there to, you know, kind of be a liaison if there's -- you know, if there's some issues.

But when we visit schools, we visit schools as a -- you know, a fun kind of thing. It's -- we do not do compliance, which is why we don't, you know, participate in site visits for -- you know, for that reason.

So that -- so it's just, you know, "I'm here, absolutely, you know. I've been aware. You know, if there's anything the Charter School

is a particular --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: We're not talking about a particular school right now.

But I think, generally, because they are a component unit of the PED, and we have a total of --was it -- how many, Kimberly? Total findings?

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: It was, I believe, around 47. And some of them were actually the foundation and not the school. But it was a combination of both.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: I think it was close to 106 total audit findings in the PED's audit report that were due to school's audit findings.

So I think just you recognizing that it's an issue, being in communication with your schools and letting them know that you're paying attention, letting them know that we're talking about it -- and today, I think we will talk about a couple of schools, putting them on a differentiated Corrective Action Plan.

But I'll talk about how we're dealing with all of the audit findings here in a minute.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Gipson.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: So I'm just going to

offer a little bit of caution, because, as a

Division can do to help support you and, you know, additional training or whatever, to help you along the way," that's -- you know, that's a casual enough conversation.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: That's what I was asking, because I don't want to be out of line, but I want to offer as much help as I can.

THE CHAIR: And, you know, Commissioner Ingham, we don't want a school to come back and say "Well, Commissioner Ingham said if I did this and this only, but now he's voting against us," that's segregation of duties as a Commissioner versus a technical support person.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So encourage the school just to do what it needs to do and knowing that the PEC is looking at it.

THE CHAIR: Director Chavez, any other updates here? And I'm going to open it up to other questions from the Commission as well.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: I think now is the time to ask any questions about the audit itself.

Lucy, if you will promote Kimberly to the panel, Kimberly can find the specific place within the audit and share screen if you guys want to look

1 at any parts of the actual audit. But --2 MS. BARNES: I have a question. I was 3 trying to find the material weaknesses for one of 4 the schools. Is it in document 6a? 5 DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So Document 6a is 6 the -- what? -- how many thousand -- a thousand-plus 7

pages that was the actual audit that is on the auditor's website. And it is complex, and it has lots of information about every single school. And then we distilled that information

into document 6b. But if there's a particular question around a particular school or findings --MS. BARNES: I was just trying to look --COMMISSIONER GIPSON: It's in the full audit. You'll find the listing of the material

weak- -- this just -- you have to -- you can go to the schools on the -- in that document and you'll find it.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: That's what we're trying to help.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: It is all in the particular school's audit, the material weak- -- it is listed. At least when I looked at it, it was. THE CHAIR: And you may -- Ms. Barnes, if

you're looking at it in preview, you might have to

download it to do a file search or a --

shifted. 2.

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Last year at this time, we were asking 3 schools to submit an audit CAP, not to the PED Audit 4 Bureau, as written in the performance framework, but 5 to our staff so that we could keep track of the 6 financial CAP. The person that sat in 7 Ms. Gonzales's position a year ago at this time also 8 said, "What I'm noticing is that the schools are 9 cutting and pasting from the financial audit 10 management response what their Corrective Action 11 Plan is."

> And that makes a lot of sense. The financial audit identifies the audit findings, and then schools, managers, management -- that's where the audit committee comes in -- are expected to provide a response to the auditors about how they will fix that audit.

And that's legitimate. That's specific. That's directly tied to each audit finding. And so this year, instead of asking schools to cut and paste a document and send it to us -- and then maybe we get it or they forget to send it to us or it gets lost in the mail.

And this year I was at a school visit where I said, "Okay, we are giving you a Working to

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MS. BARNES: (Inaudible due to off mic.)

THE CHAIR: Okay. All right. Other

questions?

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Ms. Chavez, are you finished with your report?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Happy to answer any questions. Otherwise, we can move on to the next item.

THE CHAIR: I don't see any hands raised. Well, let's move on to Item No. 7, Discussion and Possible Action Under the Intervention Ladder for Schools With Significant Fiscal Issues.

Ms. Chavez, you can continue your report, and then if there are any school leadership or representatives that are in the audience, we can let them in as well.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So thank you, Chair Brauer. I wanted to share with the Commission that one of the things Commissioners should be aware of is that in the current performance framework that -- that the schools are all under, in the financial indicators, there is some language that speaks to a financial audit CAP. And over time, the

interpretation of what this CAP was like has

1 Meet because we didn't get your financial audit 2 CAP." 3

And they said, "Oh, here it is." They created it. They'd been using it. They'd been working to make improvements based on it, but we didn't receive it.

So rather than asking them to submit a separate document to us called the "Financial Audit CAP," I sent a memo to schools.

So I will call your attention to the document under Item No. 7.

So I sent this memo on April 11th to all State charters and their business managers, and just reminding them that PED is responsible for overseeing all State charter schools and public school finances across the state, but, in particular, in the Fiscal Year '22 audit report, they are a component unit of the PED, that we had 106 audits, and that the Department requires charter schools with findings to submit a Corrective Action Plan.

But for the Fiscal Year '22 audit, rather than asking them to send a separate CAP, we are considering the management response to be the financial audit Corrective Action Plan, unless the

PEC determines that there needs to be a more detailed CAP. All right?

And I did discuss this with some members of the Executive Committee, that there's a few schools that I would say we should have a closer watch on. I'd like to set some timelines. I'd like for Ms. Gonzales to be working more closely with those schools to take a look at the management responses, put people responsible for making the changes and to closely monitor the implementation of that CAP.

Those three schools that I'm recommending have a more detailed CAP are La Tierra, Las Montañas, and School of Dreams Academy.

You'll see that the final line in my memo says that the PEC may ask the charter schools to take further action also by creating a more detailed Corrective Action Plan under the intervention ladder.

So those are the three schools that I would say it would be appropriate to provide a Notice of Concern and to have us work more closely with the school on a Corrective Action Plan.

THE CHAIR: Ms. Barnes?

MS. BARNES: So, obviously, you moved --

check-ins is the bottom line, more frequent check-ins with concrete action steps.

I don't have the plan for that school yet, because what I am proposing is that we work with the school to create the action plan.

MS. BARNES: I'm just trying to follow the intervention ladder.

And so to move towards the intervention ladder, we're supposed to have that expectations and outcomes, or they are supposed to have approved a CAP? So I'm just not positive, however you want to address that.

THE CHAIR: Vice Chair Burt, and then Commissioner Carrillo.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Two different things. I actually think it's a good point about La Tierra. I feel like we should not bring action -- I would not support action on La Tierra today. We know from the public meeting yesterday they have the ability to appeal. I think depending on the school's actions in the future, that maybe this is something that we might need to bring back up. But as of today, I don't feel like it's even appropriate to do -- do this right now today.

But for the other two, I actually do

you took action to revoke La Tierra yesterday. So I guess I just want to think about whether taking

additional action under the intervention ladder again today makes sense or not.

And then -- and then -- so that's one thing.

And then the second is -- so, you know, Chair Brauer just found me La Tierra's management response.

So here's an example. "The management is aware of the need to disclose certain issues, and the audit committee will work towards higher communication with the auditors in such manner."

So is -- how would you -- how would that set an expectation? So just on this one example, that feels like a really vague answer they gave.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Right. So that's why, for most schools, they can figure it out. For the schools that I'm recommending that we create a more detailed Corrective Action Plan, then we would set steps, such as the school identifies the individuals who sit on the audit committee and convenes them prior to the audit beginning. They have periodic check-ins with us about the audit

committee meeting. So there would be more frequent

think -- I'm pretty clear about the outcomes and expectations, because they are already required to develop a CAP for -- they're required to develop, like, how they're going to fix these issues with the auditor, with PED. That's already happening.

All we're determining is if we want to just use that and allow CSD to have extra oversight over it. That's an outcome and expectation.

Or do we want the school to develop a better, a more descriptive CAP and work with CSD on -- so I don't know. To me, the outcomes and expectations make sense. They're already, for this particular, because it's about the audit, it's already pretty transparent what the outcomes and expectations are, because they're already doing it, and we're just trying to provide additional oversight through CSD.

MS. BARNES: So just check out the language in the motion. Make sure that that -- I mean, I tried to do it that way, and I just want to make sure if there's something in addition that's going to be created, though, I think it should be in the motion.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Because it -generally, when there's a CAP, the school's

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responsible for creating that. We're not creating it for them, anyway. Right.

THE CHAIR: Missy, is there anyone from the schools that are on? Just want to make sure that we're providing them an opportunity.

MS. MISSY BROWN: There's a board member from SODA who's here.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: And Commissioners, I do want to let you know that both Ms. Gonzales and I were part of the site visit team to Las Montañas. We sat down with the school. We talked about the concern over the audit. And we learned that the school has already obtained the services of a retired business manager to work closely with the business manager that's on staff, who is a fairly new, but a full-time, on-site, business manager, which is wonderful.

And they obtained the services of Ms. Betty Seeley, who we all know has even been a consultant working with us on financial matters.

So I feel like that school has really gotten started on the implementation of a CAP, and that if we sat down with them, we would certainly document how frequently Ms. Seeley was working with the business manager and what was the scope of the

do like they did last time with The GREAT Academy.

It took eight months or nine months for the Court to render their decision with The GREAT Academy. So I don't want to let all this time go by. This is a very serious issue that needs to be addressed, and I think they need to do that.

That's the first part. You had your -THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo, I'm
just going to share one thought that I have. I
think we -- I think it might behoove us to wait to
take an action to see if the school is going to
actually file an appeal with the Secretary. If they

do file an appeal with the Secretary, we can cross
this bridge at that stage.
I think that would also show just a sense
of grace, I think, to the school, given what we just
did. And we're not talking about eight months;

we're talking about a month. And then we could take action, potentially, in May, if we need to, if they do decide to file an appeal.

If they don't decide to file an appeal,
I -- I would like to give them a little bit of grace
and not pile on on this -- on these last two days.
That's my -- that's my perspective. Even though we
don't take an action today, we can still take an

mentoring and support that she could provide to the school.

So I feel like they've already gotten started.

We also -- I also sat down with SODA and Mr. Ogas and another member of his leadership team. And so he's aware that -- that he would be on the agenda for today and has some context for why they are where they're at, but, also, I think, could appreciate some more frequent check-ins with us to make sure that they're on track.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo, thank you for being patient.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Me? I'm not patient at all. But you're welcome.

I think we should have a letter of concern for La Tierra Montessori, because there is -- they have the chance -- and all this stuff takes time -- they have this chance to appeal to the Secretary. Then who knows what they're planning on doing relative to if the Secretary were to uphold our decision, then -- then, honestly, the school's, unfortunately, in its current state, likely to stay open for another year while the district court dillydallies with whatever decision they're going to

action a month from now.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: When is the -- I appreciate that point of view. Not that I concur, but I appreciate it.

When is the deadline for them to file their appeal?

MS. BARNES: Thirty days after they receive our written document. And our written document is due five business days after we receive the transcript.

So it's probably going to be 15 days, because the written notice refers to the transcript, and we can't refer to the transcript till we have it; so...

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: So you're talking a June meeting.

THE CHAIR: June, yeah.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So may I ask -- COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: I'm not done.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Okay. Well, I was just wondering about the date count. Because I

think -- doesn't statute say 30 days after the decision is made?

24 MS. BARNES: No. The -- and we've checked

it. They have 30 days after receipt of the

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decision, which is the written document from the PEC

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And there was a stipulation by counsel. So it's -- it's triggered by when they receive the document. We talked to counsel about the need for the transcript, and that stipulation was put in the record.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. So if it's 30 days after that receipt, so when do we reasonably expect -- is this done by certified mail so we know when they received it? Is it a read receipt? Electronic?

MS. BARNES: It's done by e-mail. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. So it's reasonable to say, obviously, the moment we send it, they'll receive it. So when are we sending it?

MS. BARNES: Within five days of -- I mean -- no. So the -- the motion that's going to form the basis of the letter is ready. All of the exhibits, we're going to refer to each of the exhibits to prove that. But that's largely -- we've largely already done that.

But we need to wait for Cindy's transcript and then do that process. So we have five business days to do that.

just, you know, they received it?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Because we look at the audit findings, and because there is performance framework indicators directly tied to that, and if they don't have a green, in a sense that's the threshold; right? In a sense that's when Kimberly really knows to focus in on questioning around what the school is doing to have those audit findings and to not have them the next year.

So I don't know if that helps.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: It helps. But let's -- so I'm looking here specifically at -- in this moment. And not to pick on these schools, but if they feel picked on, that's their own issue.

I'm looking at Estancia Valley Classical, and I'm looking at Monte del Sol Charter. You know, Monte Del Sol Charter has a total of seven findings. Estancia, ten.

So at what point do we send them -- and, yeah, there might be a yellow. But there's no orange between yellow and red. I mean, at what point do we issue a Letter of concern?

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo, we have to only focus in on the schools that are on the agenda for right now as well.

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COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Cindy's transcript is included in that five days?

MS. BARNES: No. Cindy has ten days to give you a transcript.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Do you see how this is going? That's my concern is -- because then all of a sudden, Mr. Zamora and the school -- it's too long. No, I will not agree to that. I think that we need -- I don't consider it piling on. I consider it the natural progression of events, given their audit findings and their plethora of audit findings.

So as much as I appreciate your not wanting -- your wanting to have -- use the word "grace," it's nothing to do with grace. This is business. They screwed up. We need to send them a Notice of Concern. I believe that, and I would hope that my other Commissioners would feel likewise.

So that's the first part of what I'm saying. And, actually, Ms. Gonzales may be able to answer this.

Is there -- or Ms. Chavez -- is there a threshold when all of a sudden they move from this category of the three that we're discussing on our agenda today to greater attention, if you will, than

1 COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Well, I'm looking

at -- this piece is an exhibit that was on the agenda. So I'm just asking about a threshold, not asking to take -- I'm not saying we should today vote on any of that. That's not what I'm doing at all. I'm asking where is the threshold that we do?

THE CHAIR: I understand your sentiment, for sure. We are on No. 7, and we're talking about those -- specifically, those three schools. So, Ms. Chavez, I think we could talk about some of these at another time, but I want to make sure we're being diligent.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Sure. And I would say that that's what our team did. We looked at the audit. We picked out the schools that we felt were the most severe. Those were the three schools that we're now recommending that you issue a Notice of Concern and that we work closely with to develop a more detailed Corrective Action Plan so that we're working with them.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. So in keeping with the spirit of the agenda item, at what point -- like, for instance, you chose these three. Where did you, in your mind, have that cutoff where you didn't include another three?

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DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Right. So -- so we looked at the most severe. We could have had 14 Corrective Action Plans and notices. And I felt like that was too many, and that we are already focusing the schools on the audit in a more intentional way as part of our site visits that I don't know has happened in the past.

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Kimberly can probably speak to when she's doing the site visits and asking the questions. And we've had some schools, like, come back and say, "Oh, you've changed the way you're looking at us," and we're, like, "No, this indicator has always been there, but, yeah, we are looking at the specific audit findings and having that discussion with you."

I think that we don't want to have 14 Notices of Concern and separate Corrective Action Plans to monitor more frequently than at next year's annual visit.

That said, I do think that we work very closely when the audit is happening and the auditors let us know if there's concerns. And as you've seen before, we let the school know if there's concerns that are happening during the audit.

But that's -- that's how we -- we chose the schools that had disclaimers, which means they No. 6, that's where we could bring up some of the schools. Like, I have three or four that I've pointed out myself after looking at the audit findings that they have significant deficiencies, that, to me -- significant deficiencies and material weaknesses -- they should be included on the list for No. 7.

So I guess I was unaware we moved to No. 7 before we finished our discussion of 6 to be able to include schools on No. 7 that may not already be there.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Manis, your point is well-taken. We did have that opportunity to do that. If we do need to revisit this Agenda Item No. 14, we can discuss others for the upcoming -the upcoming meeting in May as well. I felt like we had some space to do that.

I did ask. I did not see any other hands come up after we talked about a few schools.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: And maybe I just missed it was the thing. So thank you.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Procedurally, you're allowed, as Chair, if he -- if Commissioner Manis wanted to bring up something on 6, I think

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weren't working closely with the auditor, and the schools that we felt had the most audits and the most severe audits.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Yes. THE CHAIR: Commissioner Manis.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: I guess I was unaware that we went past No. 6, because I felt like that

that you have the discretion, as Chair, to go back to Item 6.

THE CHAIR: Well, if you're right, Commissioner Carrillo, I think that -- I think we can -- I feel comfortable with sticking on No. 7 right now. If we feel that after we review some of the other ones that we're noticing we may want to take action on. I think that we can address those in an upcoming meeting as well.

And we're not losing that much time in terms of taking action with them. So if there are others that the Commissioners are interested in exploring more information, this will give the CSD a chance to dig deeper and provide us more detailed understandings about what they've done so far with the schools, any actions that they've taken, as well as give us an opportunity to review a little bit more. So that's where my mind is.

Vice Chair?

COMMISSIONER BURT: I do think we can bring up schools next month. But I think we would definitely need to -- like, I -- we have to do that, especially if we're, like, considering maybe possibly sending out a Letter of Concern based off of it, you know.

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So if Commissioner Manis saw something in there, and he's, like, "Actually, I feel like there's something really big, I'd like to...," they probably should get a Letter of Concern as well. We would need to wait to do that until next month.

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But I'm also wondering if there's --'cause I think if we did that, then the school would get listed, it would probably get anxious over the course of the next month, and then getting the notice that we're going to be talking about next month.

Whereas, I'm wondering if we do go back to 6, let Commissioner Manis bring up those couple of schools, because if there's answers that we can give right now to where we don't feel like they need to be brought back up next month, it actually might be better to kind of, like, get it out of the way so that they're not kind of hanging in the -- I'm just thinking from the school perspective of, like, "I don't want to be sitting out there for a month, like, now I have to get ready and respond to an audit," when maybe, like if we waited till next month to bring it up, it's, like, "Oh, well, here's this response. Oh. Never mind. This wouldn't be a notice of concern, and, like, I get it now."

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I'm not talking about doing a Letter of Concern, but looking at identifying these schools. And their responses to the audit would be populated into the materials for next month's meeting so that we would be able to look at those, and those responses may alleviate Commissioners' concerns about the school, because they're comfortable with how the school is addressing the audit issues. And then it doesn't have to go any further than that.

So having them do additional work on something that was two years ago, like, all these audit findings were from two school years -- like, a school year and a half ago. So to me, it just doesn't make sense for the action that we took yesterday.

And so -- and like I said, I think if -- if the school were to do something different, and if there's some other decision that we need to consider because the school will be open for some reason next year, then I would -- I would like to bring the school back and issue a Letter of Concern at that time. I just don't think today's the right time for

THE CHAIR: Ms. Chavez, I don't think you can discuss this right now because we're in a motion right now.

And then Vice Chair Burt, and then Commissioner Carrillo.

COMMISSIONER BURT: I think I'm just going to go with what Commissioner Brauer said. Yesterday we included this audit in their revocation grounds. Like, we literally revoked them as part of one of these audits.

So sending a Letter of Concern is actually diminishing what we did yesterday. To me, like, why would we send -- we revoked them on the ground of fiscal mismanagement. We revoked them. That's like the furthest -- it's like taking this Letter of Concern, and, like, we did the breach already. We did the -- like, we revoked yesterday based off of this. So we're doing a second action that's lesser.

That doesn't -- that's what I'm saying. It just doesn't quite -- the timing doesn't make sense right now.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: To me it's about the timing. So you give notice for your job. You give two weeks' notice. You're still connected to

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me.

THE CHAIR: I'll just share really quickly, and then Commissioner Taylor.

The terminal level of the ladder of intervention was executed yesterday, which was revocation. And we voted as a body to revoke the charter of the school.

Commissioner Taylor.

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So, yeah, that -- that is a perspective I hadn't thought about.

My -- my thought process was is that although we voted to revoke the charter, the school, as of now, it's open; right? It's -- it hasn't -- it's still in operation. It's still open.

And under those terms, I feel like we need to treat this school as we would any other school that has that many audit findings.

So I do feel like it's an appropriate move on our behalf, and I don't think that -- that -- I'm a man of grace, typically, you know. And I don't think this has -- I don't view this as a grace matter. I view this as a procedural matter, that we need to follow the procedures that we would with every other school that's in operation currently. So...

do the job for the next two weeks, even though you've given your notice, just like in the real world or private sector. This, to me, is a procedural necessity. It's a school still in operation.

We have no guarantee that the revocation is going to be upheld, either by the Secretary, or we have no guarantee that they're not going to go to District Court. And probably the immediate decision of District Court, like it was with The GREAT Academy, is to issue a stay and let the school operate for another year.

And lived through it. Was extremely disappointed, as many were, with that District Court decision. So this is a school still in operation. They need to abide by the rules, just as all of the other schools in operation need to abide by the rules.

And it's the timelines that worry me the most. And certainly not trying to pile anything on. This is just a matter to me of procedural necessity.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner Carrillo.

Commissioner Ingham.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Can I ask a

question? If they are -- if they are not going to file an appeal, wouldn't they just ignore this? In other words, if you're -- if you're not going to file an appeal, and you're ready to -- to close the school, then you would take this notification and drop it in File 13.

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If you are going to file a -- an appeal, then -- then this would be something that might even encourage you not to file an appeal, just because it's one more thing that you would have to answer to in the process.

So in some ways I'm arguing for Steve's deal, in that I see them ignoring this if they're ready to -- if they're ready to give up and not file an appeal.

I wouldn't see that it would bother them a bit what Steve's proposing. If they are going to appeal, then this is going to give them one more notice of something that they're going to have to attend to in the meantime, along with the appeal. That's -- I just -- am I viewing this correctly?

COMMISSIONER BURT: Commissioner Ingham.

9 COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER BURT: Commissioner Gipson.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: No.

12 COMMISSIONER BURT: Commissioner

Clahchischilliage.

COMMISSIONER CLAHCHISCHILLIAGE: No.

15 THE CHAIR: The motion -- it's four-four,

so the motion fails.

Can we just check to see if Commissioner
Armijo was on? I know -- I see her face. But,
Commissioner Armijo, are you back with us?

(No response.)

THE CHAIR: I just wanted to make sure.

Yeah. Maybe, Missy, is it possible to take her off,

just so -- if she's not here, I don't get the

impression that she is here?

25 (Off-the-record discussion.)

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COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Yes, you're viewing this correctly. And if -- if they were filing for an appeal, this would put, at probably the top of their to-do list, something they've got to take care of, as opposed to all of those other items that were listed in yesterday's motion.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Seeing no other comments, either on zoom or here, let's go ahead and do a roll-call vote.

This is the longest motion discussion that I've had in the four months that I've been here. So I appreciate everyone's thinking behind this.

I had -- it may be longer, Commissioner Gipson, but I just want to appreciate everyone for sharing their viewpoints. I think this is important, and I think this shows the heaviness of the work that we do.

Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Commissioner Carrillo.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: (Inaudible due to off-mic.)

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Patti was talking, so I didn't hear what you said.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Commissioner Carrillo. COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Yes.

1 THE CHAIR: All right. So I think we're 2 not moving on. I think we're going back. Go ahead.

MS. BARNES: So Director Chavez raised a question on the language of the motion on the two that passed, because CSD would like to work in detail with those schools to develop more details than just the management response for those two schools.

I think, just confirming that everyone understands that, the Chair can put that in the letter, and I think that that allows her to do that, because it is in the audit findings. And then the management response. And then it will be clear in the record that CSD will develop a further document.

Does that satisfy -- okay. That will be in the letter from you, Chair, on the two that passed.

THE CHAIR: We're going to revert back to Item No. 6. Commissioner Manis.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Thank you. And thank you for your willingness to go back to Item No. 6.

I had looked through the -- both the full fiscal year of 2022 PED audit and the -- the other audit findings for PEC meeting. And I tried to decipher which schools that I had picked out from

1 the audit finding document, 6b, that had actually 2 resolved some of their issues.

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And so the ones that I had pointed out initially were Red River Valley Charter School, J. Paul Taylor, Estancia Valley Classical Academy,

Aldo Leopold, and then The GREAT Academy Foundation.

And I just wanted to clarify with Director Chavez that in the documents, which I guess should be -- I'm trying to go here -- 6a -- that way -- I guess it's, like, in the -- it's Page No. 287 of that long, long, long document -- that they -- the things that say "Resolved," are those things that have been resolved for the current issues? Or are

those past resolved issues? Just for clarification.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Let's bring up the audit and go to Page 280, you said?

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Yeah. It's -- if you're looking at the PDF, the PDF page says 298 on my screen. But in the actual document itself, it's Page 287. Just so I'm clear on what that is.

Probably just still loading. And I could share my screen if you wanted me to. I have it up as well.

24 DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Okay. So we're 25 looking at the Walatowa?

1 whether the Fiscal Year 2022 audit findings are 2 resolved until Fiscal Year '23 audit comes out.

But if there was an audit, let's say -and I don't know if this is true. But let's just say that one of the schools you see here, Albuquerque Bilingual, had a second audit, but it wasn't resolved, then it would be listed in Fiscal

8 Year 2022 audit findings as a repeat.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Understand. Okay.

So with that being said, I guess looking at 6b, the reason why I picked out some of the -some of these schools is because it was noted that they had significant deficiency. And, for example, if we look at -- I'm trying to go here.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Can we scroll down? Because I think if we -- it's great that we see a lot of "Resolved," but you also see some "Repeat."

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Right. Yeah. I guess I'm going back to 6b, the -- the more summarized version of the Fiscal Year 2022 audit findings.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Okay. COMMISSIONER MANIS: The -- what I had really, I guess, focused on were the schools that

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had the significant deficiency, like J. Paul Taylor. 2 Aldo Leopold had that significant deficiency. And I

believe that's a repeat. They had two repeats.

So my question if on some of those that have the significant deficiency and repeats, why they weren't included, or -- you know, because I --I tried to go through that 6a to see if they had a response or anything like that. And it was just too

6 7 8 9 hard to -- to pull that out. 10 DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So, Commissioner 11

Manis, my thinking is that the audit report is one of the best sources of data we have for schools. It's concrete. It's detailed. It tells us exactly where the schools have been deficient in some of their financial management, and it tells us what they want to do in response to those deficiencies or those lacks -- lack of processes that gave them an audit finding.

I could have given up 14 names of schools that had significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, and a number of repeat audit findings. But I feel like we are monitoring them, anyway, and they've already said how they're going to fix it. And I didn't feel like it should advance to the -the corrective -- the intervention ladder.

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COMMISSIONER MANIS: No, it's not that

one. It's -- yes, starting at this point, yeah. So if we scroll down, there's Aldo Leopold, and there's the schools. So are those --DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So these are

referencing Fiscal Year '21. Do you see on the far right-hand column under the name of the school?

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Yes. So these are previous audit findings; correct?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Okay. So I just wanted to understand if the current audit findings, if they -- if those have been looked at. Has any resolved or -- because I didn't see that anywhere. I looked through the 1,200 pages and couldn't find if they had a -- if there was a note in here that said 2022 -- example, just like this 2021, if there was a 2022 version that listed any of these that had been resolved up to this point, or if we're not at that stage. So that's just a point of clarification for me.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Okay. So because the audit for Fiscal Year 2022 tells us whether audit findings from Fiscal Year '21 were resolved or not, that's all we know about -- we don't know

or a significant deficiency.

I didn't feel like I wanted to make that recommendation to take them to the intervention ladder.

We're already monitoring. We already know what the weaknesses are. They've already said how they're going to fix them.

We're going to go back to the school. We're going to talk about it again. The three schools that I brought to your attention were the ones that I think need extra attention, more frequent check-ins, and a more specific plan developed.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Okay. The -- whenever you said. And I appreciate that. Whenever you said that they've -- the schools that had the significant deficiency/material weaknesses, that they've already responded on how they're going to address those issues, is that in 6a? Or where is that information?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So are you -- are you on -- can you screen share and show where in the audit it is? I'm wondering -- we're going to toggle back now to having -- I don't see you on the panel. Maybe you could just let Ms. Lucy know exactly what page you're looking at.

So that's where, kind of, I'm -- I'm
weighing the matrix there that, okay, there's four.
You have two that are repeat findings, one that's a
material weakness, one that's also a significant
deficiency. So that combined, to me, is more

deficiency. So that combined, to me, is more concerning than, okay, we maybe have two audit findings or three audit findings, none are material weakness, and none are repeat findings.

Okay. Fine. They had some issues, but those are going to be corrected.

So the repeat findings along with the combination of significant deficiency and material weakness is concerning, because if it's a repeat finding and significant deficiency, or material weakness, that indicates that this has been an ongoing issue, in my mind.

COMMISSIONER BURT: I think I'm on -- I think I understand where Commissioner Manis is coming from. But I also will say I think one of the -- I feel like we're in this in-between time of accountability, in that I think we're doing, for the first time, a proactive measure instead of it coming to the annual report next year and then taking action.

But within the audit -- and sometimes it's easy to do Control-F to search for a school's name and to find the management response.

But let's just pick a school. Let's look at the big audit. And, Kimberly, you want --

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: In the main audit, if you could just search "management responses," that should take you to the section in the audit.

And I believe it is Page -- it says 209 in the actual page. But I'm not sure, if you're entering it in the PDF, what number that would come to.

But it's 209. And that's where it starts.

That is incorrect. Let me see here. It's actually 191.

COMMISSIONER BURT: So the PDF number is 202. Commissioner Manis.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Yeah, I found it. I had to search a little bit, because I went down to Aldo Leopold since they were the first school, I think, on my list.

So, yeah, I understand what you're saying.

I just -- part of me is conflicted, because I think
those with significant deficiencies and repeat
findings both are more of a concern to me than maybe
just a repeat finding that's not a material weakness

And so I think it feels, like, a little awkward to me, because it's the first time we're doing this in advance of an annual report, which I love, number one. But also I think, like, what Commissioner Manis is referring to is where my, like -- I'm most conflicted as well, because I do think there's some of -- some of these things that when -- like, not this year, but next year when we do annual reports, we are going to be sending out more letters of concern. But, like, the notice that, "Hey, we saw that you had a repeat finding," or, "We -- like, we're accepting the report and we're letting you know..." -- right? -- this -like, form that we're talking about that's going out to the schools about their yellows and reds that they get on their annual report, that the PEC is, like, acknowledging that they're not performing to par.

So I feel like a lot of -- that's where -- when we start doing that, that's where these other eleven schools would get that, like, notice from us of, "We see you had a repeat finding, and please -- please resolve it. You know, if you need support from CSD, great, use it. Please have it resolved by next annual report."

And I think we're just kind of like in between that space right now and being proactive and I like it.

But I see what Commissioner Manis is saying, too, with, like, there are some of these other issues that are concerns. And right now we don't have a lever that happened last year, last year's annual reports, to say, "Hey, don't have a repeat finding again."

So we're kind of like initiating this, because we -- I don't know when the last time a Letter of Concern went out over -- not since I've been here, we haven't done a Letter of Concern over audit findings.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Probably "Nevuary."

COMMISSIONER BURT: Actually, that makes me feel better and worse. I don't know. But it's, like, a new process. So I feel like I -- I was really supportive of Director Chavez bringing forward the most significant schools at this time to start down the intervention ladder with a more and closer intensive look with them, more collaboration between CSD and the schools.

I do think, along the lines of what Commissioner Manis is saying, the intent that we going to be noted. And so we aren't just letting them off.

And so I don't know if that creates any sort of comfort. But, essentially, when you approve the annual reports, you're acknowledging their performance and the need for improvement if it's not a green. It's just that there's a lag, and that's why I wanted to intervene more quickly with the schools that, in their Fiscal Year '22 audit report, were the most significant.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Taylor.

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So -- thank you. So I would just like to say that I feel like CSD seems like they're on this, you know. I feel like the -- we need to trust the process to just proceed the way that it was designed to proceed.

And CSD is involved. They've talked to those schools that have audit findings. They've established plans with them to work out those audit findings. And so I trust the fact that we're getting the ones that need the most attention, and CSD will continue to intervene where need be. So I trust that process; so...

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo, then Commissioner Gipson.

have to start issuing -- to actually start taking action based off of annual report will cover a lot of the concerns that Commissioner Manis brought up, and I have, about the schools that have repeat material findings also receiving notice of some sort saying, "We're concerned by this."

I just don't know if at this time -- I feel like what I'm asking for schools to do right now is more intensive than just, "Fix it by next time," which I think a lot of these would just be "Fix it by next time."

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Vice Chair. Missy, can you let Secretary Armijo back in, please?

I think I saw Ms. Chavez and Commissioner Taylor. And then Commissioner Carrillo.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: So the other thing I just wanted to mention, Commissioner Manis. I know this might feel to you like we're letting the schools off when there's been some concerning financial performance. And I -- I just want to remind you that because there are indicators in the performance framework that directly relate to the audit performance, the school -- the schools that have the significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, are going to not have a green. It is

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: So I understand -I trust the process and understand completely
Commissioner Manis's concerns. And then, you know,
Ms. Burt, you used the phrase "most significant,"
which brings me back to the thing that I was talking
about earlier. What determines? Where is the

threshold for most significant? Significant? Most significant? Uber significant?

I mean, where is -- is that determination? Because when I look at some of these other schools that -- a couple that I mentioned earlier, I would put them not in the "Uber," but I would put them in the -- you know. I'm just curious.

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Commissioner Carrillo, in our performance indicators, if there was an issue where there was a repeat or a significant deficiency or material weakness, we would be rating them as a Does Not Meet.

And the next question after that would be is this school -- like, how are they responsive to audit findings?

So we already know that in the FY22 audit, that we did receive the management response. So from that, they wouldn't get a Meets; they would get a follow-up. And the follow-up is our indicator at

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the CSD to actually check in with the school and find out what implementation to the management response has already occurred.

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And that's how we're following up on, like, the 14 schools, or any schools that did not meet the indicator for following the generally accepted accounting principles.

> COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Thank you. THE CHAIR: Commissioner Gipson.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I think for me at this point in time, I think the process is fine. I think that CAP memo that's in our documents sufficiently outlines to the schools what they have to do, what CSD is going to do.

And, yes, next year it'll be a little bit clearer. Schools that don't get a -- don't get a green, don't get maybe the yellow, whatever colors we're choosing, they're automatically going to get that additional little nudge.

But right now, the memo gives them a pretty good nudge. It does.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner Gipson.

Commissioner Manis, I think your hand is raised, if that's still -- okay. Go ahead.

Ms. Chavez.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Commissioner Manis, the disclaimed opinion was what stood out most to us as an indication that -- I guess, as an educator, when we think about students and our expectations for students, bottom line is do you show up; right? That is, like, the bottom line.

Beyond that, it's like how did you perform?

And what the disclaimed audit tells me is that they were having a hard time showing up, meeting with the auditors, submitting the materials on time.

As a result, the audit was late. And to me, that suggests that there needs to be a lot of attention paid to that audit committee, and management needs to pay attention to the audit process and make sure that their records are well organized, they're provided to the auditor, that they are attending to the audit.

And, indeed, there is a school with several audit findings that was part of the disclaimer. And the other school that had the second highest number of audit findings and also had two material weaknesses for the school and three for

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COMMISSIONER MANIS: Thank you. And I do want to clarify that I do trust the process. Obviously, the long documentation establishes a lot of work went into this.

My question, I think, stemmed back from what Commissioner Carrillo was asking relative to what is the threshold. And, to me, some of the things -- like, we had included Las Montañas as part of the three. And I understand that -- that they had a disclaimed opinion.

But with their four audit findings, that's what drew my attention. There are other schools that have five audit findings, but also similar material weaknesses, or even more so, significant deficiencies, which sparked my brain to think, okay, well, why aren't some of these that they seem more serious in nature based on material weaknesses, significant deficiencies?

So that's where I wanted point of clarification, because it just seemed quite different than one of -- specifically, one of the three, Las Montañas, there were schools that maybe had more audit findings. So that's where my -- my questions started sparking in my mind.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner Manis.

the foundation was added for that reason.

So I know that, at some point, you have to create a cutoff point. And it was, like, in our mind, it was these three or 14? And I didn't feel like we wanted to issue 14 notices of concern under the intervention ladder. To me, that seems extreme.

So we went with what we believe are the most severe.

THE CHAIR: Thank you.

Any other comments?

COMMISSIONER MANIS: I just wanted to follow up, if possible.

THE CHAIR: Sure. Go ahead, Commissioner Manis. And then Kimberly.

COMMISSIONER MANIS: Thank you for that, because just the discussion helped clarify my understanding of where -- where this -- how this whole process goes about. Because I think that for me, it was something I just wanted clarification on.

And I think based on our previous discussion to go back to No. 6, that was the whole purpose of this going back, to make sure that this could be settled. So thank you for that.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner Manis. Kimberly.

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Thank you, Commissioner. I would like to also just let you guys know that we could upload a document that I have to just give you a quick guide on the types of audit opinions. And that would also be very helpful to help you understand how significant the disclaimer of opinion is. I can actually show this with you right now. I just got permission.

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This is a really good reference term that the Office of the State Auditor had published a couple of years ago, and this is actually what I use when I'm doing my data analysis on the audit.

An unmodified opinion is what everybody strives for. It's the clean audit. So when we looked at School of Dreams, La Tierra, Las Montañas, for La Tierra and Las Montañas, they received a Disclaimer of Opinion.

So that was a really big flag for us, because at that point, our auditors went in there didn't receive the information that they needed. So it was almost like a hands-off. And that is what we don't want. We want the ability to go in there and look at everything and have the information.

So we'll put this in your Google Drive so you can access it and become more familiar with the

from the motion that you all made.

So going in alphabetical order, we say that Alma d'Arte was the first one. And then it goes on to show McCurdy, Pecos Cyber, Walatowa, and The GREAT Academy. Those were the schools that you issued a condition of renewal.

So then what we are doing is showing you the monitoring updates and how we have maintained some level of communication with the schools to provide reminders about the need for sending reports to the -- to the Charter Schools Division. And then there's just some notes that were taken when contact was made.

On the far right-hand corner is just sort of a summary of where we are and any sort of recommendations. I know you're not taking action today. But moving forward, this is what we would recommend. And you'll see that with some schools, the notation also is on track to Meeting conditions.

So in the case of Alma, we are pending some data from the school.

And -- and I also want the Commission to know that, you know, timing is everything, and it's really difficult. As we get closer to your meetings, and materials are finished and sent to the

different types of opinions and why we are asking for, you know, the financial CAP, so we can help them.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Kimberly. I think that document would be really helpful.

All right. If it is okay with the Commission, I'm going to move on to Item No. 8, which is the Report from the Charter Schools Division.

You know, you may have the written -the -- just so that the -- the Commission knows,
the -- the typed-out version, that is an old version
of the document for the agenda. And so the -- No. 8
on this, actually, is -- should not be on there.

So we're going to go to No. 8, which is the Report from the Charter School Division.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Thank you, Chair Brauer. If somebody else could help me by screen sharing, that would be great.

This is item No. 8a. And this is an update on conditions of renewal.

And so what you have in your folder, Commissioners, are all the schools that this year have a condition of renewal. And in the condition details, contractual language is pulled directly schools, we have a procedural -- we have a procedure for PEC where we inform schools ten days prior to your meeting if their name shows up; right?

And we can't discuss any other school or make decisions about the schools. You guys can't make actions unless they get something ten days in advance.

So this -- this is why this -- this document is for -- just an update. I did let all the schools that are under conditions of renewal know that we were going to be talking about it today but there would not be actions on the part of PEC.

That said, I also let them know that, you know, we are going to provide PEC with what we have as of, you know, the date that I sent this last week, and that, leading up to this meeting, if they submitted more information, I can't -- I don't have time; right?

We've been in contract negotiations. We've been in work sessions and in a revocation hearing. So I don't have time to update this with additional information they might provide at the last minute.

So this is a status check. It may or may not align with the dates that the schools have

provided us. This is just to let you know that we're aware of the conditions of renewal. We're working with the schools that have conditions of renewal.

There are some schools that you want to celebrate because they're on track to meeting their conditions. There are some schools that we still need to monitor.

So that's simply what this is.

I think that the school that has the largest conditions of renewal, there's several parts to that. We haven't visited that school. Through no fault of the schools, we don't have an update for you yet. We're planning to visit the school in May. And we may or may not come back with the May agenda to discuss something further about the school.

But this was just mainly to let you know how we are tracking the renewal schools.

THE CHAIR: Is that your full report,

or --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: That's my full report.

23 THE CHAIR: Okay. Seeing no hand raised 24 in person or -- I wasn't sure if there was any 25 questions or -- do we -- we can ask questions; last time. Did somebody have a question this time? I don't have a question.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. We're going to move on then to Item No. 9, the report from the Chair. I have no --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: I'm sorry. Are we on 8b?

8 THE CHAIR: Oh. I asked you if you were 9 finished.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Oh, I was finished with a.

12 THE CHAIR: All right. All right. Go 13 ahead.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: No, I won't make this that long.

So 8b is an update on the school site visits. I just wanted to let the Commission know that the Charter Schools Division team, with some support from our contractors, have done just a tremendous job. We've almost visited all of the schools for this year. I think we have approximately six schools left to visit. We've had to reschedule a few.

But in each case, our -- our teams go to the school, and they do classroom observations,

right? Or do we normally don't?

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: You know, that I think the wording on that item has to change so that it could be discussion -- report and possible discussion, and not -- and just leave out the action part with it, so that there's the opportunity for questions and possible discussion. Right now, it's just a report.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yeah.
THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: We've gone back and forth on this. And, you know, at one time, the Commission didn't want -- it's, like, "No, she's just reporting out to us, and we're not taking questions. We're not discussing." So it's --

MS. BARNES: Yeah. I think we can fix it. But I think also last time we talked about that a question is not a discussion. If they have a question, we can ask it. We can change -- we can talk about that in EC and make sure the language is right.

THE CHAIR: For sure.

Commissioner Carrillo.
 COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Exactly. Because

I remember that was the one that was in conflict

focus groups with all of the leaders and the school community, and within ten days get back to the schools with some preliminary feedback on how the schools are doing.

In some cases, we ask the schools for specific information they need to get us. But the larger share of information that is needed to finalize any sort of annual report comes from documents that are closed out at the end of the school year; so the board training, and academic data.

So just wanted to give props to the team for nearly completing the school site visits. And I wanted to give you an update on annual reports for '21-'22.

I know we've waited forever because we've waited for data to be certified. The last I've heard is that the data will be released May 1. So I am hoping that we would be able to release all that information to the PEC by the -- by the May PEC meetings.

And just so you know, I am in current discussion with Deputy Director Russell and the team to see if it's feasible for us to update the draft annual reports with the same level of data

graphics -- I would say, info-graphics, the charts, the tables. It's a lot of money to -- a lot of time to extract from the Excel spreadsheets and create into beautiful graphics.

Since you have, I believe, decided that you will wholesale approve all of them in one meeting, we may give you a table that shows the proficiencies or other data not directly inputted into the school's report, but maybe would be an addendum to the school's report so it could be referenced.

Deputy Director Russell and I are working on that. But we are also really aiming to have some information for you in May.

And then the final thing: CSD staffing updates.

I actually don't have a whole lot of updates on that. We have some open positions. We have offers made. We're waiting for paperwork to be able to announce any final new additions to our staff.

And that's it. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Director Chavez. Thank you to the Charter School Division team that's here with us today, and also the ones who are not, COMMISSIONER GIPSON: My neighbor.

MR. WAYNE SHERWOOD: Yup. They can have
 whoever, my golf buddy, whoever, do my audit.
 Charter schools don't get that choice.

Second, district schools have somebody working in the central office, maybe one, two, three people working in the central office that that's all they do.

I was looking at that list of charter schools. And I can tell you I know three very closely that they either lost their business manager, retired, left, whatever, or they had to change contractors. Most of the charter schools are now having to go through contractors to do their business management.

So -- and then we lost small school funding. So it's really super difficult for charter schools to even live up to these expectations year after year after year.

And I think they're doing a pretty good job. I mean, I think they're scrutinized a lot harder than the district schools are.

I mean, I have no doubt in my mind that they're scrutinized a lot more. I mean, just what the CSD does, going to a visit every single school

both in person and in Zoom. Really appreciate all the work that you all do constantly for the PEC and for our schools and our children, for sure.

Item No. 9, Report from the Chair.

I have no other -- I have no new or updated PEC or school issues at this time.

Item No. b, Public Charter Schools of New Mexico.

Mr. Sherwood?

MR. WAYNE SHERWOOD: All right. Thank you, Chair Brauer and Commissioners. Just a few things.

One, I wanted to go back to that audit. There was a comment made earlier, "Well, if it wasn't for charter schools in the audits, the State would be great."

I don't know if you guys are all aware, but the charter schools don't have a choice on who's going to do their audit. The State actually contracts out and that's who charter schools get their audits done by.

District schools, on the other hand, they get to choose who they want their audits to -- they can say, "Well, I want my local auditor," you know, whatever --

every single year, and then, every five years, go through a renewal, wow. Do that to a district school and let's see what they look like then, all these district schools.

So kind of a little unfair to throw charter schools under the bus for the audit like that.

Did you have a question?

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Yeah. (Inaudible) at that -- at that breakout session when they were throwing us under the bus. I mean, somebody should have said something. "You guys don't live by the same rules."

I was offended, honestly, by the remark the State Auditor made. And it was coarse.

MR. WAYNE SHERWOOD: I wish I would have been in that meeting, 'cause --

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: I didn't know what to say. But that's what I would just say. Can -- we need to refute that kind of language.

MR. WAYNE SHERWOOD: Absolutely. We do. And that's part of what PCSNM is here to do, to listen to the charter schools. And then that's why I'm coming here to listen to you guys so we can try to work together with CSD. So I think it's really

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Thank you, Commissioner. I was actually at that session at Spring Budget. And I did have a conversation before and afterwards with the State Auditor himself, the Deputy State Auditor. And then I actually met their special investigator, who was also a presenter.

And the conversation has evolved into trying to get a collaborative effort between OSA and charter schools to work with charter schools to see how we clean this up. And part of that is they are willing to come to a meeting or even be a part of our July conference at Tamaya so we can actually have this conversation together.

Because I didn't see or hear from your organization. I knew you were in there. But the conversations that have actually been occurring between myself and the Deputy State Auditor is us trying to nail down an actual time and date for all of us to collaborate together and meet and discuss further.

MR. WAYNE SHERWOOD: Okay. So, also, Commissioners, I'd really like to thank you guys for bringing up the 2 percent. I know the bill was vetoed, and it was something Public Charter Schools of New Mexico was really trying to push just to have the oversight, because that is what our schools want

They don't know where that money goes. When we, as PCSNM, when they come to us and ask us, we can just go back to statute and say, "Well, this is in statute. This is what the money is being used for." But it's very vague.

And asking CSD or PED right now to look at that and figure out where that money is going, I think that's even hard for them to even figure that out, because I know they're short-staffed. I understand we're in a transition phase. So hopefully next year we can push that bill again and -- because that is budgetarily (verbatim). And it's oversight. And it's something all of us as New Mexicans want to know where our taxpayer dollars are going. It's just simple. Where is our money going? If we don't know that answer, we need to

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to see.

quickly add that stories do matter. And telling the story of accountability, like we just heard Wayne tell, is an important story for everybody to hear, that charter schools do have very high accountability. And maybe people aren't all aware.

But people in this building are. And they often look to us of how we are doing the work and consider it to be high quality.

THE CHAIR: Quickly, please. Thank you. MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Another thing I would like to mention is in regards to the way districts are overseen. And charter schools with their audits, it's actually really beneficial that PED continues to provide the same auditor to all of the charter schools, because if we allowed them to go out and independently seek their own auditors, it would be that much more difficult for us to actually

And the big issue, like the gentleman -- I don't -- Wayne -- mentioned is we do have an issue with a high turnover in business managers. But we also have a shortage overall in the state of accountants. So that is actually one of the bigger issues and one of the main issues that was brought

we have as a division.

The next -- the last thing I'll talk about is what we have been doing with PCSNM, is we have been holding meetings with our directors on the calendar. This year there were some pretty big changes. All students now have to go to school 1,140 hours. And that's big for elementary, because elementary was only 990 before. Secondary was 1,080.

So this is going to affect the calendars. And it really is confusing to a lot of business managers and directors trying to put their calendars together, and governing council members, for that matter, because they have to approve it.

So speaking of approval, the tentative calendars had to be approved by April 14th when we just found out -- the Governor -- there was one line in House Bill 2, which is the budget, that PCSNM asked for her to line-item veto, and that was, "All schools must have the same number of calendar days as they did last year."

Well, a lot of charter schools chose to do what's called ELTP, Extended Learning Time Program. They added ten days to their calendar.

Well, they did that because they needed

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the extra money. They were given more money in their SEG. And they were -- they were pretty much promised that, "If you do this, you're not going to be held accountable to this any -- you can just do it this year."

And then once they started doing it, they're, like, they can't get out of it.

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So now all those charter schools and other districts that chose to do the ELTP, they now have to do -- if they did 190 days last year, they have to do 190 days this year, regardless of how many hours they have.

We've been meeting with directors, trying to figure this out and get all these calendars. This week we're going to start working on budget with the directors, because it's another thing the Governor -- the budget said 6 percent average and then a 1 percent on top of that. But she just -- so we know she works that pen well, but just on certain things.

And the one thing she marked out was "average." So now it's a 6 percent across-the-board raise, which is great. But it's really hard for schools to come up with a 6 percent across the board; although, they did get a 13.2 percent

multiple years, we do have to approve or approve with changes if we want to continue to retain Ms. Barnes as our attorney.

We could also explore the possibility of creating a new Request for Proposal as well and entertaining new proposals for a new attorney.

And so our options right now is -- and our discussions are to approve the current contract as is, approve the contract with changes, or approve a plan to -- to renew a Request for Proposal and explore options for new attorneys.

Does that all make sense to everyone? Commissioner Gipson.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I'm fine with this -- approving the contract as it is. I -- I am not in any way interested in opening this up and -- I don't see any reason to.

But it's a very small pool of people who have the expertise to work with charter schools in particular. And I don't see any reason why we wouldn't want to just continue with Julia representing us.
