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the community's behalf that Mr. Casados faced any kind of criticism for his leadership. And that was really disappointing to hear them apologize to him.

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But not once has the governing council apologized for what our community is going to lose with the closure of this school. And not once have they shown any accountability in their lack of leadership during this process.

It appears that this governing council has their head buried in the sand, and they're living in an alternate reality, because they were laughing and giggling during last week's meeting.

And this is a huge loss for our community, and they're choosing to go forward with the appeal that seems like it's -- there's no chance. They continue to move forward in a direction with no real progress. It's just -- it's saddening, and it's sickening.

And even though there is a new governing council president, Isaac Casados still sits on the governing council. They all appear to agree with his leadership. Some of them called him a great mentor.

So I have no faith in the current leadership as it stands at La Tierra Montessori. So right now.

We -- my main question is why are you guys not looking into where all of the school's money has gone? They don't have the money to do everything you guys want them to do. It's \$90,000 they don't have, but they're still going to push forward with trying to keep the school open. But they've never once been able to prove that they can fund it.

They've had issues with funding for the entire year, but no one's once asked them where all that money has gone.

That's my question to you guys today. Are you looking into how this school has been run financially? They are being sued left and right, and they have threatened to sue almost every one of us who has spoken out against them.

Have they been looked at for all of that? Are they being legal in the way they're running the GC in the first place, and is that why our school is being closed? Because they are not.

I would appeal to your better interest, the interest of all of the council members on all of the GCs, to make sure that charter schools are running their money correctly. And this one is obviously not.

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thank you for your time. I really do appreciate it. THE CHAIR: Great. Thank you, Mr. Dudek. FROM THE PUBLIC: (Ms. Ginger Juarez) Are you able to hear me now?

I am also a parent at La Tierra. And while we would love to have our daughter go next year, we wouldn't be able to because we've been removed from all of their e-mails. I get all of the text messages and everything, but I no longer receive anything else.

I feel like -- I feel like the school has done everything possible to make sure that any parent that had a problem or wanted things to be better or could have, in any way, helped have been completely locked out of that ability.

I absolutely second everything Forrest just said. He said it better than I could even

We would love to continue this school. It is the best thing for all of these kids. And it is heartbreaking to watch them realize that they're not going to see each other next year; they're not going to see their building again next year, because these adults can't get their stuff together and actually do something. They've had a year, and all they can do is blame everybody else for what they haven't been able to get done this year.

The whole entire council is rotten to the core. They have had over a year, some of them, have known exactly what the problems were when they came onto the council, and they still didn't fix them, and then they want to sit there and blame other people.

You've been there for a year; it is your problem. The minute you signed on, you signed onto these problems. They are not someone else's.

We are not bad parents for questioning the council. And that is what they have told us the entire time, that we are bad parents for even questioning them. That is beyond the -- that is beyond the pale for them to even think they can tell us that.

Commissioners, I try not to get too emotional. A lot of parents reached out to me this morning saying that they're not going to come to the meeting because what good does it do, nothing seems to have changed.

And, you know, that's often the issue with, you know, trying to effect change in our lives, in our communities.

But I just -- my eighth-grader last year at La Tierra was just destroyed by the principal, the head learner, and this governing council. When you with is on the governing council meeting where they decided to appeal, they had pros and cons. And that's a document that I would also like to draw your attention to, the -- on the "con" side of it, it says, "The Corrective Action Plan would cost \$90,000. We don't have those funds."

The next bullet: "Tenured employers would be rehired."

They don't want any former teachers there, apparently.

"The lease with Tsay Corporation is no longer valid after June 3rd."

So they would have to negotiate a new lease.

"The school would see a change in board additions and departures."

They don't want new board members; they don't want our help.

And the last one is, "Our ongoing fight with the PEC would continue."

Now, I've been at these meetings. I'm a general contractor, and I work for a lot of entities, tribal and others. I would not have taken your demands and recommendations as a fight. I would have taken them as a mandate to get my act

they started the year, they had -- were raising money for a Model UN trip, which was a big part of the Montessori education, where they get to go on a major life-building trip at their last -- as they transition into high school.

And this governing council took that from them and -- just directly. And they're -- he, at the last months of school, refused to go to school because he was being bullied by this principal.

So we enrolled him in homeschool, and he has been volunteering at the homeless shelter, and he's working up now at a circus camp teaching.

So he'll be okay. But there's a lot of kids in this valley that don't have the support that my son has.

And so I would encourage you to go to the Rio Grande Sun and just read the paper, the articles and the statements that some of the kids have made. It's really sad that our community has struggled so hard as it is. And then to have a governing council of a small charter school just ignore our pleas to allow us to help and -- not mine. You know, there's educators, there's parents that really wanted to help.

And then the last thing that I'll leave

together.

So none of these board members should be allowed to be on a school board unless there's strict oversight.

So, anyway, I'll leave you with that. I hope you can see that document. The pros are three; the cons are six. I don't know why this governing council is going to waste our taxpayer money.

And I've got one final thing, is there's probably \$20,000 worth of Montessori furniture and equipment at the school. We, as parents -- I mean, I don't know what to do. I'm going to Senator Jaramillo and to the Secretary of Education to make sure that those Montessori furnitures and equipment don't get dispersed to a lot of nonprofits that don't know what to do.

I leave you with that. I'm so sorry we're in this position. I really applaud your patience and your attempts to help us. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Commissioner.

All right. Item No. 4, School Highlights and Spotlight. And this is a moment where we're not going to have any discussion or take any action during this time. So this is a new -- this is a newish part of our monthly meetings. This has been, in the past, part of the CSD Director's report. But we thought it would be even better to put it closer to the beginning of our time together to engage with some of our schools.

Director Chavez or Dr. Russell, do you want to take it from there in terms of the school highlights and spotlight?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Good morning, Commissioners. So I think I would like to just highlight all of the charter schools who have been COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: I lost my train of
 thought.

There's nothing specific right this minute, because so many of the schools had their, like, special events and different things earlier in May.

But just having attended a number of graduations, the number of kids that are the first in their families to graduate high school and go on to college is astounding. It's something we need to celebrate.

I don't know how we, as a Commission, or the CSD in the way that sometimes districts do, can highlight, either with press releases or something else, our incredible successes and the colleges that these kids are going to. I mean, it's -- it's astounding.

And we don't, as charters, a lot of our kids get enough credit for their success -- their educational successes.

So it's been a great year, was able to go up to Vista Grande. You know, that's a school that just joined us. And many of those kids, first to graduate high school. And it was just -- you know,

closing out the school year with the graduations, the celebrations, the end-of-year events.

I had the great fortune of being invited to an event that Albuquerque School of Excellence held, which was a poetry and literacy festival. And I was so impressed with the students who would get up before the audience and recite poems and excerpts from literature without a teleprompter.

And I know that that event took a lot of time and effort on the part of the teacher. So -- and that is just one example of teachers who are working really hard with their students to make sure that their end of the year ends well and that students are celebrated.

So State charters make up 6 percent of New Mexico public schools; but State charter students make up 50 percent of U.S. Presidential Scholars. I kind of like those odds.

The National Merit Scholars were also announced. And two students from State charter schools were National Merit Scholars: Chau M. Ta from Albuquerque Institute for Math and Science, and

CSD is not recommending against. Just, CSD has no issue with the change, if Commissioners don't.

THE CHAIR: Could you guys shut the door or tell folks out there to pipe down just a little

All right. Is there -- I think there are some folks from the school as well? Missy, are they on the Zoom?

MS. AMANDA CATANZARO: Sure. Thank you, Commissioner. My name is Amanda Catanzaro. I am the Director of Operations at the Albuquerque Aviation Academy.

And, you know, we've just moved into a brand new building. As you know, we just changed our name. And so we wanted our mission statement to really reflect that our primary focus is aviation.

The addition of the hybrid learning is just because it needs to be clear in our mission. We have always been a hybrid model since the school opened. It's just now putting that into the statement as well.

And, you know, just our expansion -- this year, we've added air traffic control internships. We've added AMB (verbatim) for mechanics for aviation this year.

We are adding a ballooning component and -- next year.

And the next one, we're hoping to get is gliders. So we're really working on getting, you know, the entire industry. And so we just want to make sure our mission supports and really shows that that's what our focus is about.

Thank you.

Sorry. I know you're doing two things at once.

> FROM THE PUBLIC: I'm here. THE CHAIR: Commissioner Beck?

MS. MELISSA BROWN: They are, but they can't be seen while the other screen is there.

There we go.

THE CHAIR: Okay. Great. Welcome into our meeting. We wanted to make sure you had a chance to share any additional thoughts around your -- your amendment request.

If you could go ahead and state your name and position as well.

MS. BRIDGET BARRETT: My name is Bridget Barrett, and I'm the head administrator. And our mission statement is focusing more on the aviation focus, because we see that we are set apart by that distinction. And also we're very excited about what we're doing in our community creating jobs and opportunity for our students to become a part of the aviation industry while there's a time for -- it's a shortage that we have in that industry right now.

THE CHAIR: Great. Thank you. And the other person on your team, if you wanted to share anything in addition, that would be great.

THE CHAIR: Thank you so much. I just want to share, Commissioners, when I was the director of the Charter Schools Division, I had a chance to go to this school in particular.

And I never even saw a flight simulator before. And they had two of them. And I had a chance to get in there and just check it out.

And it was just -- kind of just an amazing thing for me to do as a learner and as an educator to see the opportunities that many of your students have to engage in and some state-of-the-art learning that's very specific to a vocation as you all are -are sharing with them.

Commissioners, we can move into questions or discussions about the amendment request.

Go ahead, Commissioner -- sorry --Commissioner Beck.

COMMISSIONER BECK: Yes. Thank you. I just have a real quick question. Why did you take out the part about focusing somewhat on the high-risk students? Why is that not still a part of your mission statement?

Thank you.

MS. BRIDGET BARRETT: Thank you. We really feel that focusing on high-risk students is

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something that every school does as much as possible, and that's just a part of the educational process. And so we just felt that that wasn't really saying what our mission is, what we -- what sets us apart, because that's a given in what we do every single day.

Our program is for all students; not just specific students that excel, but all students.

Thank you.

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COMMISSIONER BECK: Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Great.

But it's so much more succinct now. Like, I feel like it says all the things you need to say without so many words. And I appreciate that, too. Because, I mean, being competent in reading, writing -- once again, that's something that everybody needs to be all the time.

So I like the focus on what makes your school -- like, the promise that you're making to your families that's unique to your school and to your students. So I appreciate the conversation about that part, because it always is, like, "Why are you taking that out? Like, what's going on?"

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to do something to specific students, it always is mildly concerning to me, because we have an open lottery process. And so you can't guarantee who's coming to your school. And you shouldn't. It should be every student that comes to your school.

But I'm also wondering if there was something -- if there was something that you all are doing that is -- you know, like, if you're doing a program or if -- if you were doing something that is special to your school that's maybe outside of the -- I don't know why I can't think -- it used to be SAT, now it's called MLSS -- like, outside of that process, was there something that was -- that the school was doing to give attention to high-risk students before that was different than other schools are doing?

MS. BRIDGET BARRETT: We haven't changed anything as far as what we're doing to serve our high-risk students. That's still a very important aspect of what we do.

And, in fact, we feel that this program provides even better opportunities for students that are high-risk, because it gives them the opportunity to be in the aviation industry. It's something that they can do, and we're giving them all kinds of

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the document was so late is when we first submitted the amendment request in March to add -- and just, correction, to add grades K to 5 to our existing 6 to 12, there were some grade-level things there that were a little off.

But we have added grades K to 5 to our 6 to 12 and increased our enrollment cap. You all increased that in March.

We anticipated that we would need a second building at some point. And, lo and behold, a good opportunity came up, and we've been working on that negotiation.

So when I sent in an amendment request for today, I didn't want to reveal the location, because we were in negotiations. And we didn't want anyone else to kind of step in and use that as leverage in some way. And so we didn't want to share that address publicly.

So negotiations have been finalized. The board met on Wednesday night and approved it, pending your approval today.

If you approve today, we will execute the lease. So the lease you've received is not executed yet, because it's pending this approval today, and that's why you didn't receive it sooner.

previous -- in the March PEC meeting, we were approved at grades K through 5. We also had the enrollment cap increased as well.

And although we can function right now in our current facility at 850 North Telshore for the next -- for the next year or two, we have been experiencing -- and what we've seen with our enrollment this year -- is just exponential growth. And with that, we do need a second facility.

This facility at 1204 Del Rey. MS. KAREN WOERNER: 4201.

MS. KAREN CASEDY: 4201. Thank you. 4201 Del Rey Boulevard is approximately three miles away. So the location would not impact enrollment. In addition to that, we do have buses. That I know of, we are the only charter school that has buses.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: In Las Cruces.
MS. KAREN CASEDY: In Las Cruces. Yes.
So we don't anticipate any impact on enrollment whatsoever.

And so with that, as Ms. Woerner has said, just earlier this week, the negotiations for the lease was finalized, and the board approved this on Wednesday, June 14th. So if there are any questions that you have for us, we'd be happy to answer them.

MS. KAREN CASEDY: Good morning, Chair Brauer and Commissioners. Thank you for letting us be here today.

I'm usually attending virtually, so it's good to see you all in person for the first time. I would also like to introduce two of our board members who are attending virtually.

One is Clara Raley, who is our chair. And the other is Jenifer Lichtenfels, who is a board member. So I just want to acknowledge that they are attending virtually.

I also want to let you know that Karen Woerner works very closely with Explore Academy-Las Cruces in compliance. And that is her role, working with me and supporting me with the school over the past couple of years.

COMMISSIONER BURT: I don't have as much of a question. I'm interested in hearing -- 'cause I don't know Las Cruces well, so I don't know like location or anything to do with that.

But I do know -- I remember when you did the amendment to add the grades, I was concerned about kinders and eighth-graders being together anyway. So I'm always going to be supportive of separating the kiddos.

And I know you have a model of that, like, very similar in Albuquerque. And, like, there's -- I know the kids ride the same buses, but they're very separate, and it's very organized.

So I'm grateful that there's already a successful model of how this could look already very much happening.

So, in general, I'm very happy to have -- I never mind having, like, kinder and older kids being on different campuses away from each other. So, in general, I'm very supportive of it.

MS. KAREN CASEDY: And I'm glad you brought that up, because that is the plan. We're

going to use our existing facility primarily as our elementary campus, our K through 5. And the new facility will be for our mid-high, 8 through 12 -- 6 through 12, yes.

And if you've seen that building and if you're familiar with Las Cruces, it's very suitable for a mid-high school. It even looks like a school. And the square footage will nicely accommodate our numbers.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: And if I may, Commissioner Burt, and Commissioners, the -- just to remind you that the current plan for next year is just adding fifth grade. So we will have fifth through tenth next year. And this change is going to take some time to get the building ready. It certainly wouldn't be for this coming school year. And we don't anticipate adding kindergarten for a while.

But to your point, it is to separate K to 5. And that is why we decided to add fifth. It's not an ideal entry point. But we did decide to add fifth for that reason, primarily to keep the kids at a closer age range. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Gipson.
COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I just -- the whole

is suitable and ideal for us. Yeah.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: If I may add, too, to your point, I'm kind of glad to know that it's a -- I'm not as familiar with Las Cruces. But I'm glad to know it's less busy, 'cause if we are going to have our sixth- to twelfth-graders there, there may be students who want to drive to school. MS. KAREN CASEDY: The outdoor space is -- I believe it's on three acres -- eight acres. Thank you. Plenty of land for outdoor space, which is advantageous, and another reason why this location

Missy Brown took lead with the team in terms of working very closely with this school and ensuring that they had completed all of the items. And, of course, because Ms. Woerner is on the Explore side, I'm sure she's making sure that things look good as well.

But let's turn it over to the Explore team and have them introduce themselves.

FROM THE FLOOR: Thank you, Chair Brauer, Vice Chair Burt, Commissioners, and Director Chavez. My name is Chris Kenworthy. You guys actually approved me in your consent agenda as one of the new board members. I filled a parent board member position.

So this is my first month on the board, but glad to be here, and I appreciate your time and your consideration of the commencement of operations for Explore-Rio. I have a sixth-grader. My daughter is going to be going to Explore. This will be her first year there.

I know she's very excited about it, maybe more excited than I am, just because of the work that I'll be doing on the back end.

So I know we're excited as a school to bring more options to Rio Rancho, to Bernalillo, and

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our tribal communities in the area. It's exciting to have more choices in that area.

I think we've got a couple of our board members joining via Zoom today as well. I think we have Cathy Gaarden and Veronica Sanders joining us. And like they said earlier, I'd like to introduce Jackie Bogue, our new head administrator. I'm sure she can answer some questions as well as Karen or I.

MS. JACLYN BOGUE: Thank you. Good morning. Yes, I am on, Chair and Commissioners. So I'm Jackie Bogue. I have just wrapped up my 18th year with APS. I've been at the same school for all 18 years, which is kind of unheard of.

I started as first grade, second grade, instructional coach, assistant principal, and principal. So eight years as admin and ten years in the other roles.

I really did enjoy working with APS for a majority of -- all of my career. This opportunity came up in November. And I'm at a point in my career where my children are no longer needing me as much. My daughter just graduated from Rio Rancho and is heading off to NAU for fall. So we're super excited with that.

So my home commitment is not nearly as

based on what we were looking for enrollment.

So, again, those of us who know the ropes and the ins and outs of enrollment, your big numbers come in right at the end of July into August. And knowing we're about 60 percent is very optimistic.

And, like I said, front-loading and a lot of training has already taken place for our K-1-2 and our sixth-grade teachers within the past three weeks.

So we're ready. We're excited. I am super pumped that I was able to bring over about a third of my sitting staff from APS over to the charter school.

We are all a little nervous, but optimistically nervous, because none of us have done the charter school. But we are ready for something new and invigorating to motivate us.

I'm sure many of you guys have heard, after COVID a lot of our educators have had a bit of a go of it. It's been difficult. So they are very eager to get into something a little bit more hands-on, where they do have opportunity for -- to something different. And I do believe Explore will offer that to not only our teachers, but to the community and to our students. So thank you.

great. So taking on something as opening a new charter, taking this new endeavor is something I feel I am ready for personally and professionally in my career.

And so -- and to get back to Rio Rancho. I've lived in Rio Rancho. I graduated from Rio Rancho. And I do agree that we need to offer something to our students that's a little bit different, a little bit more engaging.

Smaller class size is one of the big things that really brought me into the charter. Student choice, knowing that students have the option, teachers have the option to teach their passion and to not follow a scope and sequence that, unfortunately, so many teachers are forced to do, and we're tied to testing.

So for all of those reasons, when this opportunity came up in November, I jumped on board. I was officially named and recognized by the board in January.

We are fully staffed as of last week. I am 100 percent staffed. So that's something that any administrator going into summer can say that they are amazingly optimistic for. Training has started, and we're at about 60 percent capacity,

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Explore Team. Director Chavez, did you want to share more about the Implementation Year?

DR. BRIGITTE RUSSELL: Chair Brauer, Explore Academy-Rio Rancho is on track with all of their Implementation Year submissions and ready for their pre-opening visit and checklist.

THE CHAIR: Great. Thank you. We'll move into discussion and questions.

I want to first just share congratulations on fully staffed and 60 percent towards your goals of enrollment. Those are big-time accomplishments for sure. And I know how much work that you all have put into that to make that possible.

And it's great that you have been on the team since November and officially since January. That just gives you such a great ramp to creating the success that you've had at this point. So kudos for sure.

Vice Chair Burt.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Thanks. And it automatically tells me something that so many teachers came and followed you. That doesn't happen if you're not a good leader. You know, sometimes a leader will leave, and everyone will be like, "Bye,

good riddance."

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So for teachers to follow you, to uproot themselves and follow, that automatically says a lot about you as a leader. So not that we ever want to take teachers and bring them to Rio Rancho. But also I'm from Rio Rancho, so take them and Go Rams.

So my only -- the only thing I saw in the checklist that I just wanted to kind of clarify, because there -- almost everything just says complete, like, just all complete.

But one of the things that I saw that we had already -- when we negotiated the contract, we had already gone through pretty extensive conversations as the subcommittee. And when we did the contract was the foundation, and talking about whether it should be included in the contract or not or should we take a look at it further.

And we already kind of did that work. So I feel confident with where we landed with that of not including it, that it wasn't a component unit, and we did not include it in the -- in the -- like, we don't include leasers -- lessors. Like, why is my brain -- we don't include those in the lease.

So I feel like that's a -- I'm hoping we can just move on past that and not rehash it again. decided by that.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: May I respond? Chair Brauer, Ms. Barnes, Commissioners, the -- nothing has changed since we did the contract. So the arrangement is a landlord-tenant. We don't anticipate -- no, the auditors have not weighed in on that yet. We won't have an audit until the first

However, we don't anticipate that it will be a component unit. And our contract is very clear that should the auditors identify it, that we need to provide all the required documentation to you.

So to your point, no, we -- we stand that we are not -- it's not a component unit because it exists -- it is a nonprofit group. But they simply are doing -- supporting charter schools in construction and buildings. And so we're just leasing from them.

That might change if we tried to go into a lease-purchase arrangement or things like that. But right now, we're on a strict lease, and there's no reason for that to be a component unit.

Again, our contract has protection for you all, of course, that we would have to notify you if that changed.

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That's -- and that was in the -- that was in the comments and in the -- it was highlighted in the checklist.

So I don't know if that's something that we can move on from.

MS. JULIA BARNES: I think we are -actually, I'd like clarification.

I think if the entity is found to be a component unit of the school by the auditors, which is -- and, actually, I think afterward-ly, we even got, like, what an auditor checklist looks like, what they looked at. I mean, that's their job and their role.

So I think -- and others can chime in here -- I think the question is has that entity been identified as a component unit? If so, they need to be included. If not, I don't think they are included.

And I think the conversations I had with Sue Fox following that was, "Well, how do we know?"

And the answer kind of came up, like, "Well, the auditors identify that."

And they -- I'll be interested to hear from the school. But I don't know if the auditors have done that yet. So I think it's going to be

THE CHAIR: Director Chavez?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yeah. I just want to add that the school's first audit will occur this summer. Because you've received some money; right? So even though you have not received SEG, schools that are in their planning year that either get advanced payments through the CSP should go through an audit. So we should be able to find out this summer.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: Perhaps that's true; although, no schools have had an audit for CSP grant funding, other than the CSP grant audit itself. But certainly we can discuss how you want to handle

We have not been invited -- this group has not been invited to an entrance conference. All other schools have. And it has not been done with other schools. So I don't anticipate an audit this year.

But, certainly, we can -- if the PEC requests information from our CSP grant audit, what the federal grant requires, we'd be happy to provide that.

THE CHAIR: Speaking of the CSP grant, I had one question on there. I saw that was in

yellow, CSP grant money was currently an issue. I was just curious. Like, how has that money flowed through? Are you all waiting for reimbursements?

I feel like I know what the answer is to that. But I just wanted to hear how that process has been for you all, especially given the ability to hire everyone, to have 60 percent of your students there.

You know, you are hitting the marks on the things that matter a lot. There's so many things that matter a lot. But in terms of having your school whole and ready for operations, you've hit a lot of those numbers. And I just wanted to see and hear from you all how the CSP grant process has been and if there are any current things that are going on that maybe we could explore.

MS. KAREN WOERNER: I appreciate the question, Chair Brauer.

I want to say, through no fault of the people in this room, it's been a challenge. The comment you read was in November. And it was really stressful that we had been awarded a grant of \$800,000 and have to spend -- it expires in September. That's a lot of money to spend and be reimbursed for in a very short amount of time.

I do think it has the attention of Secretary Romero. But it's still not right. So thank you for the question. We are struggling, but doing our best to get ready for the school year.

THE CHAIR: Thank you for that. And I think that I just wanted to hear from you all during this meeting, because I think there is some "hope springs eternal" that we can figure out better ways. Maybe it's not going to be helpful for your school. But as we see schools that are really meeting the mark on the Implementation Year processes and expectations, that this just stirs the -- and agitates the reasoning for ensuring that we can get funding out as soon as possible and also reimburse as soon as possible, so that you all can open with the full team and full load of students for sure.

Go ahead.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Not that it's going to help you a whole lot, but I'm hoping that with Public Schools of New Mexico having the CSP grant money, that it'll -- they'll be able to flow it out quicker than, you know, someone -- it's like, they sit on it here at -- I don't understand it.

And Karen is right. This has been -- you know, we've got -- we hear from other schools that

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I will say they did provide a cash advance. We had some complaints going into January and February. I think we didn't even get the cash advance until May -- middle of May. And right now, she's telling me the date, because Ms. Bogue is receiving shipments left and right at her house because the building is not prepared to take things.

So she's getting them in and bringing them over to the building to be stored.

But we got a cash advance mid-May of \$100,000. And I anticipate another one potentially before the end of June. But we are already at -- it's supposed to be \$340,000. Once July hits, we can't do cash advance anymore, and it will be a reimbursement basis.

So if you do the math, the \$400,000 and so that we will have cash advance for, the rest of the \$400,000 has to be spent and then reimbursed, which, for a new charter school, is going to be extremely challenging because cash flow is always tight.

So I appreciate your question. I'm not very pleased with the PED processes related to this. And this has been an ongoing concern for many, many years, even when I sat in this Charter Schools Division office. And it needs to be rectified.

through other federal grant monies, you know, they're over a year that they're waiting for this, you know. Yet we ding schools for not spending the money.

So it's -- it's almost like this Catch-22, you know. It's like, you know, they can't get it. And then they get in trouble when they're, you know, not spending it as they're supposed to.

So I don't -- I don't know what the answer is. But I -- you know, I do know it's frustrating for any school. But for a school that is starting with zero, it's tough to build up.

So I'm hoping, moving forward, that at least that part of the CSP grant issue will be resolved.

And, you know, going forward, hopefully, there's more money for you available through that grant.

"Grades 3 through 5 participate twice each year in a Social Emotional Learning (SEL) survey that helps Altura teachers and staff better understand and ensure that students are socially and emotionally prepared for their futures."

So this is a Kelvin social-emotional survey. The scoring system is set nationally, not set within their school.

Then we did negotiate the targets for the school. And we do recommend approval of this contract.

So it's a specific portion of their survey that they already do that they're going to focus in and hone in on and show that they're successfully supporting their students in those self-management skills, which we felt like, for an online school, is very especially -- which the school also believes is especially important for students in an online learning environment.

We do recommend approval.

MS. JULIA BARNES: I just wanted to clarify a little bit of the condition. You had two parts to the condition. One was that the school go and study what they could do in order to improve their graduation rate.

They have presented that information, and the subcommittee accepted that as complete.

We also negotiated their mission-specific goals a couple of times. The first mission goal came to us, and it was basically about kind of having kids do classes.

And so the subcommittee really felt like that wasn't quality enough for their mission, and, once again, really had to push the school to get out of the traditional thinking and it be more thoughtful about the supports that they're providing students to have them complete the classes.

And so their mission goal that was negotiated is: "Students will report high self-management skills (as measured by students scoring self-management skills on average as 'easy' or 'very easy' for them) at the spring survey administration."

And this is specifically -- so the school has been providing a SEL survey to students every year. They are taking a portion of that survey that is specific to self-management skills, and they are going to make sure students are doing -- are feeling like they have the support and skills to have that be "easy" or "very easy" for them.

The scale was negotiated, which I want to

I do want to just note specifically that the condition was not to improve their graduation rate, but to take steps to improve their graduation rate.

And, for clarity, we've added a chart in there about their graduation rate, but it's really for information only.

There is a belief that once they studied it and then they implemented what they studied, that it would end up in improving the graduation rate.

So, Vice Chair, I don't know if you want to add to that, but I just wanted to clarify that.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: That if we set the Exceeds too high, it was setting everybody up for failure. And it's, like if you can't Exceed, you can't Exceed. Then you're at Meets. That was my feeling. That you're not at Exceeds.

And I felt very strongly that setting Exceeds at 75, I just didn't feel good about it at all. And I still don't. And I think that, in general, in -- there's a couple of virtual schools, not just this one -- we have a couple of more -- that I just -- you know, I don't like the idea that we make exceptions for the virtual setting the bar lower.

No, it's just not okay with me that we do that.

And there's no bar that's been lowered for them for that reason.

And they do -- we did place the graduation condition on there. And they have to provide those steps that they're going to undertake to hopefully improve their graduation.

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And, you know, I struggle with SEL, being

a -- a benchmark, because it's difficult to measure. But the school clearly -- the Meets is going to be a challenge for them. And I think, as a subcommittee, we've always set those benchmarks specific to the school, whether it's a virtual school or not. And we've looked at what is attainable.

And you do want to make a Meets somewhat attainable, the Exceeds not so much. So if you look at the -- just the raw numbers, it doesn't look good. It doesn't. But when you consider the conversation that took place with that school, this is taking into consideration what that school is able to do at this point in time.

And we're -- didn't set it so that they are -- they initially were setting it so that they most likely would Exceed. And those numbers did change. But by percentage number, it looks like, "Oh, I could never vote for a 78 percent." But, you know, it is very specific to that school, and a challenging population.

So I don't think we lowered any bar because this was a virtual school.

The second thing that happened -- and in just a second, Chair Brauer, what I'll do, because I have it already pulled, is the Board of Finance suspension. I'll just upload that. I'm going to use that wrong word.

The second thing that happened is that the school timely filed an appeal. And they had 30 days to do that. And they did it. And that 30 days was triggered by a letter that Chair Brauer had sent out. And everything -- I think we have to upload the appeal documents themselves. But I think you might already have them.

But everything is in the Google Drive in the revocation folder. And then there also is a post-revocation folder within there. So everything is there for the school, for you, for anyone to see.

Chair Brauer's letter referenced all of the evidence that was there. So that is in a comprehensive folder.

They appealed. And that is timely.

That triggered a 15-day response time for us, for the PEC, that is due a week from Monday,

hearing within 60 days. So the rule and the statute do not align. But I -- I'm -- I'm guessing that he's going to finish it within 60 days.

That can trigger -- that will trigger an appeal process to district court by the party that is not successful.

So if he upholds the decision of the PEC, the PEC would not appeal. The school -- the school would have the appeal right. That's typically what happens. But, anyway, it's to the party that didn't win.

Then there is some -- I think there's other things that can happen after -- you know, I'm just going to tell you that I think, legally, there are quite a few things that have happened post-revocation that are grounds for revocation.

So your revocation went up through the hearing and all of the information that was provided to you. I want to confirm that that included the audit. It was brought in late, but it was brought in.

It did not include anything from that day. So that's why there's a post-revocation folder. But I'm going to tell you that several things in the letter from the Secretary are grounds for an

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appeal -- are grounds for revocation.

The failure to act, as directed by the Secretary, clearly would be grounds for revocation.

Safety and security issues of the students, that would be grounds for revocation.

That would be a Part 2 revocation.

So I don't think you need to go there.

You do not need to go there right now. But you had asked what are the options.

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: A couple of points of clarification for me.

Can the school, during this appeal process, continue to sort of plan for the next year? You know what I mean? Kind of continue regular operation, even without the Board of Finance -- a suspension or a takeover of the Board of Finance?

MS. JULIA BARNES: That was kind of a short question and a hard question to answer. I'm going to tell you that the position that I believe the lawyers for the PEC are going to take in the appeal is that, "No, you voted the school closes July 1, and that school should close July 1."

I think that it's a little bit unclear how that's going to play out. And there's nothing that would stop the school -- for example, like, they revoked. But in case the appeal is successful, would your child..." -- and I don't know how many people have responded.

It is -- I know there's a lot of documents. I believe that it's b.1. And that has a date of 6/12/23, because we strive to get you information with enough time for you to read it. And so that was the update at that time.

Things have continued to transpire. For example, I just now read the board minutes from the La Tierra board meeting on 9/6/23. I had staff there that attended.

We -- we did not --

THE CHAIR: What was the date again? Sorry. 6/9?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: What did I say? 9/6? Sorry.

But I do see the action for the NMPED School Budget Bureau to take over the Board of Finance. I see an action, and it looks to me like they've approved it.

So I think -- you know, I haven't had time since the 12th to comb through every bit of the documents. But it is in progress.

The PED has told the school -- I just heard from Ms. Herrera -- that she has ceased any effort to -- she let go of any signing authority that she has. So she's not cutting checks.

And she's telling me that the next board meeting is on the 20th. And they are in close communication with our school budget bureau and their budget manager, Michael Vigil, who will stay on

They have also -- the board at La Tierra has also drafted next year's budget, as they should, because they did not have the budget prepared in time. But if they are to continue for next year, they need to have a budget, and they need to have a

COMMISSIONER BURT: I just wanted -- if you could just update us on the, like, specific things that CSD and staff have done since revocation.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Sure. Okay. So one of the things that we are most concerned about was communication with families. And so we've asked the school to publish a letter that I wrote that just updated parents on where things were.

This is before the appeal came through. And I think after this meeting, I can write another letter or coach Ms. Herrera in publishing something similar.

Of course, there was a lot of -- there was a lot of items that were linked that led up to the point where we were.

And then there was a meeting that we co-facilitated with Ms. Herrera. Not a school choice fair. But there was a meeting that we invited parents to attend to provide an update. And

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public meeting. So those are things that are pending.

What other updates?

Do you want me to walk you through the school closure plan? Or do you want me to walk you through some of the documents I've uploaded?

So we're all clear, there is a hearing scheduled for Friday, July 7, from 1:00 to 3:00 that the Secretary has delegated Deputy Secretary Amanda DeBell to render the decision on his behalf. That's not uncommon.

He's also assigned Albert Gonzales as the hearing officer. He has served in that role many, many times.

And if you want, we can walk through Document b.1., which is the update on the school closure plan. And also I would encourage Commissioners, if you want to see the most recent actions from the La Tierra board, they have some draft minutes from their June 9th meeting posted on their website. And, again, their next meeting is likely to be June 20th.

Any questions at this point?

THE CHAIR: And I don't think -- one second. I don't think we need to go through each of

this was after the appeal.

There were two parents that showed up. And, of course, as we go along, you know, I get phone calls from parents, or parents maybe that showed up come in. And there's a lot of continued "He said," "He said," "I didn't get notified," "I didn't know about this," you know, like -- so I think that the lines of communication continue to be difficult at the school.

Just this morning, the two entities that made public statements, Ms. Herrera was saying, "You know, there's some untruths."

I am saying you need to be better at communicating. Put a place on your website. Be very clear about your communication, because until there is that concrete written information, where everybody can go to the same place to identify and get the information. You know, the Blackboard, which the school has been relying on, or, you know, there's not kids now that can take home documents, which the letter that I wrote was to be taken home by kids and posted to the website and distributed via Blackboard.

So I think the lines of communication continue to be a struggle.

My staff have obtained a list of vendors. We've also asked the school to provide their list of assets and inventory. It's a bit of a mess. There are some things that are inventoried, but nothing has been labeled with a tag number. So I think that that is what hopefully is happening at the school right now.

This is the coaching that we are doing with Ms. Herrera to be prepared. No matter what. Whether the school closes or not, it should have an inventory with tags.

So that is incomplete.

We were at the school on the last day of school for teachers and made sure that there was a checkout. And Ms. Herrera had created a checklist of items for the checkout for teachers that included returning laptops and keys.

And the question about, "Have you asked your students whether they're planning to return or not" -- because there had been a complete lapse of any sort of lottery information or any sort of check with students about whether students would return or not

So one of the things that occurred on the last day was that Ms. Herrera was expecting teachers

what they're doing currently to move forward with the sort of board actions that they need to be making, the sort of -- the inventory.

I understand that the school was in touch with their landlord and to have a conversation about lease renegotiation. So, again, that meeting may have occurred, and I haven't been updated.

We are in contact on a daily basis. My staff have been to the school physically every single week, if not multiple times a week, to talk to the school and see where they are on these items.

THE CHAIR: Corina, are you documenting that process?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. So we have a list. In fact, Ms. Gonzales is in the process of completing it, because she hears some new things every day. But every single touchpoint, every single action that occurs, we are documenting as far as, you know, we know what's going on. And, again, there's something new every day.

THE CHAIR: Director, also, one question I had about the -- the closure form.

On Part 22, the points of contact, have we already -- I can't remember what the -- I can't remember what it is when we have to go through an

1 RFA.

to call the parents of the students on their roster and to ask if they intended to return or not.

So we have been working closely with the school to obtain that list so that, you know, we know that the school is keeping track. We know who has not answered, who has, what their intentions are

I know I'm jumping around a little bit, too. But on that call with parents, one of the things we had sent to the school, CSD staff presented a list of school options for the school, how many miles away from La Tierra, who is the contact person, what grade levels do they serve, what type of school is it.

There were some BIE, some tribally-controlled schools, some Española Public Schools. And so we made sure that that information was also distributed to the parents.

Again, channels of communication. We -- you know, I think that our next step is to work with Ms. Herrera to make sure that these things are posted to the website so there's no question and so parents get used to looking at the same place.

But we're sort of implementing the school closure at this point, working with the school on

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Contracted with --

THE CHAIR: Yeah. Are we contracting with anybody or started that process yet?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: No, that's on pause right now, because right now there's a pending appeal hearing.

THE CHAIR: So can we still -- we can't -- we can't secure somebody in case there is a need to have a liaison?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes, I think we need to -- we had somebody in mind that we were ready to move forward with, and she took a job. And the other person who was going to be working on the finance items is reading charter school applications.

So I think that timing will work out. As we look for someone who can be the school liaison and the finance person, I think timing will work out for them finishing the work on the new charter school applications to be able to pivot. I think that the timing will work out with the appeal hearing.

THE CHAIR: And, Director Chavez, that --

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those services are still going through the SWREC; correct?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: They are. And we are setting ourselves up to be able to expend funds through the SWREC IGA July 1, yes.

THE CHAIR: I'm not muted to the idea that I know where this is happening through the fiscal year change, for sure. I was just thinking that this is a good time to start building the bench for the liaisons, because it sounds like the Charter School Division is doing a lot of the -- the traditional public liaison work at this stage. And you all have so much other things to do. And if we have the funding to get somebody on and we can start to build that bench, I think would be really good for all of you.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yeah. We are asking around to find someone who lives in Española, because I do think that this is going to be a daily visit to the school. Yeah.

THE CHAIR: All right. Any other -- go ahead.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Real quickly. And I want to say thank you for everything that you are doing, have done, because I think we've identified

recorded. And I don't know if it's posted to the website yet. But that was what we instructed the school to do, and to talk about -- to parents -- what are the office hours where they can come in and request records and copies of records, because the records stay at the school level.

And so if a student is transferring, then the records move to the school. And if the family hasn't decided, then they -- they move to another educational institution, but they don't stay at La Tierra and they don't go home with the parents, the official records, just copies, can go home with parents.

So that list -- and we're also -- I didn't mention a minute ago -- that we have scheduled tribal consultation. Chair Brauer, me, Ms. Gonzales, and maybe somebody from Indian Education will be visiting with the Governor of Ohkay Owingeh, Governor Phillips, on June 22nd. And so in preparation for that meeting, we're also trying to determine who are the Ohkay Owingeh students that have been attending the school and what decisions, if any, have those students made about next year, and what communication, if any, has been occurring with those families to support the

that the communication isn't great with the school. And you being able to, you know, keep that communication with them is really important.

I just wonder if you've got a sense of the numbers of -- of the responses by kids or whether they've come back.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. Yeah, I -- quite frankly, I'm a little surprised at the numbers. I do have a document. And I can pull it up and be more specific. There's a lot of missing information.

But there's quite a number of people that want the school appealed. I believe that they got hope. And they have told the school -- or the school is telling us that they have told them that they are interested in going back.

I also -- I think we need to cross-reference that with the students who have already pulled school records, because I think that -- I think -- I just think there might be the need to verify the information a little bit more closely. Because I do know that parents were requesting records.

That was one of the things that came up during the parent meeting, which, by the way, was

students.

And the final thing I'll say about, like, the inventory and the comments that were made this morning, when the CSD staff visited the school and saw boxes of Montessori materials piled up in a room and in some of the classrooms, we took photos. We let the head administrator and any staff that were within earshot know that those materials were to stay at the school, that they are not to be dispersed to teachers or students or another school or anyone else. They stay with the school.

So that's also in the works for next week.

And, again, this was pre-closure and pre-appeal.

Sorry. It was post-closure decision on the PEC prior to the appeal, because there was a lot of, again, he-said, she-said, statements that are being made to us about people taking home materials or materials being emptied or dispersed.

So we made it very clear that the materials were not to leave the school, that they needed to be inventoried, and should they be disposed, there is a process that would need to occur.

THE CHAIR: Real quick. Was that put in

writing as well? Because I got a little bit worried when I heard about the boxes and -- is that something that could go in writing, too, at least an e-mail to Head Administrator Herrera?

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DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Yes. So if it hasn't already been documented -- and she had a copy of this closure plan that you all have; right? I can be much more explicit about it. But we have reiterated that point.

And it doesn't matter -- I think that Ms. Herrera is super clear about that. And, at the same time, I think that there's some people that are saying, "Well, it's happened," and -- you know, everything that people tell us, have we been able to verify? You know, we're doing our best to verify information. And there is a lot.

THE CHAIR: For sure. I just want to acknowledge that. There is just a lot to go through a school closure. Those of us who have been part of that process understand that very, very clearly.

I think the Commission is empathetic to that. And we're learning as we go, and we know we get more information every day.

And that's the nature of this. But we also have to react in the best possible way to the

that.

And Poms has been out there also. They showed up on the last day of school, just to do a follow-up visit with the school to see if anything has been remedied from their reports. And it seems like there has not been any improvements to the safety concerns that they've reported.

Our -- our site visits are also documented. So we do have notes. I do have photos. We do -- we did make it clear to the staff that we were concerned about the inventory and that everything that we did document, there is no tagging. So that needs to be a completed task with the school.

And once we get that done, then we will have a full picture of what kind of inventory is truly there at the school.

But we are documenting. We're following up. And, you know, we're just taking the next step. Everything was in limbo due to whether or not the appeal was going to proceed. Now we know that that's happening, so we're going to move forward.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Do we have a record -- did Poms provide a report back or just something by telephone? Or do you know what Poms

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: Commissioner Gipson, I have been at all of the site visits, announced and unannounced. And there are some serious concerns, not only that I have financially, but for the children that are there.

And on our annual site visit that we did conduct with them, I just want to make it known that none of their governing board members showed up for

did or did not decide as a result of that visit?

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: We had a meeting with Poms probably a week before they showed up. I wasn't aware they were actually going to show up. I was told by the school that they had showed up on the last day of school. So I'm waiting to see if we get a report.

But I believe that was just a follow-up to make sure that the reports that they had -- to see if they had made any improvements.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Okay. So the site visit report that we have here, you've got also pictures that came with that. So I think that it would be appropriate for us to have that in our documents as well.

And then you did the annual site visit. Did they get -- did they get a preliminary report back?

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: I believe they did.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: From that annual site visit? And I know we've -- I don't know whether we -- normally, we don't.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: No, you don't normally get them, Commissioner Gipson.

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COMMISSIONER GIPSON: (Inaudible due to simultaneous speaking and microphone issues.)

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DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Right. I know that it was shared with the school, however. And so Ms. Davis is here.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I took that back. I'm eating those words back.

And then you folks were there the last day of staff? Or last day of students? Or both?

MS. KIMBERLY GONZALES: We were there the last day of staff. And there was, you know, just the checkout procedure that Ms. Herrera was trying to have with them. Because there was no lottery, they were trying to get an idea of the students that were anticipating on returning or leaving.

There was only a small number of students at the time that were only requesting their records. There was only probably ten or less. That number could have changed from the beginning of the month, especially after the meeting with parents.

But it does seem there is an interest to still have some students attend, and that number is still fluctuating based on the responses coming in.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Is that not -- and correct me if I'm wrong -- because that playground material was paid for by public money, don't -aren't they required to follow a disbursement of public property? So I'm just wondering if --

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: That's going to take some research to determine if it was purchased with public funds. That's a great question,

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And I know you already know this already, Ms. Gonzales. But probably, like, focus in on what we're saying, not necessarily student pictures, it's probably not appropriate for us to share and stuff like that.
