What are Innovation Zones?

The Innovation Zones Initiative brings together cutting-edge programs and funding that are often siloed or disconnected. It supports the integration of graduate profiles, capstones, Career Technical Education (CTE), work-based learning, and personalized supports.

Districts and charter schools apply to be a part of the Innovation Zone Initiative through the NM Public Education Department. Once approved, districts and charters are provided with funding and support to implement these innovative practices in their schools.

CTE Focus—Innovation Zones

For the school year 2023-2024, the New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) has identified 47 schools that will serve as "Innovation Zones," transforming the traditional high school education model while improving the experience and academic outcomes for local communities. The awardees collectively will receive \$11.4 million.

This is the second year of the Innovation Zones Initiative and the project fulfills a recommendation made in February 2022 in <u>a</u> <u>report by PED and Los Alamos National</u> <u>Laboratory Foundation</u>. It applauded disparate efforts across New Mexico to

improve the high school experience and provide better college and career preparation, but it called for a comprehensive approach that can be scaled up to reach a critical mass of high schools across the state. In the year 2022-2023, ten awardees were chosen and \$4.66M was distributed among 10 LEAs.

What is the Innovation Zones Initiative?

In a nutshell, The Innovation Zones Initiative brings together cutting-edge programs and funding that have in the past, been siloed or disjointed. It supports the integration of graduate profiles, capstones, Career Technical Education (CTE), work-based learning, and personalized supports.

Our youth are deeply talented and ambitious, but are underserved by an outdated, inequitable education system and New Mexico students deserve more authentic opportunities.


We urgently need culturally responsive, student-centered innovative ways of engaging students inside and outside the classroom, and the Innovation Zone Initiative is where that work happens.

Jenelle Cummins, Director of Career and

Technical Education and Community Relations for Aztec Municipal Schools, said the district was able to create positions to support college and career readiness, work-based learning and help manage grant funding with its Innovation Zone funding last school year. In addition, the district was able to update its welding shop to industry standard.

In the 2023-2024 school year, Aztec will continue paid internships, professional learning and its partnership with its Native American dorm, Kinteel, to recruit students to enroll in Aztec schools, grades 8-12. Kinteel students will have access to Aztec CTE pathways, mentorship programs, college and career readiness resources, and paid internships.

"Aztec Schools focuses on being different by design for the students' best interest," Cummins said. "We purchased two brandnew vehicles with Innovation Zone funding and will be providing transportation to students who need it for their internships, in order to make it an equitable opportunity. Access to quality internships should not be limited by economic status or access to transportation, so we are helping bridge that gap."




Showing up together, Starting strong

- Expecting and Parenting Youth: Oversees the NM GRADS program to remove barriers to education for pregnant and parenting youth, and to assist them in becoming successful students and parents. GRADS facilitates graduation and the pursuit of higher education, employment assistance, case management, teaches parenting skills, fosters leadership and self-sufficiency. - Health Education: Oversees K-12 Health Education Standards and curriculum. Health Education provides young people with the knowledge and skills they need to become successful learners and healthy and productive adults. Health education is a fundamental part of an overall school health program. <u>Sharona.Secatero2@ped.nm.gov</u>.
- Social and Emotional Learning (SEL): Systematically implementing SEL in districts and schools promotes self-awareness, selfmanagement, social awareness, responsible decision making and relationship skills for all students, staff, family and community. Research has shown a decrease in conduct issues, improved attitudes toward school, better attendance and graduation rates and well and improved staff retention in districts where comprehensive SEL is implemented. <u>Magdalena.Saiz@ped.nm.gov</u>.

DID YOU KNOW?

CTE programs are supported at the federal level by the **Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act**, which provides approximately \$1.1 billion in state grants annually to serve more than 14 million students nationwide.

Career and Technical Student Organizations are comprised of 11 not-for-profit organizations, specifically authorized by the **U.S. Congress** in the Perkins Act.

CTSOs align with the 16 Career Clusters[®] and 79 Career Pathways recognized by CTE.

MAKING AN IMPACT

With more than 2 million student members combined, these 11 organizations have a definite impact on student's overall college and career readiness.



Students who participate in CTSOs demonstrate higher levels of academic engagement and motivation, civic engagement, career selfefficacy and employability skills than other students.



According to the National Research Center for Career and Technical Education, participating in leadership and professional development activities in a CTSO raises students' educational aspirations.

Students who participate in school organizations in 10th grade have higher grade point averages and are more likely to be enrolled in college at 21 than other students.
