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COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Big shout-out for 2 to The MASTERS Program, which is one of our charters up here in Santa Fe. It's on the campus of the 3 4 community college. For those that don't know -- and 5 I didn't even know this until I was on this 6 Commission -- MASTERS is actually an acronym for 7 Mathematics, Art, Science, Technology, Engineering, 8 Reading, and Service.

And service is a really important part of what they do, and they do it on Fridays. And it's not something optional. If you are going into The MASTERS Program, you are choosing that service is going to be a part of your high school education.

They have -- there's a great article in the New Mexican featuring them. They're a Spotlight School. They have grad rates, math, English, and science proficiency significantly higher than the state average.

And one of the things that, really, I think contributes to their success is trusting students to make choices and be more independent through their school day.

And just being on the college campus gives students, I think, a sense of maturity, if you will, in choices that they make and how they approach

funding for a new building to get started on a quite aggressive CTE program.

And they're -- got a lot of exciting things in the works. I just talked to Mike last night, and I just wanted to invite all of you to that -- out to that gathering on November 1st at 9:00 on their campus.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. I have two items to build off of the CSP grant.

This is not one of our schools. But Siembra Leadership is a school in Albuquerque. They also received a specific grant for \$2 million. So just thinking about how much funding is coming into our state. It's good to support good things for our young people. This is pretty amazing.

So congrats to Public Charter Schools, to Siembra and Jaqi Baldwin, the leader over there.

And I also wanted to lift up -- this is not a school, but a charter leader -- Kara Bobroff. who is Navajo and Lakota and the founder of Native American Community Academy, also has been my boss for the last nine years. She has received, this year -- this week is the National Indian Education Association's convening in Albuquerque.

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And I would just say to -- I don't know if anybody is on Zoom. You know, it's something to look at in terms of the way you approach -- attract your kids to different schools.

And I particularly want to call out districts for trying to be more innovative in their programming, to making things relevant and engage other students.

So the head learner there is Karla Moskowitz -- this is her first year -- and then Tina Morris. And both have been in education for decades, and both have just done great work.

Tina actually used to work for the district here in Santa Fe.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Gipson.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: I mean, there -- the data we receive is the data for the contract term, not prior contract terms. So we don't look at the data from previous, because there -- we're basing the renewal on the data from the term that is up.

So -- right. So we'd only have three years.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Two.

COMMISSIONER GIPSON: Two. We'd only have two years for that.

And several months ago, we had someone from NACSA do an on -- sort of an on-boarding. And one of the highlights from the NACSA representative was best practices is not shorter terms, because they don't give you the complete picture of a school.

That's where our job, through annual reports and letters of concern and the intervention ladder, that's where we have to do our due deliberation during the five-year term, and to

more about some of these items.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Why don't we talk more about these items? Why would you want to cut it off?

THE CHAIR: I wasn't cutting it off, Commissioner. I just acknowledged that you can talk.

I think we've talked about stuff. Now we're going back and forth. I don't know if we're going to resolve anything at this stage. So it sounds like we need to talk some more about this in future meetings.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: On that, the concern would be November is coming up. DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Commissioners, the other thing that we heard from the national level is that this draconian line between last term performance and current term performance, and only considering current term performance, is unusual. So the fact that a three-year charter contract doesn't let you look at year one of that -- of data, you would only be looking at two years, because you can't look at the past -- the last year and the previous term, that doesn't always happen with other authorizers.

They look at other terms. They just think about it as a continuous -- like you were thinking, Commissioner Carrillo, the school is in existence. There is data from that year. You could look at three years. But that's something that is unique here. I don't know that -- maybe you would want to add language in any sort of legislative -- if you want to do this, add some language that would allow you to consider full three years and not just two.

THE CHAIR: Since we're not taking any vote today and taking any discussion, let's make this the final thing. Sounds like we need to talk

I just -- so if somebody -- if we've -- sorry -- a five-year contract and then they come back for renewal, doesn't it stand to reason -- they don't have data from the first year, necessarily. But doesn't it stand to reason that there's four years of data for us to look at?

I don't get this idea that there's -- I don't get what you're saying. There's four years of data for us to look at. And if this school is not performing the way they said they would on all sorts of different levels, I mean, I absolutely see the need for three years.

One of the things I'm looking forward to in the conference in Oakland is, I was looking at their sessions. One of them is specifically about this in particular: short -- shorter authorization terms.

So that's all for now. Thank you, Chair Brauer.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. Vice Chair Burt. COMMISSIONER BURT: I'll just say -- I think I'm one of the people that I see both sides. So I'm kind of open. So I would definitely be interested in next month in, like, what you -- make sure you go to that session and come talk to us

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about it.

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'Cause I do also see -- one of the things I'm more concerned by, then, is that schools get a blank slate every five years. Like, that's kind of crazy. That's insane, actually. Like, you don't get a blank slate every five years.

So if there's a way we could change that -- and then, actually, I would be -- I would probably -- probably be very supportive of a three year, because then it is a course of a -- and I do want to see change quick.

I mean, when schools -- when the schools are held to the fire, they do better. Like, it happens.

So I'm not too -- I'm not too conc--because then it is -- okay, for the last four years
it's been this, and the last two, there's been no
progress, you know. And maybe you're not going to
see crazy -- you're not going to go from, you know,
single-digit proficiencies to 50 percent
proficiency. But to see growth during those couple
of years would be a positive thing.

But I'm definitely interested in what you learn from that, because I think my mind is open both ways. And so I don't know if that's something

But I was asked to take a look at the Montessori Elementary and Middle School pre-K program and lottery process.

And I know that this is not a discussion with the school, because it's my presentation. But in the audience, I just want you to know a couple of people sitting in the audience is the current head administrator, Piper Curry, and the long-standing business manager for the school, Mr. Stan Albrycht.

So they came to listen to the discussion.

Immediately after the last PEC meeting, I called the school and had a conversation about the pre-K program and the lottery.

I also went to the school's website, and I saw that the school currently runs two very separate and unique lottery processes: one for pre-K, which is a pre-K -- private pre-K program; and one for the K-through-8 school. And those two don't talk to each other, if you will.

So if you were a third-grader, and your sibling was in the pre-K program, you don't get sibling preference; okay? Those are two separate things. If you had attended the pre-K, you don't get preference for the K. They are two separate lottery systems and processes.

Julia can look into of, like, how do we end this? Like, you can't look at last year. Like, last year doesn't matter. Because that actually -- the fifth

year of terms never matter for a school. They

actually don't matter at all. And that's, once again, crazy.

And so if -- if we can look into what that -- what's the mechanism we have to maybe change that, I'd be more interested in that as a lever for this issue.

THE CHAIR: All right. Dr. Russell. And then, if it's okay, we can move on to the next item.

Go ahead. No? Go ahead. Go ahead.

All right. We're going to move on to Item No. 11, Report from the Charter Schools Division.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Thank you, Commissioners.

So the first item was a request from the Commissioners. And maybe -- I would ask for, first of all, a little bit of leeway in how we word the requests so they aren't literally whatever the Commissioners said, but that I get to word what I'm going to present.

Now, I think that -- you know, I went back into our historical records. And this hails back to some previous administrations that were really concerned about a private pre-K. This was prior to ECEC being created and funded to support the many pre-K programs that New Mexico now has and is supporting.

And -- and so the concern was about it being private. I think the school is well aware of the fact that there is an ECEC supporting early childhood pre-K programs, if they are interested in making it a public program. They are in the process of investigating if that would be possible to have a mixed-age classroom so that it could be pre-K/K, and want to be very careful proceeding with that so that the funding streams can actually be braided together and nobody's going to say, "Oh, why are you using ECEC fund in a classroom that has K students," or vice versa.

So I just reached out to someone in our policy department to obtain some assistance with that, because I have heard the PED encouraging public schools to open up early childhood programs and to have pre-K programs; so how are the others doing that?

And there's probably not some regular public schools that are Montessori, which is unique, and, as we know, has mixed grades. That is the Montessori model. So I am anticipating some support for this school to get some answers about how the funding can be braided.

But I see no problems as is right now. And I invite Commissioners to go to their website, and you can see the lottery processes and forms yourself.

THE CHAIR: Thank you, Corina. And thank you, Montessori Elementary School team, for coming up here today.

Any questions about this specific item on the Charter School Director's Report?

Thank you.

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(No response.)

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: All right?

So we will move on to the update on

Cesar Chavez and the use of the building.

So last month, I presented a lot of information about Cesar Chavez and the fact that the school has, in fact, moved towards more in-person experiences at the school.

And just this week I was able to visit

a private conversation with students or group conversations with the whole class. Both the teachers and the students articulated how important that one-to-one engagement was.

Of note, there's also not any bullying going on at this school, because the kids are not in peer situations that might lend itself to that because of the way that they're operating.

They also use Google Classroom to have conversations, and they meet in person and use phone calls.

The instruction itself during the online courses use things like those little Post-its that go online -- I forget what it's called --

THE CHAIR: Jamboard.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Jamboard. Thank you. Jamboard and other shared documents where the teachers were able to look for student engagement, request students participate and engage very quickly in that.

So I feel like the school is doing student engagement. They are opening the school building. They are increasing the number of in-person courses.

I don't have concerns about the school in that regard.

Is that right?

Cesar Chavez as part of their renewal visit and witness that the school opened up the doors. All the adults that support the students, the head administrator, the social worker, the SpEd co-directors, teachers, staff, were at the school when it opened up, and students were present.

Now, they are operating a hybrid program so that some students are online, and some students are in person. They do offer students that choice.

The building was being used. They had food available for students. They had snacks available for students.

Was every single classroom packed full of kids? No. They have a pretty sort of low student-to-adult ratio.

And I know this wasn't the ask. I think the ask was, do they require the kids to put the -- the cameras on during the Zoom classroom? And the answer is no, they do not.

However, we dug go pretty deeply into the levels of engagement for students. And I feel confident that the school is doing a very good job with student engagement. They utilize multiple modalities to do that.

In Zoom chat, the teacher is able to have

And the head administrator of that school said that if they did not have parent-teacher-student conferences today, she would be here. But I don't think she's in the audience.

She's not in the audience, because today she was meeting with parents and students to do the sessions where they provide a lot of really rich information about student progress at the school.

I also meant to mention that they do a really good job of tracking attendance and -- through their system.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. I want to just mention to Commissioners that I did receive an e-mail a couple of days ago that's also in the record to -- from -- from Ms. Arness. It's Item No. 11.b. And so it does stipulate -- it does share exactly how they're using the building. And it's -- you know, they are -- they are utilizing the full facility.

Commissioner Armijo.

COMMISSIONER ARMIJO: I just was wondering what the student enrollment is right now, if you know.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: We have that in

So, no, I don't believe it's absolute.

THE CHAIR: All right. So are we okay with -- do we have a consensus on moving that forward?

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: You will see it in Vistas, but we won't have a final report. I think what Julia was getting at is will CSD be able to create all the reports exactly the same as we would if -- the answer is no.

And so in a way, this is the school agreeing to -- to have a decision by the PEC with preliminary information available to them, not the exact same report that everybody else is getting December 1.

MS. JULIA BARNES: Just for the record, I was not asking CSD to do that. I was trying to

So what we'll do, what I'm hearing from the group, we'll see -- we'll play it by ear a little bit with the data. I don't think we need to -- if we have the information, we'll make it happen.

The school also may -- we're going to go with the plan to have them in the November, barring any issue with the data we may not have.

To your point, Commissioner Carrillo, I don't want to do a preliminary or any type of thing that we feel like we don't feel comfortable with making decisions completely in November.

And so as long as the school knows that's not going to be on the PEC or in the Charter School Division, but based on the data gods, if we don't receive that information, we'll probably have to deal with it in December. That would be -- that's where my mind is going.

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Okay. So what I'm hearing you say, we will have the data -- okay. Let me just push it -- will we have data for '22-'23 school year on which to make our decisions relative to renewals?

COMMISSIONER BURT: So yeah, I was going to -- that's what I was going to say. I think it's up to the school. But, honestly, to be frank, there's a chance we don't have '22-'23 data for any school, even in December.

So I'm not going to stress about having it or not having it. If the school says we'd like to opt into November, whatever we have at that time, we'll make a decision based off of.

And same thing in December. Whatever we have in December, we'll make a decision off of.

They can't control it. We can't control it. The school can't control it. So I'm not going to stress about it.

So, yeah, I think if the school says, yes, whatever information we have -- even if it's the day we show up, and we got new information, we can look

at that, and the school will have to acknowledge that we may have new information that they are seeing at the same time as us, and that's what they're going to go with.

So I don't care either way. I'm okay with it being in November. And if the data is released, great; if it's not, great. I mean, it's -- either way, I'm not going to stress about it, because we're going to have to do the same thing in December and we're not going to delay the December one, so...

THE CHAIR: True. I'm just trying to figure out where we are on that. So if we're good at that, if you don't mind telling the school that -- Commissioner Carrillo, any final?

COMMISSIONER CARRILLO: Yeah, I'm not good with any of this. I'm not going to stress about it.

I leave here and I don't stress about it.

But right now, I'm angry about this, that we can't get data for '22-'23 for just, really straight, that I can just go on my computer, bring something up, this is the data, this is partially what I'm going to base my renewal decision on. Not okay at all. That's all.

THE CHAIR: All right. One other thing I wanted to mention here underneath "school issues," I

issues that have arisen. But sometimes the loop isn't always closed with all the Commissioners.

So if you do receive an e-mail with somebody, and you're curious, just send that to me, send that to Corina, if it's about a school, so that we can kind of make some decisions.

Does that sound okay? Great.

All right. And the last thing for my report is the Public Charter Schools of New Mexico.

MR. WAYNE SHEPHERD: All right. Thank you, Chair Brauer, Commissioners, Corina, and Brigette. Appreciate you guys having me today.

I first wanted to start out by congratulating PCSNM on the CSP grant, the \$52 million, which is almost double what it was the last five years. And just by listening to everything going on, one of the things that this is going to help is cutting down on the bureaucracy of getting things passed.

So when PCSNM has their application process, the schools fill it out, that they've been approved, the schools are going to be able to get that money in a much quicker turnaround time than having to go through a state agency. And that's a big, big benefit to these schools.

think over the last couple of weeks, this kind of just came up, and I'm just going to ask the Commission just for just a little bit of, like, support in this.

I know that sometimes individuals -individual Commissioners receive an e-mail or
outreach of a school in your district. And then
sometimes we receive e-mails from -- and some
individuals send out e-mails to all of us.

And it sometimes feels that -- it feels like we -- it's a little bit of, like, trying to figure out if they have talked to all of us.

And so this happened in this last month. So if you're ever in doubt wondering what to do when a constituent reaches out about a specific school, just connect with me. I'd love to talk about it.

Many of you did. And many of you have sent e-mails as well. And that way we can kind of know, like, what the -- what the outreach is going to be around certain things.

And so you all did the right things. I talked to many of you about this over the last week or so. And it would just be good -- at least from my angle, I've spent a lot of time on the specific school already and have worked with the PED on

When we look at our -- where this money is going to be going, right now, over the five years, we're looking at nine new schools getting -- getting this money. And they can apply for up to \$2 million.

Expansion schools is 17. So let's say they want to go -- let's say they have a sixth through twelfth school, and they want to go an elementary, that would be an expansion is getting that elementary school part of that. So that's expansion.

Replication, which we discussed a little bit yesterday, we put in there, too, for two schools to get replicated. Don't know if that will happen at all in the next five years. But at least it's on there to have some money available for schools who do want to go through that process.

Something else PCSNM is going through right now is the legislative -- we know the legislative session is coming up very quickly, and trying to prioritize what we want to see.

So first is the revolving loan for charter school expansion is adding more money to that revolving loan. And I want to say that it's -- I think PCSNM is going to shoot for, like, \$20 million

more for that revolving loan.

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We will also continue to fund -- continue to pursuing a funding mechanism for the adult ed programming within our K-12 schools.

And if -- some of you may not remember but when, a couple of years ago, that got cut as -- the adult ed program got cut out of charter schools. And it really was -- yeah, it's been a big impact.

And, supposedly, it went to higher ed.
But -- and I know they're working to do a good job
there. But I think that's -- the K-through-12
schools have been doing this for many, many years
and were very good at what they were doing. And to
cut them out was -- so, anyway, that -- I don't know
if it's still going to be, like, pushing a rope, but
we're going to try. We're going to try to do that.

Just like the small school funding, you know, the small school funding, pretty much dead. Don't even like to use that word, "small school funding." So looking at other terms. But still the small schools need funding. And that's just the way it is. They need to have more funding or they are going to shut down.

There's not going to be a point of having to worry about renewal. Schools aren't going to

a small amount would help the small schools greatly.

The -- and this is one of the last ones. If possible, we are asking to pursue our bill that makes locally authorized charter schools their own board of finance, ensuring that all charters get funding directly from PED and are eligible for all opportunities. Okay?

So that would be a big deal also. So you wouldn't have to go through that -- those levels of bureaucracy that were -- seem to be slowing everything down that -- and frustrates everybody. I know everybody gets frustrated with that. So -- yes, Alan?

THE CHAIR: I would just mention -- sorry. I love that idea. I also think about the unintended consequence of what Vista Grande had to go through. And now they don't have a -- now they're their own board of finance, and now they're not eligible for other reasons for funding, because they don't have a history of other things, especially within the Title funds and things like that.

In my mind -- I know you guys are probably thinking about that, but that's just something that I thought about when we've seen charter schools move from district-authorized to state. There's still an

have enough funding to survive.

And what I'm talking about is schools that are under 200 kids aren't going to have enough money very soon, because this last year was the last year for small school funding.

Yeah. That -- and that is another thing. Yeah, we're running out of ESSER money; we're running out of all these funding sources that we've had for the last year and a half, two years. All those funds will also be gone.

So that's why going to the legislators and saying, "Look, hey, something has to..." -- I know the LESC Study Committee has been looking at what can we do for small school funding.

And it's not just the rural small schools that are being impacted. It's schools that are in downtown Albuquerque that are helping a specific group of students that they are affected by the loss of this small school funding also. That's something PCSNM will be looking into.

One of the other things is -- and many times, Commissioners, you guys have talked about that, the flexibility of the 2 percent funding, finding out what can -- if it's not all being used, can some of that money go back to the schools. Even
