#### **CTE Champion - Ace Leadership 'Heavy Equipment Rodeo'**

CE Leadership High School recently transformed the traditional concept of a rodeo into a modern and inspiring educational experience. In an event aptly named the 'Heavy Equipment Rodeo', nearly 800 students from across New Mexico gathered at the Albuquerque school to delve into the world of heavy machinery and consider futures in various trades.

The event provided students with a rare handson opportunity, allowing them to step into the roles of operators and tackle the real-world demands of handling heavy equipment. It was an eye-opening experience, particularly for those from ACE Leadership High School, offering a window into the expanding world of trade careers.

#### Real-World Applications and Trade Career Insights

Enthusiastic students were given numerous practical glimpses into the life of trade professionals, emphasizing the event's effectiveness in bridging classroom learning with real-world applications. Replacing traditional rodeo elements, the event featured state-of-the-art virtual reality headset simulators, including one for welding, which provided realistic training experiences.

Justin Trager, the Executive Director at ACE Leadership High School, emphasized the event's goal to spark curiosity and inspire students to explore careers in the trades. This aligns with the increasing shift away from traditional 4-year degrees towards vocational trades, as evidenced by the recent surge in enrollment for construction trade programs and auto mechanics and repair.

Highlighting the benefits of skilled trades, Trager pointed out the direct career paths available through apprenticeship programs, allowing young individuals to work, earn, and refine their skills for a stable career.

#### Event Expansion and Student Involvement

This year's event saw an increase in scale, including the involvement of three new CCRB coaches. It offered a comprehensive insight into the vast job opportunities in CTE (Career Technical Education) fields. Students had the opportunity to operate bulldozers, forklifts, cranes, and simulators under professional supervision, gaining invaluable real-world experience.

#### **PNM \$1M Training Program**

**PNM is investing \$1 million in a high school trade** program with IBEW Local 611, starting in fall 2024, to train New Mexico students for electrical industry careers. The program, combining classroom and field instruction, requires applicants to have a high school diploma or equivalent, a valid driver's license, and pass a physical fitness test.

The New Mexico JATC outlines application requirements: being 18 or older, having a high school diploma or GED with official transcripts, completing algebra coursework, and possessing a valid driver's license. Applicants must also complete an online application, pay a \$25 fee, and successfully pass an aptitude test and interview.

Apprenticeship offers include job placement with union contractors, competitive wages, college credits, employer-paid benefits, and training towards becoming a Journey-level electrician.



The <u>Careers2Communities (C2C)</u> program is designed to increase all New Mexico students' college and career readiness, ensuring that those students traditionally underrepresented in higher education and the workplace can equitably achieve high-value careers. C2C is funded by the federal *Expanding Access to Well-Rounded Courses Demonstration Grants Program*, and is **free** for all New Mexico students and teachers.

The College and Career Readiness Bureau is joined by several partners in the

Careers2Communities program, including <u>NS4Ed</u>, <u>MC<sup>2</sup></u> and <u>High</u> <u>Plains REC</u>. Learn more <u>here.</u>

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**Advanced Placement** (AP)<sup>\*</sup> is a program of the College Board. Students in AP courses do college-level work in high school classes. At the end of the year, students can take the corresponding AP exam. When students earn a score of 3 or higher (on a 5-point scale), they may qualify for college credit.

#### **NM AP Canvas Resource Center**

This course aims to provide resources and professional learning to support New Mexico Advanced Placement programs. To access the course resources and professional learning. This course has enabled open enrollment. Students can self-enroll in the course once you share this with them.

#### **AP Classes**

There are <u>38 different AP courses</u>. AP classes are taught by high school teachers on high school campuses (or online) during the regular school day. Some schools may have pre-requisites for students who wish to enroll in AP classes, or requirements for teachers interested in teaching AP classes. Some schools offer students weighted GPA scores for AP classes, but the course work itself does not qualify for college credit.

#### **AP Exams**

All public colleges and universities in the state of New Mexico <u>guarantee college credit</u> to students who earn a 3, 4, or 5 on an AP exam. Thousands of institutions of higher education across the country and around the world also grant <u>college credit for AP exams</u>.

AP exams take place in May. The courses are designed to prepare students to succeed on the exam, but students may take an AP exam without having completed the course. Most students take the AP exam at their own high school campus. The exams are scored on a scale from 1 to 5, last for two to three hours, and consist of both multiple choice and written questions.

Students must pay a fee to take an AP exam\*. Some schools pay the cost of the exam. The College Board reduces the fee for students whose households qualify for free or reduced-price lunch, and the New Mexico Public Education Department pays an additional portion of their exam fee, so that qualified students only pay a nominal amount per exam. #### **Benefits of Taking an AP Course**

Although students can expect that AP classes are more rigorous than regular high school classes in the same subject, they are worth the effort for those willing to try. Besides potentially earning college credit, just a few of the many reasons to take AP are:

- AP classes provide a challenging and engaging environment where students get a taste of college work, boost college skills and increase their confidence.
- AP students are more likely to be accepted by the college of their choice.
- AP students are more likely to graduate from college in four years.


