# 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers

21st Century Learning Community Centers, situated in elementary or secondary schools, or other accessible facilities, offer a diverse range of high-quality services during out-of-school hours, such as before and after school, or during summer break. Schools and community-based organizations awarded funds by the state can utilize them to conduct various out-of-school activities.

The goal of the 21st CCLC Program, as outlined by the US Department of Education, is to establish community learning centers that assist students in high-poverty, low performing schools in meeting academic standards. Moreover, these centers strive to provide a wide array of supplementary services to complement the regular academic program and offer educational development opportunities for families of participating students.

## NM 21st Century '22-'23

### By the Numbers

There were 8,765 students!!!

Students participated in 239,506 hours of activities related to Science, Technology, Engineering, & Math.



### STEM

### Adult Family Members

96% of Adult Family Members agreed/strongly agreed to "Overall, I think this program is good."



### Academic Outcomes

Students improved in both Math and English/Reading from quarter one to quarter four.

### FRPL

In total, 97% of the NM 21st CCLC students qualified for free or reduced-price lunch.

- 3% American Indian or Native Alaskan
- 23% English Learner
