














CS Statute Timeline




2013

The **CS Statute** was passed by the State Legislature and Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham. It laid out a framework for "an evidence– based school initiative."

2019

The CS Statute was amended to include **state funding**, beginning with \$2M for planning, implementation and renewal grants. HM44: The Community Schools Task Force established with the intent to: determine adequacy of current grant funding, effect of the lack of recurring state funding on the sustainability, need for indicators, & cost and return









Figure 1. Essentials for Community School Transformation







PED CS Division strongly encourages schools to prioritize funding for a Community School Coordinator (CSC) position. This individual will play a crucial role in implementing the CS strategy and offering collaborative leadership support for the 5 funding categories identified in the HB2 SEG funding (above); the dynamic and data-driven CS strategy facilitates the convergence and strengthens all five HB2 initiatives. PED encourages districts that use the CS funding to **self-identify those CS** so that PED can provide resources for those schools (QMC, annual conference, evaluation, etc.). \$150,000 each year for each eligible school

All grants applications for SY 24-25 will be scored on a rubric



A one-year, one time grant for up to \$75,000 for each eligible school



The Role of the CS Fiscal Operations Coordinator

CS FOC Role:

- Member of the CS QMC team
- Plans and Coordinates day-to-day operational, fiscal and clerical activities of the CS team including internal and external logistics and reporting.
- Coordinates fiscal operations
- Administer recordkeeping
- Support budgets and allowables
- Training and support for fiscal sustainability

The HM44 task force was commissioned in 2023 to establish guidance on sustainability of the CS strategy, grants, certification and rewriting the statute.




Statute Update
