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Good morning, esteemed members of the PEC Commission.

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I'm here today not only as a concerned member of our community, but as a staunch advocate for the health, safety, and the rights of the students, faculty, and staff of Alma d'Arte Charter. The issues I bring to your attention are not mere grievances, but urgent matters that demand your recall, immediate attention, and action.

Let's start with the violations of the special education rights within Alma d'Arte.

Imagine the plight of students who rely on Chromebooks as part of their IEPs, only to have them -- these essential tools confiscated before the semester's end, leaving them stranded without means to complete their coursework.

Furthermore, the recent removal of accommodations from students' IEPs and 504 plans without due process or consultation is a blatant disregard for the rights of these vulnerable students.

Equally concerning is the deliberate misinformation that was propagated by the administration regarding student attendance.

The administration's reporting of zero

The lack of diversity and transparency, coupled with instances of nepotism, such as the recent appointment of a board member's husband, raise concerns about conflicts of interest and fair governance practices.

Additionally, the recent election of officers, which merely involves swapping titles among the existing members, further suggests lack of genuine leadership rotation.

Moreover, recent aggressive behavior by Ms. Skaggs toward individuals, like Eden Louchet (ph), during the most recent board meeting are contrary to the Alma governing bylaws, Article II-F and Article V-E, under Conduct, which mandate professional conduct with courtesy and respect.

These issues underscore potential ethical violations and raise concerns and questions about the board's commitment to fairness, impartiality, and transparency in its governance practices.

Transparency and accountability at Alma are severely lacking, as evidenced by the school's website failing to provide current and essential information. Documents such as meeting minutes, financial reports, and agendas have not been updated for months, depriving stakeholders of vital insights

tardies among students is misleading due to new policy that considers latenesses as absence, skewing the attendance records.

This misinformation may contribute to the involuntary disenrollment of students with purported excessive absences, leading to the repercussions such as transcript withholding, impacting their academic progress, GPA, and graduation prospects.

Proper procedures for handling these attendance issues appear to be lacking, exacerbating the situation for affected students. The lack of transparency and accountability in this matter is deeply troubling.

Furthermore, the nepotism and cronyism that plague the school's governance structure undermine the integrity of the board and compromise its ability to serve the best interests of the students.

Three of the four board members have close ties to Kim Skaggs, the current president of the board, indicating nepotism and cronyism within the board's structure. This situation undermines the board's ability to fulfill its governance and responsibilities and prioritize the best interests of the students.

into the school's operation and finances.

Moreover, despite the continuity of some administrative members, including Ms. Skaggs and Ms. Swafford, who have served on the board for three to four years, the website still displays outdated information as of March 14th, 2024.

This persistent lack of transparency raises significant concerns about the school's governance process and undermines the trust in the institution.

The erosion of the LGBTQIA acceptance within Alma d'Arte Charter High School contradicts its stated principles of inclusivity and diversity. The removal of rainbow-themed items and the engagement of mental health providers from Catholic Charities, an organization known for its conservative stance on LGBTQIA issues, has created a hostile environment for vulnerable students.

This environment undermines students' abilities to express their identities freely and seek support for mental health struggles.

Given the heightened risk of mental health issues among LGBTQIA youth, the school's actions endanger the well-being of its students.

Tragically, the school has already

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experienced a student suicide this year. We do not need more. This underscores the urgency of addressing these issues.

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Furthermore, the involvement of the religious organizations in mental health services raises concerns about the school's adherence to the principal of Separation between Church and State. As a public charter school, Alma d'Arte is obligated to maintain religious neutrality and provide a secular education free from religious influence.

However, the current situation suggests a departure from these principles, potentially marginalizing students of diverse religious backgrounds and compromising their access to equal educational opportunities.

This deviation from the core tenets of the charter school operation is deeply troubling and demands immediate attention to ensure the well-being, safety, and rights of all students.

The troubling history of Dr. Amador's disruptive behavior and questionable actions cast serious doubt on --

So good morning. And what Ms. Holguin just did was take the wind out of my sails. I had a lot of things to cover. She covered it so well. I want to support everything she said.

And my question to the Commission -- and, you know, I included my e-mail when I signed into the system, and I wondered if anybody might e-mail me back about this.

But what is the remedy for schools when you have a hostile takeover of a governance council, when you have people who get in power, as she said,

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Well, I'll just go to the last part.

So given the serious issues plaguing Alma d'Arte Charter High School, I appeal to the Public Education Commission to take urgent action. It's imperative that the Commission declare Alma d'Arte in a State of Emergency and issue a 72-hour Notice of Breach to the school administration.

These steps are necessary to address the SpEd violations, ethical breaches, transparency deficits, and discriminatory actions that have persisted unchecked.

The mental health, safety, and well-being of Alma d'Arte's students, faculty, and staff hang in the balance, and it is the Commission's responsibility to intervene decisively to ensure that the school operates with integrity and accountability.

Thank you for your attention to this urgent matter.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. And I apologize. I forgot to state that we're asking public comment to be limited to, as best you can, two minutes. So I'm going to ask those that are still on to please try to stick to the two minutes.

I appreciate that. Thank you.

who use nepotism and cronyism to keep their power, are unaccountable, and they refuse to be transparent, and they allow real bad actors to do what the administration at Alma d'Arte has done.

What really is the remedy there, because we don't have -- the community can't vote them out. They can't vote better members on. The governing council rejected a very qualified candidate at the last meeting in February, one has to assume for political reasons.

And the remedy -- so I guess it's a rhetorical question, because I guess the remedy is you-all's emergency procedures.

I want to second everything Ms. Holguin said and say that the emotional and mental health of students, families, and staff at Alma d'Arte is important enough to consider this an emergency situation. Please stop slow-walking this intervention ladder process and please get to work. Somebody needs to protect these kids, and it's you-all that needs to do it.

We've been trying. We, for three months, have been talking to media people. We've been talking to elected officials. We've been talking to people in the PEC. And still it feels like the

governance council and the administration of Alma d'Arte have more rights than the rest of us do.

They're being treated with kid gloves. Please take off those kid gloves and get to work.

THE CHAIR: Thank you.

MS. MELISSA BROWN: Finally, we have Cindy DeLancy (ph)?

FROM THE PUBLIC: Okay. It's DeLanoy.

Can you hear me?

THE CHAIR: Yes, we can.

FROM THE PUBLIC: Okay. My name is Cindy DeLanoy. I am the mother of Malachi DeLanoy, the student who committed suicide from Alma d'Arte.

Dr. Amador has proven himself unfit for any position with children. He has a history of bullying.

I read an article October 23rd of 1918 -of 2018. He was accused of bullying a Carlsbad High
School student who took a stand for a Second
Amendment at a rally involving him and other
Carlsbad students.

Malachi was at Alma d'Arte one and a half weeks with -- with Amador in charge, and he went home and hung himself in his closet. High School students' artwork that was designed to bring to light social issues, and he let go almost all of the art teachers at the art school, Alma d'Arte.

Not only that, but he did not have certified teachers for the science program -- for the science classes or the math classes for almost an entire semester this first semester. My child is behind because of it.

My other child had to leave that school and take a year off because he was being bullied by that stupid man that's in charge. He was glaring at him and making snide remarks when Michael would walk by. And Michael was trying to get over his brother committing suicide.

Amador had a settled lawsuit because he had a so-called "viewpoint discrimination." He said that the woman who -- the mother of the student who he bullied at Carlsbad, he said that she called him a dirty Mexican. And no one else heard it. So there was a lawsuit that he settled out of court.

And he now said that Ms. White, the science teacher that he -- that he let go -- it was because she called students --

We have to live with this.

I had another student there at Alma. I was -- because I kept asking for help in getting these -- the student that was bullying Malachi addressed, I didn't get any satisfaction. I kept asking for a meeting. I was ignored, ignored, ignored. So I went in, and I got very loud.

When I finally got very loud, I was pulled into his office all by myself. He does not allow any witnesses for the person complaining, only himself, so that he can lie. And he does lie.

So I was removed from campus and told that I was not allowed on there at all with threat of arrest.

I still had a student enrolled there. I wasn't even allowed to contact teachers.

So the -- the reports are, at the last -- last time I talked to students that were still going there, he is still -- Amador is still going through the hills mad-dogging and bullying the students to try to intimidate them into behaving the way he wants, not the way that they should -- not the way that children should behave.

He has a history of destroying art projects and programs. He destroyed the Carlsbad

you to try to finish up.

FROM THE PUBLIC: All right. There's no substantiation behind his calls to being called the victim when he's actually the bully. He lied to me. He said there were no reports of bullying when I know there were, because I reported it and so did several other students.

He appears to be bounced around different schools rather than being addressed. It seems to me like he is being treated like a Catholic priest who sexually abuses students instead of being addressed and taken away from being involved with students.

My son will not be the last suicide. He will not, if he's allowed to stay there.

THE CHAIR: Thank you.

MS. MELISSA BROWN: And, finally, we have Janet van Coblijn.

THE CHAIR: Good morning, Janet. You can unmute yourself. And if you will, once again, state your name and spell your last name for the record.

Oh. I'm calling from Doha, Qatar, with -- I'm here. So, obviously, this is important to me,

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as well as the people who have also made public comment.

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A variation on some of our concerns includes the manipulation and smearing of -- and lying about -- and accusations against teachers and students, and even parents, of sexual misconduct. But if there really was sexual misconduct in a classroom, there's been no police report, no investigation, no follow-through, and it's being used to the detriment of student and teacher, as well as a manipulation tool by both Mrs. Romero and Dr. Amador to follow whatever this agenda is.

And as has been stated, the lies, the deflection, and the manipulation of truth is -- it's overwhelming.

And we've been through this -- this has been going on for -- since September: the threats, the intimidation, and the targeting.

And the fact that the children, the students, have been so adversely affected, whether they had to leave because Amador disenrolled them without following the procedure, or because they felt that they weren't getting any of the classes, they weren't allowed to take the classes that they wanted, or because they felt that the environment

And not only should he not be allowed to teach or be near students at Alma, he shouldn't be able to be in a school anywhere. That's it.

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COMMISSIONER BURT: Yeah. So this one --I mean, I would love nothing more than to just send an exemplary notice to the school. It is statistically, reputation-wise, the best high school in the entire state, I mean rivaling very expensive private schools, you know, in Albuquerque. So it's frustrating to even have any kind of wavering. I mean, like, they are an exemplary school.

So I'm frustrated by two things.

I mean -- and this is what I was just talking to Commissioner Manis about. When I was a teacher, it was difficult to -- like, it's hard to separate grading a student based off of their attitude, their effort, versus what they actually do. I feel like this with this school. So the mission goal not being complete is so frustrating. But it looks like they're killing it, if they would just submit the correct documentation.

So I'm struggling with -- it is -- is -like, they're doing all of the things they're supposed to be doing.

through the Intervention Ladder.

And so I wonder if there's a different way to identify it without saying, "and it needs to be corrected by the next Annual Report" kind of thing. Because we already have that pathway. So just wording it differently, like, acknowledging that there was this issue, but not saying -- like, acting like it's the first time we're talking to them about it, if that makes sense.

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So do we, like, give them -- switch them from an Exemplary performance overall just to a Satisfactory, just because they're difficult to communicate with? I mean, that's -- it's my -- I wonder if there's a different avenue to deal with the communication levels outside of the Annual Report, because I feel like there's a little bit more context in here.

This is an Exemplary school. They have exemplary results.

I don't want to give them just a satisfactory because the communication back and forth is difficult.

So that's kind of where I'm leaning on that.

But the other thing that I want to say about -- in the motion, I think it's a little tone-deaf to put the -- the lottery issue in there, because we did take care of that in a separate process as well. So I don't feel like putting it in here again makes a lot of sense. It makes -- I think it's just, like, that we're not even thinking. Like, we're just doing it because it's on there, and not being -- not thinking about what that actually looks like. Like, we did this on a separate avenue I think that's where I'm -- maybe the

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: I agree with Commissioner Beck -- I mean Commissioner Burt. I would eliminate -- I would close the paren after "mission-specific goal" in the first paragraph that's bold. There's no need to be there. It's almost like a nitpick, a (indicates) that that's there.

I would just eliminate that -- where it says "lottery concerns that were largely..." -because that -- they were largely addressed. So it is like a nitpick. It says right here "Albuquerque" -- oh, that's right. I'm sorry. I should probably try getting more sleep.

Change it to "Exemplary." I, like -- I agree completely. This -- on every -- yeah, there's some little things here and there. This is an Exemplary school. And it's like -- and there is no way on earth that I could, in good conscience, have

this as Satisfactory, a school of this caliber, and two schools also have Satisfactory.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Brauer.

COMMISSIONER BRAUER: Madam Chair, I -- so I have a couple of thoughts here. I appreciate what other Commissioners have shared. I think this is a little bit of a tricky one, because I would love to give the, like, full-fledged School of Excellence. They do great things. The team is doing great things. I personally think -- I've seen progress in terms of the communication as well, and I want to, like, give credit where credit is due.

At the end of the day, though, this school has very specific policies and procedures for their students and their staff. And if they are not followed, if they're not corrected in terms of behaviors and stuff, things happen. There are consequences.

For us, we have a -- a framework that every school knows. They know that they have mission-driven indicators, that they should and ought to have that around, and that they matter; not for us, but because they created these for their students.

So I am good with satisfaction -- or

an innovative and unique opportunity for children. That's different than what they get at a district school. This school is a great example of doing great things for academic excellence.

We also need them to do what they said they were going to do with their mission-driven indicators. That's why I am good with satisfaction (verbatim). And I'm fairly good with the motion as it is. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: I said "Director."
DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Oh, sorry.
Commissioners, and Commissioner --

Vice Chair Carrillo, I agree that this school is excellent. I would send my kid there in terms of the academics.

And I think you have an agreement with the school. The agreement is for us to be able to analyze the mission-specific goal -- goals. And they have not provided a full set of information that would allow us to analyze them thoroughly.

Similarly, I know that you-all engaged in some agreements with their attorney and the school around allowing us to see how their lottery and enrollment process met expectations. And there's one final step that they have not closed the loop

satisfactory. I want to give credit where credit is due.

Commissioner Carrillo, they're a School of Excellence when it comes to academics.

You know, I will say student starting points are probably a little bit different than some of our other schools, so I just want to acknowledge that, too.

I'm really proud of the school's work in creating a new pathway with their lottery and enrollment practices. That's important.

And I know it's important to the school to be acknowledged for the work that they're doing, just like we want them to do with their kids.

But I think at the end of the day, we have a very specific, very clear Performance Framework.

Commissioner Burt, I agree with you wholeheartedly. I think I would characterize it more not in terms of we have an issue with their communication with us; I'd characterize it more with you didn't actually provide data on a specific part of our Performance Framework, and that's the issue that I see.

And our charter schools are under the watch of our -- of our community at large to provide

on. So we aren't certain that they have eliminated the teacher recommendations for students who attend.

So I would say until they close that loop, I don't feel like they have complied with what you are expecting of them and what my office has been charged with: analyzing and reporting back to you.

Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Carrillo.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: Excuse me. This is kind of to Julia. So I still think Exemplary is the right way to go. And I saw you just typing there in the motion acknowledging the concern related to 4.a.

So since that would be part of the motion, I'm going to move -- so on the motion, you have a note at the bottom. Do I read that as well? Okay.

I move that the PEC provide an Annual Report Notice to Albuquerque Institute for Mathematics and Science indicating a Notice of Exemplary Performance, and identify the failure to provide sufficient data to allow the first mission-specific goal to be scored as Unsatisfactory Performance on Page 11 of the Annual Report.

This should be corrected by the next Annual Report.

And acknowledge a concern related to 4.a.,

Rights of Students -- and that's the lottery -- from 2022 to 2023, that is being addressed through the Intervention Ladder.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Second.

Commissioner Brauer.

COMMISSIONER BRAUER: I take umbrage with Exemplary. I just don't understand how we just -- we just moved from the Satisfactory to Exemplary. This sets a precedent that we only care about academics.

And I care about academics. Don't get me wrong. But we also are in the business of innovative and unique schools that are doing their jobs.

And we don't have a very important piece of data, Commissioner Carrillo. And you're setting a precedent that I don't think that feels really good. And so I know you're not going to take a friendly amendment on this. But I really feel like it behooves us to have this as Satisfactory, and we continue to work with this school to ensure that they're doing what they're supposed to do, which is

by next year, I would have more of a concern with continually giving them that overall.

But I also think, again, that this can be corrected in a different area outside of the Annual Report. And I think if we need to move to the Ladder of Intervention on the mission-specific goal data being provided correctly, I feel more comfortable with that, rather than -- I mean, this is incredible data. I mean it's incredible data. It is the best school in the entire state.

And I'm -- I won't let the one -- one piece on their mission goal and then the one piece on the other part that we are taking action on to derail the entire school. That's where I am standing with supporting it.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: I have a procedural question. And Mike had his hand out. Procedurally, does this mean that, Commissioner Brauer, did you just propose an amendment? And what's -- procedurally, I don't remember what happens.

THE CHAIR: I wasn't sure -- I didn't think he actually proposed a friendly amendment.

COMMISSIONER BRAUER: No, I did not. And for the record, I will -- this is not going to hold my vote back. But I just think that I just take

to provide data to the CSD and then to us around their mission-driven indicators.

And when you don't do that, for whatever reason, I don't know how that's -- I don't know how that's exemplary. I just don't. I don't get it.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Yeah. I mean, I'm going to support Exemplary, because they did provide data. They didn't do it in the way in which their mission was written. But we can see from the data they provided that their students are excelling overall on the PSAT, like, I mean, absolutely killing it compared to the average New Mexico student.

So they're still -- I feel like when it's in- -- insistently (verbatim) known as the best school in New Mexico and competitive across the country, for us to say that it's not, and it's just satisfactory because they didn't provide the data in the way in which they should have this year, that -- I think, once again, I think there's tone-deafness to do that.

And so it is an Exemplary school in -- in almost every single aspect.

But I do expect these two pieces to be corrected by next year. If they weren't corrected

umbrage with saying it's excellent.

And I hear everything that was just said. It's just -- and I'm not trying to be a principled person here. But I just think that, you know, there's consistency that matters. And I did not -- I just stated that I knew you weren't going to take it.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: Michael was -- I just had the procedural question to ask. Michael is next.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Taylor.

COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yeah. Thank you.
You know, I tend to agree with what
Commissioner Brauer is talking about, because, you
know, I see the Exemplary should not have any ticks

know, I see the Exemplary should not have any ticks against them, in my mind. You know, there should be no box unchecked, you know.

And the idea of putting them -- giving them a satisfactory overall rating might be one of those things that -- that -- make sure that we have that information next year, rather than wait another year and see if we get it, see if we improve communications and so forth.

So I feel -- you know, again, you're absolutely right. Academics is incredible. You

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hate to -- I hate to even bring -- be having this discussion about a school that's doing so well, you know. So -- but I -- I do -- there's that check in my heart that says, "Hey, you know, if you want Exemplary, make sure you get this stuff to us. Get it all to us the way we asked."

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THE CHAIR: So we're kind of caught in the middle, because I want to fully acknowledge the academic excellence of the school. I do.

But the Performance Framework is the critical piece of the contract that schools have with us. And the mission-specific goal is core to that Performance Framework.

We just spent a week digging into mission-specific goals, and the mechanism for reporting to us and our responding to it is this annual report. It doesn't sit outside of anything.

And when the school comes on the new contract, when they do, they're not meeting their mission goal I think can have significant consequences to what tier they're going to be, and that, hopefully, they pay attention to this.

My biggest challenge is the lateness of these annual reports at this point in time. So that I feel less necessary to dig into this one and hope

It's not just academics.

Financially, they are good.

Organizationally, they are good.

It is the lottery and not providing the data in the correct way.

They did provide data; they did not provide it correctly. And if they were unresponsive, we should be proactive in, hey, they're not doing it, and move through that process.

But I don't want to do it now.

THE CHAIR: And, hopefully, the new data system will help manage that better. Hopefully. So that we can -- we can do this and get on it as quickly as we can.

Commissioner Ingham.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: Okay. So not really understanding why they were unable to provide the data and just wanting to know, is that -- they didn't care enough to give us the data in the right direction? Or it was unavailable to them, and they could not?

That's what I'm trying to get to is if it's -- if it is -- I mean, it's fairly clear to me that the evidence that they're satisfying that goal, it's pretty clear that they are. It's just not

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that we can continue the communications for next year. It's almost like, "Well, it's March of '24, and you're telling me I did a bad thing back last year, when I'm closing out this year."

That's my only big issue with this.

So I'm -- I'm going to reluctantly support this as it sits.

Commissioner Burt.

COMMISSIONER BURT: I would also say, in the future, when any school is nonresponsive to providing their mission goals, that should be a Letter of Concern then, like, "This should come to us."

The school's being unresponsive about their data. We should put them on the Ladder of Intervention and send out a Letter of Concern about unresponsiveness to the data, not waiting until we get the annual report and then, "Oh, they didn't respond" -- it's way too retroactive.

Like I said, this is an effort thing. This is a communication things. It's not a results thing.

And I think that that -- I just feel like this -- when you look at the school holistically, every single thing on their whole thing is green. aggregated to the individuals or something like that.

I can't -- I can't hold them back for something they were unable to fix. If they were just doing it out of stubbornness, I would go -because, I mean, I can imagine after their interactions with their attorney that there could be a matter of stubbornness.

But in my estimation, I just need to know. Was it -- was their ability to provide the data in a correct manner inhibited by circumstances beyond their control?

THE CHAIR: And I think, at this point in time -- it's too late to start asking those questions at this point in time, you know. I think that was absolutely a question that should have been asked a long time ago when the data was first requested.

But at this point in time, you know, I --I think that the -- yeah. But I appreciate the -and I think that's something that -- on us to make sure we get those answers before we get to this point. Yeah.

they did not meet the financial -- that part of the framework. Like, they earned a Does Not Meet in their Annual Report.

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This school did meet the -- they did meet the standard for -- I mean, like, the overall -- yeah, overall rating of the last school was Does Not Meet Standard. That's why I voted for them to drop down.

This school is a Spotlight School. They meet the standard. So it's making me -- I have a little bit more pause. And it's more of -- I mean there are schools that we gave Exemplary to that were lower in the State -- in the State Accountability System that scored lower than this school that we did give Exemplary to.

So I think, for me, it's identifying the areas. I don't mind listing out the graduation rate that's below the State average. I think that's fair to list it out.

THE CHAIR: Thank you. And now we are on to the second piece of Pecos Cyber, which is the Condition document. So -- I'm going to ask for just a moment.

COMMISSIONER BURT: I was wondering if I could get, like -- if there was any way Director Chavez, if you could give, like, a synopsis for us on what their condition has been looking like, from your observations.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Okay. So this is -- again, over a year old, and the lead person on this is no longer working here.

But if you will look at the document provided to you-all beginning on Page -- beginning on Page -- what is that? -- sorry -- where their culturally and linguistically responsive curriculum plan for the school on '22-'23 is. It looks like they have made some effort to comply with the conditions by providing dates in which they have met with the equity team to create a -- some curriculum that is responsive. And they list the people that

because that's what I -- it did look like, when I saw just the chart at the end, it was ongoing, complete, ongoing -- or just completed.

And I do think that this -- they did do what I think was the spirit of the condition. I don't think this condition, in particular, was -- I think it is one that can be completed and we can move on from.

And I'll just say I actually am very -- I did look over their -- one of the coolest parts that I saw is if you review their Readiness Assessment from the first year to the next year, number one, I'm grateful that the school is very honest in that first Readiness Assessment. And they really did identify places where they were not -- you know, they weren't doing this yet, which definitely did make me feel better about us voting on this as a non-condition. We did get the sense of it, so that shows we were on the spot.

When you look at the next one, they're making so much progress, I was very much encouraged that they hired Dr. Hollie to come in and do the training with the teachers. 100 percent of the teachers attended trainings with Dr. Hollie. I hope that they saw this practice being meaningful to

are responsive.

Additionally, they -- they claim that everything is completed and ongoing in terms of the implementation of the -- of the curriculum and the school's commitment. And they provide links to all of the source documents.

This will be very much like our data system, where we want people to upload. You should be able to access all of the information by clicking on those hot links.

THE CHAIR: So can I just -- for a second? I want to say that quite a few of those links are -- were invalid. I tried. And I got -- now, I didn't know if it was because I was using my iPad, so, therefore, it's a mobile and it wouldn't.

But they were -- I couldn't open them. So that was somewhat disconcerting to me.

Okay. Yeah, I couldn't. Okay. That's all I wanted to say, that I -- so maybe on my desktop, I can.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: The CSD finds that they completed the requirements under this condition. Thank you.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Burt.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Thank you for that,

I hope that it's something that they feel like was a good step for their school as well, because from the data that I see -- just from the documentation, not the data -- but the documentation shows that a lot of work was done on it. Like, that's what ideally we see, the academic outcomes continuing to increase and that, like, as this being an input.

COMMISSIONER BURT: Yeah. I mean, I'm open. I think -- like, what I'm struggling with is I think there's, like, two dynamics going on in my head: Knowing that this is a very special student population that's predominantly, like, deaf or hard of hearing. And I think that they -- like, that's -- that is something the school needs to take into account.

But also, in the same -- like, on the other side of my brain is you know that, so your supports for the student should be lifting them up to a point where they're graduating -- the graduation rate, I am not worried about. I am not concerned by that at all.

But I do have questions on if they don't have their -- if the siblings, the general ed siblings, are not in the school anymore for high school, that's -- if that's accurate.

But other than that, I'm not worried about graduation rate. I'm not. I'm not concerned with that. But I am worried about growth and proficiency still for this school, because that's the point of special education and IEPs is to lift up students to where they're still successful compared to their

State assessments.

So that was disappointing. So I think that -- so I struggle at this point in time knowing what that school does. And I don't know why this looks like this.

And I don't know -- so, in my mind and my heart, they're doing satisfactory performance. It doesn't show on this paper. And that's where I struggle.

And I -- I wish, in a way, he had been our spotlight the month before, because that might have been able to answer some of these questions. I don't know. But it might have. Because I don't know if it's because of the assessment and challenges of involv- -- I don't know. It was before, and that's why they were waivered from it.

And there was consideration in the State Accountability System. There's no consideration for them in the State Accountability System any longer.

Commissioner Manis?

COMMISSIONER MANIS: I guess my biggest concern -- I understand all the challenges that they might face. My biggest concern is just the amount of negative growth, even in the subgroups. It's just widespread.

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THE CHAIR: You know, it's --COMMISSIONER BURT: And, I mean, the -where I see is I know this school has -- I mean, it was like 60 something percent students with disabilities. But also students with disabilities have accommodations for testing. And that's supposed to then still show their growth.

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It's still supposed to -- they're supposed -- they're supposed to have the accommodations that allow them to be able to succeed in their individual growth in the same way as any student who's not on an IEP.

If they're -- if they have multiple disabilities, or they're at a level of special ed to where the assessment really -- they're just unable to do the assessment, they don't do it. That's in their IEP that they don't take the assessment, or they do an alternative assessment. And it's not included in this data.

So I also am concerned that any student who took this assessment should have had the accommodations and the supports behind them to still show academic growth. And students who are at the severe level of disability to where we're, like, "Oh, we shouldn't even be looking at assessments for

not being assessed."

And because knowing that population pretty intimately, there are levels that you -- there's only so much support you can give in an assessment to a student that has -- that cognitive ability is not there.

So I know that that school has accepted a huge population of very, very involved students, not just hearing-impaired students. And I think that, basically, in some ways, the name doesn't quite match.

My sister worked for them, was one of the founding members. And she ended up leaving because they kind of changed their -- their directive from that. And this was before the new administration.

But their population is a very involved population. And so I don't know if -- when you make that assumption, I'm not sure you can make that honestly. I'm sorry.

THE CHAIR: Well -- and I think if there are concerns about that, it can -- that can be hopefully addressed and put aside with the Spotlight, that that's not part of this at this point in time, except looking at -- you know, I acknowledge there's a struggle looking at this data,

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that student," they shouldn't be on this report.

But either we need to switch it to Unsatisfactory overall, because it's not just academics -- but if you don't, we really should incorporate that their overall rating also did not Meet Standard. So either adding that or -- but I actually feel like it should be Unsatisfactory overall, because of -- due to that.

THE CHAIR: Commissioner Ingham.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: I disagree. I think if you look at the places where they have these red marks, Rights of English Learners, that is specifically a target for schools that are relating to people that are not being served in their language field. This is different -- a different one. I am just going to bet that criteria doesn't fit this.

Program requirements. I know that there is a huge problem with finding people to work in these communities. So, yes, they're probably struggling to meet that.

And that was the other one with staff credentialing. I'm sure those are big issues.

With attendance and retention, I cannot see giving a school like this a red mark for attendance when you know that that every student in that group is going to have to continue with all sorts of surgeries and blah-blah, everything else in the world.

Internal controls. Okay, yeah, they need to get to that. And the financial reporting, they are -- so there's two that I can say that are significant that they failed in.

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THE CHAIR: So they had three Unsatisfactories in the Performance Framework. Just -- I'm trying to think back, because there's other schools that have had three red. So I don't know how they didn't meet the overall standard. COMMISSIONER BURT: All the yellows, too, as well.

THE CHAIR: Was it the three yellows? I mean, there's -- they've got 17 Meets Standard.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: So -- I'm sorry. I'm calling on myself here.

THE CHAIR: I'm sorry.

I would agree with Commissioner Burt on this. If it were just one area or another, I think Satisfactory would be okay. But here we have, you know, staff credentialing, we have attendance and retention, and then the financial pieces. So I'm glad that -- excuse me -- that Rafe is coming next month. And we can talk about this more, you know. But I -- I would rather a designation of Unsatisfactory.

But the rest of them -- and if you're just going by sheer numbers, many of those, I can't rely on that being specifically appropriate.

And then the next slide talks about how the charter schools, plus six foundations, had a total of 147 findings. I think there's more than 49 State charters. That's an error.

DR. BRIGETTE RUSSELL: There's a total of 58 State charters. However, only 49 State charters had findings.

DIRECTOR CORINA CHAVEZ: Oh, that's right. Thank you.

So that's why there's only 49 that had -- and with a total of 147, the relatively clean audits were 56, and two schools had disclaimed audits which we know is the worst.

The next slide shares a breakdown of the type of audit findings, with 38 material weaknesses, 16 significant deficiencies, Other Non-compliance at 54, and Other Matters at 34.

There's fewer repeat than new audit findings overall. And the number of findings of schools-plus-foundations show that more schools have only one with their foundation, and then two, and then three; and quite fewer have up to nine.

There's one school plus its foundation that had nine findings.

on this. So size of school doesn't matter; location doesn't matter. But there was one other school that had no audit findings, but their foundation did. So it didn't make the list.

So there are some Schools of Concern. You already noted last year with Estancia Valley, and so it's carried over to this year. They had a disclaimed audit with nine findings; five are repeat. Five material weaknesses, two are significant deficiencies. And there are a number of schools with five or six findings.

The second document I have that we aren't moving to quite yet lists every school and the total findings.

So just, in summary, 49 charter schools had findings. And six foundations together made 147. Those are the numbers. And the schools that had disclaimed, one is closed, but they had an audit last year; and one is still open. And there's one qualified school.

And so these -- the next slide shows you what the most common findings were about. So capital asset recording issues and then the -- the coding errors. That's where this plays into the idea of why didn't the school get reimbursed. That

And, yes, the nine schools that we are celebrating with zero audit findings. Big shout-out to 21st Century Public Academy, Cesar Chavez Community School, Cottonwood Classical, New Mexico School for the Arts, North Valley Academy, Pecos Cyber, Roots & Wings, Southwest Prep, and Taos Integrated. Zero audit findings.
