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


CTE Champion: Gordon Bernell Charter School Opens New Career Development Center

Cimarron HS Students Build Elk Made Out of Horseshoes

(<u>KOB, May 11 2024</u>) - About 26 Cimarron High School shop students came together to build a life-size elk made out of metal horseshoes.

School officials say students in the Welding 1 and 2 classes have been working hard over the last four classes to get it done.

The project began with a silhouette of an elk chalked onto the shop floor. Students then bent, cut, and welded over 330 horseshoes together.

The final size of the elk is over 8 feet tall and 9 feet wide. Its antlers are made out of well pipe.

Officials say the elk will be auctioned off, with all proceeds rolled back into the shop program to fund their next project.



"The Career Development Center will be a cornerstone of career exploration and individualized career pathway services. Here students will have access to a wealth of resources designed to help them discover their passions and talents," said Executive Director Beth Dorado during the ribbon cutting ceremony. "As we cut the ribbon today we are not just opening a new center, we are opening doors to endless possibilities. The work that will happen here is nothing short of transformative – it will change lives."

The new Career Development Center offers impressive new learning spaces such as a culinary classroom, carpentry and welding shop, virtual reality career exploration tools, and an adult education classroom. The building also features new staff offices, a cafeteria and patio space, and rooms for quiet studying.



The mission of GBCS is to "transform lives from the inside out" by empowering students of all ages, both inside and outside of incarceration, to build a future based on academic competency and professional readiness through a high school diploma pathway and an adult education program. The new center will play a crucial role in furthering this mission by providing students with hands-on experience in various career pathways within high-quality educational spaces.

The success of CTE can be attributed to various factors, but two of the most important ones are collaboration and dedication. These qualities are abundant at GBCS, evident not only in the construction of the new Center but also in the spirit of its faculty and students. It will be thrilling to observe the ongoing growth and development of the school and its programs.

Roswell CTE Programs Receive Funding to Help Students with Supplies

(<u>Alika Medina, KOB, May 14, 2024</u>) - Over 100 Roswell High School students in career technical education completed their pathways this year.

A resource that allows students to get college credit but also get job opportunities, certification, and real-world experience right out of high school.

"We've had the AG, we've had auto shop, and we've had welding. But it hasn't been until the last 10 years that we have really, really focused on growing that CTE programs to give students another option," said Rosalba Mendoza, principal for Roswell High School.

Roswell high has 11 pathways, from culinary arts to welding, and veterinary science. But the school is hoping to give high schoolers more options.

"We're looking into the human services. That one can break down or break out into two different career pathways, either the social work or counseling pathway, or a police officer or being a corrections officer. That one breaks down into those two," said Mendoza.

The high school got a \$5,000 scholarship from Airgas, a welding company, that will allow them to buy supplies, welding equipment, and awards for students who complete their pathway.

"We had a gracious donation from Airgas this year, and we used that money to build a toolbox for our top four completers this year who are going on to the college," said Hollis Boardman, CTE teacher at Roswell High School.

Roswell High School got another \$5,000 to add a propane course to the CTE list. With the money, they will buy equipment and pay for instructor training to teach students propane services in the HVAC field.

"This is a new layer that we would add into our construction department that we've never had before and other certifications our students could have," said Boardman.

What's Happening with AP?

Advanced Placement (AP)® is a program of the College Board. Students in AP courses do college-level work in high school classes. At the end of the year, students can take the corresponding AP exam. When students earn a score of 3 or higher on a 5-point scale, they may qualify for college credit.

AP Classes: There are <u>38 different AP courses</u> taught by high school teachers on high school campuses (or online) during the regular school day. Some schools may have pre-requisites for students who wish to enroll in AP classes, or requirements for teachers interested in teaching AP classes. Some schools offer students weighted GPA scores for AP classes, but the course work itself does not qualify for college credit.

Pre-AP Readiness Workshops

This course aims to provide resources and professional learning to support New Mexico Advanced Placement programs. To access the course resources and professional learning, this course has enabled open enrollment. Students can self-enroll in the course once you share this with them.

AP Exams

AP exam scores of 3, 4, or 5 guarantee college credit in public colleges and universities in New Mexico. Many higher education institutions in other states and worldwide also grant college credit for AP exams.

AP exams take place in May. They are scored on a scale from 1 to 5, last for two to three hours, and consist of both multiple-choice and written questions. The courses are designed to prepare students to succeed on the exam, but students may take an AP exam without completing the course. Most students take the AP exam at their high school campus.

AP exams require a fee*, but some schools cover the cost. The College Board offers a reduced fee for students whose households qualify for free or reduced-price lunch, and the New Mexico Public Education Department pays a portion of the exam fee. *Additional fees apply to AP Capstone, canceled exams, and exams requested after the ordering deadline.

Benefits of Taking an AP Course: Although students can expect that AP classes are more rigorous than regular high school classes in the same subject, they are worth the effort for those willing to try. Besides potentially earning college credit, just a few of the many reasons to take AP are:

- AP classes provide a challenging and engaging environment where students get a taste of college work, boost college skills, and increase their confidence.
- AP students are more likely to be accepted by the college of their choice.





New Mexico National Board Scholarship

The NM PED National Board Scholarship is available to teachers. Through funding appropriated annually by the NM Legislature, the New Mexico Public Education Department is able to award up to \$500,000 in grants to eligible teachers who are seeking certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

A teacher is eligible to apply if:

- They are a resident of New Mexico (J1, J2, and H1B visa holders are not eligible); and
- They hold a valid level 2 or level 3A NM teaching license; and
- They are a full-time teacher of record at a New Mexico public school in the 2023–24 school year; and
- They submit a letter of reference from their current principal.

The Department will prioritize awards for candidates seeking initial certification in high needs areas, however a small amount may be set aside to support teachers who are in the process of renewing their certification.

Application window: Monday, April 15, through Friday, June 28.
