My comment is a 24 Despite formal grievances being filed by 25 little over two minutes, so I hope you'll allow me 25 parents, the school falsely claimed there were no

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formal complaints. The board has not taken any serious action, despite being presented with issues and concerns, since April 2023.

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Programs such as the lowrider bike building were only offered to select students, not the entire student body. Similarly, Alma students were involved in the Taste of Las Cruces event, but their culinary instructor was excluded, raising questions about transparency and inclusivity.

I challenge any one of you to speak to all of the students, not just the select few they would have you talk to, and ask what their life was like this last school year.

The board's primary responsibility is to supervise the principal. Persistent issues at Alma indicate gross negligence in fulfilling this duty. The board's inaction has led to numerous Corrective Action Plans and serious financial concerns.

The administration and board's actions have slandered teachers's reputations and negatively impacted students. Requests for information have gone unanswered, and there has been a lack of dialogue with the community.

Many students and teachers are not returning for the school year.

This same man destroys student artwork he does not agree with; for example, a piece for a community display meant as a social statement. Yet the governance council, at best negligent and at worst insidious, hired this man to oversee our art school.

Despite numerous complaints by many, many people of valid -- of valid proven violations by both governance council and the current administration, no true corrective actions have been taken.

The governance council continues to violate OMA on a regular basis. The SpEd monies have never been properly accounted for. 504 and IEP violations -- 504 and IEP violations that have formal complaints filed remain unresolved to the satisfaction of students and their guardians.

This known, repeated adult bully has a student under his so-called care who has committed suicide after only two weeks of bullying by him and a group of students.

This bullying was denied by the so-called administration, even though not just myself, but other students, brought it to his attention.

PEC and PED continue to simply offer,

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I ask the PEC to take action to hold Alma governing board and administration accountable.

Good morning, member -- good morning, Madam Chair, Commissioners, and support members.

The public charter school overseeing and correctional action abilities are -- is a profoundly damaged system. A man who has a proven personal history of bullying students under his so-called care since he -- since at least 2018 is still working amongst the most vulnerable, our high-schoolers.

This man bullies by glaring, thrusting his chest out to flex, and subtle threats such as, quote, "I'm all you have. Do it my way, or I'll leave with a new job, and your school will close leaving you stranded with nowhere to go."

quote, what I consider slaps on the wrist. The malfeasance of funds remain unresolved and not properly accounted for. The administration continues to flex, and he blames his blatant assault on his so-called arthritis in his back.

Mean activity and the lack of consequences is astonishing. I can't help but wonder if my child -- if the result -- if the suicide had been someone else's child, someone more involved with PEC or PED instead of mine would have brought forth faster results.

I think that greater attention and more results need to be brought about and have the governance council and the current administration removed now, even if that means having to close the school that we all know and love.

I'm a part of the Save Alma group.

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Listening to your guys' discussion earlier about the Zia symbol, definitely don't put anything in the middle of it. I learned the hard way that is not okay.

On to Alma issues.

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I'm just wondering how long this is allowed to go on and why actions need to happen. I do believe that there needs to be an independent audit of the school's practices, particularly pertaining to disenrollment and enrollment of students.

I don't believe the data that was given to you guys is accurate, because at least two students have -- and families have approached me having been kicked out of the school. And it doesn't -- and they said that there was no one who got kicked out of the school because of disciplinary action. And I know that's not accurate.

Also, it's an awful lot of students. But you asked for the information in -- I believe February was the first time I heard you guys ask for enrollment/disenrollment and whether they were SpEd students or not.

There's no reason that he shouldn't -that the administration could not give you that "van." Second word C as in Charlie, -o-b as in "boy," -l-i-j-n.

Greetings to the -- everyone.

It's like -- I'm sure you're tired of hearing from all of us. On the other hand, my question is when is enough enough?

We're -- we've been after -- pursuing all different venues for months, if not almost close to a year now for some of us. When will the administration and the governance board -- governing council -- be held accountable?

If I kept saying to my employer, "Oh, I'll get it to you next month." "Oh, I'll get it to you next month, "Oh, okay. We'll give you two more months."

They were supposed to have stuff done now -- what is it? -- the third or fourth or the fifteen extension the 8th of July; yet, they're not on the agenda at all, which I can understand, because if you're fitting two days of meetings into one day, you don't have time for Alma, because Alma keeps sucking up most of your meeting.

And that's the first part.

The second part is I think a lot of us in Save Alma are resigned to the fact that there is no

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recourse at this point other than to close the 2 school, because there's no avenue for any 3 possibility for us, in any of the options that we've

4 explored, to take over the school, to, obviously, 5 work with the administration, which has been

6 unresponsive to that, and to the extreme since 7 Amador came on board -- even before he came on

8 board -- when he was selected a little over a year 9 ago.

> And -- but it cannot continue the way it is. There are now almost no teachers left at that school. The administrator, in particular, is targeting individuals who are highlighting concerns, legitimate concerns, by going after them; me, for one, others as well, at their work, with false slanderous and libelous allegations, which, you know, instead of doing anything to correct anything.

And now there is a new, yet another, SpEd Corrective Action Plan for a specific SpEd student, and there will be more coming. And, yet, it's like, "Oh, well, we'll get to it next time."

"Oh, we'll upload it five minutes before the meeting; is that okay?"

information. Last meeting, I heard -- I believe Missy said they did not have that information because SpEd had not given it to you.

There is no reason the school shouldn't be able to tell you how many of those students were SpEd students. SpEd students continue to be discriminated against at Alma d'Arte. And I know from personal experience that having -- if I did not have good SpEd services as a student, I could not have the life I have now.

And so I'm really concerned that we're letting our students down, that this Commission has let this get too far. There have been students and parents who have begged for help, both at the council, at the student -- I mean, at the -- the board meetings and here, and nothing has happened.

And so I am very, very concerned that this has gone on just too long.

Today I'm coming here because months ago, I came to you all, and I asked you for assistance. But, unfortunately, no one here could help me. So I had to advocate for my son. And I did have help from the Alma parents.

Well, the investigation for my State complaint ruled in my favor. Alma's on a Corrective Action Plan for two violations. And I'm sorry. It's -- it's a bittersweet moment that this worked for my son.

The charter school failed to evaluate the student after its Child Find duty was triggered. The charter school's actions and omissions towards the student resulted in the denial of a "free and appropriate" education.

And this happened because I didn't give up, and I advocated for my son.

I don't have their name, but I know it's from Pecos Cyber Academy. They had a student recognized.

And the other is a state -- a district charter school student from Sidney Gutierrez school. So I just wanted to say congratulations to -- it's quite an honor. Not that many students get recognized. So the fact that we have two charter

But now, I learned today that there's homeless students who don't have anyone to advocate them -- to advocate for them. They have one parent, and she's just being pushed to the side by

administration. And Alma's refusing to enroll them.

These students who really need support like my son probably won't get it from administration.

The lowrider bike project that was mentioned that didn't involve all the students, if it had been announced, I would have been able to offer my contacts in Albuquerque who do this exact same thing, but with different city officials in Albuquerque. And I spoke to them. They would have donated time and parts.

Instead, the school ended up paying \$5,000 to a person here, when it could have been given for free, and the school could have saved that money.

The administration is doing everything possible to exclude parents. When is someone going to help us parents who are trying to help students and keep Alma d'Arte and return it to its once-respected school? Because right now, nobody respects this school, and nobody is respecting administration, because they don't deserve it.

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I sent a request to the Special Ed Bureau to go down and do an audit of Alma's special ed files. And they did comply. But they indicated that they could not get there until the last week in July.

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We're also -- we've been in the process of doing, through the independent contractor, the financial audit. Concerns had been raised. There was additional information that that contractor was getting. And it's -- it's quite a bit. And it's quite a bit of work for both sides. And, unfortunately, it was also the end of the contract year. So that independent contractor -- one contract lapses, and then another one starts. So there was a small -- and it was a small gap -- but there's a lot of information that's being asked to be gathered for that.

So to be able to have all of that information to be able to make a qualified vote, we wouldn't have that information from the contractors or from SpEd until the end of the month.

So anticipating that, that may take a bit of time on Friday.

The school is traveling up a significant distance. It is the beginning of Indian Market. So

So my recommendation is to add an afternoon on Wednesday afternoon -- well, I would --I would do new application. And if -- if -applicant teams need to be advised. We have at times had applicants drop out after the recommendation. I'm not saying anyone is. I'm not making any assumptions.

But applicant teams need to be clearly communicated with that this is a flex schedule until at least the week before, because if someone drops out, we will move.

So if someone dropped out, we would drop off the Wednesday afternoon, and then we would start the new applicants on Thursday. If we still had three, you know, we can -- we might be able to do three on Thursday. And then we could have a work session and a meeting on -- a short work session and then the meeting on Friday.

But I think we have to, you know, to be fair to the school that's coming up on Friday, to give them the time that's needed and the opportunity to get here. I mean, even finding a parking space on Friday is going to be tough. Even though Indian Market technically doesn't start till Saturday, folks are in here.

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it's challenging to be here during that time.

I want to be thoughtful to the school that's traveling up. If they went too late and they wanted to, say, stay, they're not going to be able to. There are no rooms in Santa Fe during that time. And the rooms are exorbitant if you're making a last-minute decision.

So I want to be fair to the school that they're not sitting in the audience until 2:00 in the afternoon, and we're starting because we had a new school applicant that we're doing Friday morning.

I also -- based on the indicators of distress and our budget, I think we need, at the very least, a short work session, because we can't delay those items to September. Those are, you know, items that we're going to have to move sooner rather than later on.

So we need a -- a very condensed work session sometime during there. So I'm somewhat challenged to think that we can do three new applications on Thursday, and a work session -well, but do three on Thursday. And then if we do a fourth on Friday morning, we're not going to get to the CAP until late on Friday.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: A notification. They don't necessarily have to approve. The point I'm getting to is -- okay. So they're on a balance schedule. Let's say they do go to Alma. Alma is not even in yet. They get their food and everything

that this meeting is happening. But to speak to your -- what if we send -- I don't think -- it's a notification for the move. Because if we said no --

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: All right. So what I'm getting at is -- I'm a fan of just taking the bandage off quickly, because it is what it is. Based on information that you had told me, Chair Gipson, earlier, regarding vacant properties, in general, in that area, there just are none, because of how quickly that area is growing.

The very fact that the building Dolores Huerta is on, that land is so valuable, that building would be just scrapped.

So I would support any move. And I would support LCPS in any move to just say, "We're going to do everything we can in the district to help your kids find a place."

And it's awful to say. But you know what? But we're not going to be able to commence instruction on Monday, not at this site.

THE CHAIR: They have 60 days. They have 60 days at -- with their lease.

VICE CHAIR CARRILLO: Then they have 60 days. They're not going to find anything. We're not going to -- you know, LCPS board is not going to

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want to pump money into that property.

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normally did.

And, so, yeah, then we have 60 days to find arrangements for their children.

I think -- Alma is already very -- that environment is very challenged as it is. I would not support -- even though they didn't come to me -they're not coming to us -- I would not support them being on that property.

The word "temporary," what does that even mean? To the end of this year? Is that two semesters? All of it is -- I'm just taking a Band-Aid off this. And it's awful, but it is what it is.

THE CHAIR: And, I mean, I was clear that they had to have a beginning date and end date. And I -- it was a very short conversation that I was able to have with them.

I think anytime you do these co-locations -- and we've had one in Las Cruces that was just ugly -- it didn't go well. And it's still -- it's still -- it's been going on for three years now, because they haven't been able to get the building rebuilt that they needed to make the move.

And it is -- it is difficult, because you're taking families and asking them to drop off

charter school. They have their -- they are obligated to be independent. And so it is not their problem.

The fact that they've been continual about it is -- probably says a lot for them. I would hope that in the -- just for the well-being of the students and the staff of that school, that they could -- I agree, Steve, with you, that this does not look good. And this does not look like it's going to -- going to pan out well.

But at least that gives them, the parents of these students, and the staff, a reprieve to get -- make other arrangements.

I have a feeling that once the -- the constituency, parents and staff, learn of the precarious nature of their school, there's going to be a lot of people drop off anyway. It may come to its own fruition. At least they have a few days to do that. I can't imagine telling them to go to Alma on Monday. That would be crazy.

THE CHAIR: I agree. And I agree with the re-enrollment issue. I do. If I'm a parent and I'm making a decision, it's kind of -- you know, I want my kid to be somewhere that's -- yeah. Yeah.

So I do -- but in light of this, I'm going

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now a significant distance away from where they

I don't have a whole lot of confidence that they're going to be able to find someplace that's within that area. But that's on the -- that is definitely on the school. But I do imagine that even if they stayed there the 60 days, they're going to have to be in Alma for -- if that's what their board decides -- for a temporary time period, because you're not going to get any place worked on in 60 days to get it habitable to E-Occupancy if you're looking at a -- you know, an office building.

It's not going to happen. It's not. And as I've said before, LCPS has no extra room sitting around. They just don't. They are -- you know, it's a growing school district. And they're, you know, busting at the seams, so that there's -- you know, this is literally -- if you're looking at public schools, that's the only public school that has a couple of classrooms available.

Commissioner Ingham.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: And the reality is it's not LCPS's problem.

THE CHAIR: It's not.

COMMISSIONER INGHAM: This is a State

to ask those communicating with the Epicenter folks if we can have built in the end dates of leases.

Because schools, as an example, give us a copy of their lease at renewal time. If it happens to -- but that's -- it could very well expire the following year, and then we don't have an update on

So if we could get that built into Epicenter so that we have eyes on when schools' leases are up and that schools would then upload their next lease so that we always have the newest version of the lease, that's important.

COMMISSIONER BRAUER: Thank you. I just wanted to share. This is -- I'm just empathizing greatly with this school. I think we started getting into next steps and stuff. That is, like, some really heavy stuff going on with one of our schools.

We should feel that, and we should be in their corners, and we should think about how can we support those young people who are going to that school.

That's their home. And that's hard to think about right now, that Tuesday, you know, they

get this notice. And I think about working with schools and being with schools, getting such a notice is, like, really hard. Even if you get a year notice, it's hard to think about when you know there's not many options.

So my heart is heavy right now with this. I get some of the comments, Commissioner Carrillo, that they're -- I think you said the writing is on the wall in some ways. And, like, I know some of our schools, this one included, has had some difficulties.

But right now, I mean, this certain situation, this is a dire situation. And so, Chair, if there's anything that you need additional support with or things of that nature, I think it also is important for us to circle around schools when they're in these situations. Because regardless of past history or past experiences, like, they're our schools. We own part of that, and we need to support them as much as we can. Because every single one of those kids going to school on Tuesday, and then at some point within 50 or 60 days, they're going to have to move to another campus, that's a lot. That's tumultuous. And it's hard to stay focused on academics at all when you have to go

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So my heart feels for Sylvy and the team there. And I just wanted to share and put that on record that I'm ready to support where I can, because I know that's dire. That's a dire moment.

THE CHAIR: Thanks. That's why I was hoping maybe there was a "Hail, Mary" from PSFA. But there isn't.

So they're meeting, once again this afternoon, with LCPS. So I'll keep you all apprised.

San Diego Riverside. The Director is going to have a meeting with them -- with the head of their governance council next week. They apparently do not have a head administrator hired yet.
