The right of parents to home school their children was first recognized by the State of New Mexico in 1985, by amendments to Chapter 22 of the New Mexico Statutes Annotated (NMSA), 1978. New Mexico statute defines *home school* as

the operation by the parent of a school-age person of a home study program of instruction that provides a basic academic educational program, including reading, language arts, mathematics, social studies and science.

While New Mexico law defines home schooling as including instruction in at least these five core subjects, it leaves home school operators free to tailor curricula to the needs of each child.

The home school requirements set out in NMSA 22-1-2.1 are quite simple: First, a person operating or intending to operate a home school must notify the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) of their intent within thirty days of the establishment of the home school. Second, in subsequent years, home school operators must notify the state on or before August 1. Third, they must maintain records of their students' immunizations or must obtain a waiver of the immunization requirement. Finally, the person providing instruction must possess at least a high school diploma or a high school equivalency credential.

Home school operators are encouraged to maintain thorough and accurate records of their notifications of enrollment, student attendance, educational materials, and portfolios of students' work. These records will aid students if they should later transfer to another type of school or if they should opt to pursue post-secondary education or training.

NMPED's Options for Parents and Families Division (OPFD) launched its online Home School System (HSS) in the 2019-2020 school year. The HSS provides families a simple way to notify the state each year and to easily access their notification records. The HSS provides NMPED a more accurate understanding of the number and general locations of families who choose the home school option for their children. NMPED's data collection is reflected in the graphs and charts on the following pages.


In early 2024, the OPFD assembled a Home School Advisory Team to explore the issues and concerns of home school operators in New Mexico. The team is comprised of 12 home school parents from across the state and the NMPED Homeschool Administrator. One challenge being considered by the team is how to ensure that all home school operators, especially those in the remotest areas of New Mexico, have access to the resources and support enjoyed by those who live in our larger cities.


# **HOME SCHOOL DATA**

## Percent Change Year-to-Year





# Home School Students by Gender Identification




## Home School Students by Race and/or Ethnicity




#### **Education Levels of Home School Instructors**
