





## Career Technical Education (CTE)



Career Technical Education (CTE) provides students with the academic and technical skills, knowledge, and training necessary to succeed in future careers and in school. CCRB administers state and federal grant funding to CTE programs of study, including technical assistance throughout the grant cycle.


The CCRB coaches schools to provide high-quality CTE programs of study that follow specific course sequences. These course sequences lead students to acquire industry-sought credentials and provide a capstone course that bridges post-secondary education through Dual Credit or Advanced Placement. We also provide information and support for CTE coursework.



# Bureau of Indian Education / Tribally Controlled Schools



Tribally Controlled Schools (TCS) are K-12 schools that are operated by an Indian Tribe or Tribal Organization and are not administered by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Bureau of Indian Education schools are funded and overseen by the Bureau of Indian Education (BIE).


In 2023, NM House Bill 198 allowed BIE and TCS to apply for and receive state funds for the first time. CCRB began a pilot program through NextGen state funds to provide funding to seven BIE schools to kickstart their CTE programs. This year (2024) they received both state and federal funding through CCRB.

CCRB and BIE are working to strengthen our relationships with Tribal Nations by providing technical assistance to schools to help them provide students with a high-quality education that reflects their unique cultures and communities.

## Perkins, NextGen, and Innovation Zones




- Perkins V Supports Career Technical Education (CTE) that prepares students for high-skill/living wage or indemand professions.
- **NextGen** 7-year pilot to fund High-Quality, industryrelevant CTE programs that lead to industrial credentials, certificates, or degrees.
- **BIE NextGen** High schools funded by the Federal Bureau of Indian Education are now eligible to receive CTE funds (HB 198).
- Innovation Zones Funds support schools that transform the high school experience (Applications will open again in Spring 2024).

## **Innovation Zones**



The CCRB administers competitive funding to support schools that are transforming the high school experience by creating a distinctive graduate profile that reflects the needs of the local community and implementing work-based learning, career technical education (CTE), capstone projects, social and emotional learning (SEL), and other programs aimed at preparing students for future success in innovative and impactful ways.

This pilot program, entering its third year as of the summer of 2024, is supported by several partners statewide, including NMPED, Future Focused Education (FFE), LANL Foundation, SEL4NM, NMSU, Ocotillo Strategies, Parents Reaching Out (PRO), and REC9.





#### Earn While You Learn

Apprenticeship and Pre-Apprenticeship programs combine paid on-the-job training with related classroom instruction. The goal is to prepare individuals for skilled occupations while equipping them with the practical experience that employers seek in applicants. As a result, employers often ensure that program completers retain employment at an increased wage.

#### How does it work?

Program completers receive either a certificate of completion, college degree, or industry-recognized credential. The employer will often retain the employee at an increased wage.

#### Apprenticeships benefit students and employers!

Apprenticeship programs put a company's need for a skilled workforce in their hands. Employers have the opportunity to train the kind of employees they want with on-the-job training and classroom instruction. This combination puts employees' skills and knowledge into practice immediately.



## Pre-Apprenticeship

The Pre-Apprenticeship Program provides career pathways for participants 16-24 years old by providing them with on-the-job training in marketable occupations. Businesses have an opportunity to produce skilled talent for their industry and prepare pre-apprentices for sustainable employment.



## WIOA

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) is a comprehensive youth employment program serving eligible youth, ages 14-24, who face barriers to education, training, and employment.

WIOA includes 14 program elements that are required to be made available to youth participants.

Local programs provide youth services in partnership with Workforce Connection Centers and under the direction of Local Workforce Development Boards.

Youth are eligible for WIOA services if they meet age requirements, face barriers to education, training, and employment, and meet certain risk factors. For more information, contact your local New Mexico Workforce Connection Center.





## 14 Elements

Along with intake, eligibility, objective assessment, and development of individual service strategy with youth, WIOA provides access to the following 14 program service elements.

- Tutoring, study skills training, instruction, and dropout prevention services
- 2. Alternative secondary school services and dropout recovery services
- 3. Paid and unpaid work experiences
- 4. Occupational skills training
- 5. Education offered concurrently with workforce preparation and training
- 6. Leadership development opportunities
- 7. Supportive services
- 8. Adult mentoring
- 9. Follow up services
- 10. Comprehensive guidance and counseling
- 11. Financial literacy education
- 12. Entrepreneurial skills training
- 13. Services that provide labor market information
- 14. Post-secondary preparation and transition activities

- work-based learning
- industry-recognized credentials
- employment in high-demand occupations

## The program can provide:

- paid and unpaid work experiences (employment, apprenticeship, internships)
