Instruct Hispanic Students in the Art of Theatrical Storytelling Results

We hosted the 2024 Enchantment Awards on stage in Popejoy Hall, rehearsing and coaching all participants for the performance during the week prior. We had 132 students participating, of which 92 were public or charter school students. Of those 92, 43 were Hispanic students, or 46.7% of all students eligible under our proposal submitted on January 10, 2024.

The students represented 14 schools, 15 productions, and 17 casts overall. Participating high schools and their productions were:

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Assessments

After the program was over, we asked participating students to rate us on a scale of 1 to 5 in several areas. The average scores in each topic ranged from a 3.67 to a 4.8. We know that this generation of students gives praise and high scores for most everything, so watching the nuances of the scores is important.

Given that, we assume anything from 4.5 and up is actual praise. Any score between 4.0 and 4.5 indicates an area that needs some work. Any score below a 4 likely needs a significant amount of work.

Our highest score was for a new workshop using a physical approach to teaching story — "Expansion/

Contraction," a way for students to embody story. It clearly resonated with them. We will explore more of those possibilities for future workshops.

Our lowest score was for the paper tech. Paper tech was for production interns only and is a necessary but grueling step in the development of any show. We will find ways to brighten this up for the future.

We will also revisit the workshops that scored between 4 and 4.5 to see what we can do to make those workshops a better experience for the students.

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Comments

We solicited completely anonymous comments from all participants in specific areas. This is their feedback.

What they learned about storytelling:

"Storytelling is the most important part of a performance. You can be the best singer or dancer in the world, but if you can't connect with the audience it won't be interesting to watch."

"I learned that it is important to pick a specific and personal way to present the story and go big."

"It's important to tell a story with your whole body when performing."

"I learned how to implement subtext to bring a song to life. I also learned new methods of bringing physicality to a character."

"Even singing in an ensemble, each individual must tell a story through their interpretation of the song." "The story and emotions I'm showing should reflect in my body language."

Comments about the artistic team:

"Incredibly good at their individual jobs"

"Absolutely lovely and talented people! They were super supportive and gave criticism in a very constructive way."

"You guys are so amazing and I am happy to have met (you) and got to know all of you."

"I loved being with all the people. So much talent and mostly everyone was serious about their work."

Best thing about the program:

"The acting workshops by Kari (Assistant Director) were amazing and really helpful."

"Getting to learn from other professionals in the theater industry as well as seeing Popejoy from a performer's perspective."

"The actual performance was my favorite part. I love the adrenaline rush right before performing and everyone was so happy and excited!"

Best thing about the program (cont.):

"My favorite part was meeting kids from all over the state and becoming fast friends because of the amount of work we did together."

"Meeting people who are as passionate as me, as well as working with such professionals."
