




### Rule Requirements, Certification, and Funding

- Achieve certification for meal quality improvement requirements by July 1, 2025.
- Fifty percent of all weekly required meal pattern components, with the exception of milk, shall be freshly prepared.
- Achieve the lowest level of food waste.
- Utilize New Mexico-grown foods.
- Each School Food Authority (SFA) that operates a healthy universal school meals program shall submit to the department for approval an annual certification documentation.
- Beginning in school year 2025–2026, to SFAs that do not meet meal quality improvement requirements by July 1 each year, the department shall distribute an amount that is equal to the paid meal rate multiplied by the total number of eligible meals served during the applicable budget year.

### Support for Districts – Kids Kitchens

- \$20 million in school kitchen infrastructure grants was awarded to 87 school food authorities that applied for funding. 40 of them are charter schools.
- \$1.7 million in NM Grown funding was awarded in FY25.
- Chef Ann Foundation: "Get Schools Cooking" and "Healthy School Food Pathway Fellowship"
- 18 culinary trainings will be provided this school year.
- Back to School Conference October 1 & 2 in Albuquerque, NM



### Meal Participation Over the Years


#### **Total Meals Served**

- SY 2023-24: 55,020,714 meals served
- SY 2024-25: 58,000,000 meals projected to be served

#### **Student Impact**

- 191,977 Students having lunch daily
- 137,984 Students having breakfast daily

### Program Budget Projections

USDA rates increase July 1 of each year, increasing the state contribution over time. As of 2023-2024 the state is covering the per meal cost difference between the federal free meal reimbursement rate and the federal paid reimbursement rate which was \$3.85 FY24 and \$4.01 FY25.

These budget projections use current USDA reimbursement rates for FY25, projected rates for FY26, and assumes an increase in participation of 5% each year.
